

Publication of Buildings Besigned By Others With a False Claim of Authorship.

CASE OF ALFRED S. JOSEPH.

The Committee on Practice found a prima facie case of unprofessional conduct against Mr. Alfred S. Joseph, a member of the Louisville Chapter, upon charges brought by that Chapter. The offense charged is that the firm of Joseph and Joseph, of which Mr. Alfred S. Joseph is a member, caused to be published in the "Ohio Architect and Engineer and Builder", in the issue of November, 1916, a large number of illustrations of executed work, all, attributed therein to Joseph and Joseph, Architects. The said issue also bears upon its front page the statement:

"This issue illustrates the work of Joseph and Joseph, Architects, Louisville, Ky".

The evidence is entirely clear, and nowhere disputed in any way, that among said illustrations are one of a building of Messrs. McDonald and Sheblessy, one by Mr. Albert Kahn, and a number by Messrs. McDonald and Dodd. It is further stated that both members of the firm of Joseph and Joseph were employed in the office of McDonald and Dodd prior to their beginning the practice of architecture; that nothing in the terms of their employment authorized them to claim any degree of authorship of buildings upon which they were employed; that the nature of their services was not such as to justify any such claims; that since the removal of McDonald and Dodd to California they have repeatedly claimed to have been the architects of buildings erected while they were employed by that firm, and have thus obtained commissions. Mr. Joseph offers no proof in contravention of the above statements, all of which are responsibly made. His defense against the charge brought is that the improper publication above described was in error on the part of the publishers, and without his consent. Against this it is stated that this publication was used by Joseph and Joseph in January, 1917, before a church building committee, and was the means of supplanting a fellow architect then at work on the plans for the chusch-The publishers of the magazine categorically deny in writing the statements of Mr. Joseph.

The Judiciary Committee, after a careful review of the testimony, Mr. Joseph having failed to appear at the hearing, finds Mr. Joseph guilty as charged.

On motion duly made and seconded it was resolved that Mr. Joseph be expelled from the Institute, effective January 19th, 1918.
