Dear Mr. Bergstrom:

I have just reread your appeal of December 8, 1932, for the payment of dues. I did not answer at once because I expected to be able shortly to answer the way you hoped I would. But as the days and then weeks passed, my expected collections turned into losses or the equivalent.

Hereabouts there is no architecture and no prospect of a revival for some time to come. I hope the rumors of better conditions on the coast are based upon the fact.

You do not have to "sell" me the Institute or the necessity of its continued life. I can be counted on to help the cause in every way humanly possible; but being human - - and I believe you will understand - - there are a lot of demands on me more imperative, more immediate, and plucking harder at the heartstrings than the Institute. Over these I have no control. They arrange themselves in the order of their urgency and appeal and are so met as best they may.

Dear Frank:-

January 31 has come and gone. That was the dead line on the payment of A.I.A. arrears. I suppose, if the wheels have turned relentlessly, the axe has fallen and my twenty-two years of work for the benefit of the profession has terminated with my head lying somewhere in the dust. I am philosophical but sad about it.

When we can not alter conditions, we have to take them as they come. The situation reminds me a little of the climax in the second act of "Mr. Pim Passes By." For a few moments a woman's respectability hung on a herring bone. My professional respectability for the past month has depended on which would be reached first - January 31 or approval of the housing project by F. H. A. January 31 won.

For the past four years I have had to choose between devoting my insufficient income to holding on to the real estate assets of the family and meeting other obligations. I have never hesitated to choose the former. I suspect most men with families would have done the same. Anyway, I am content the choice was the proper one, and if January 31 makes a part of the cost to me of the depression, I shall pay it and be unashamed of the record.

Of course, I shall pay what I owe as soon as the Lord will let me. But I shall not ask for reinstatement. The A. I. A. book is closed. I have given all I could, but it was not enough.

You will have to "get you another boy" to fill the committee positions I have held. Good luck.

Frankly, I have been turning over in my mind for several months the wisdom of continuing my long membership which, by the way is longer than yours.

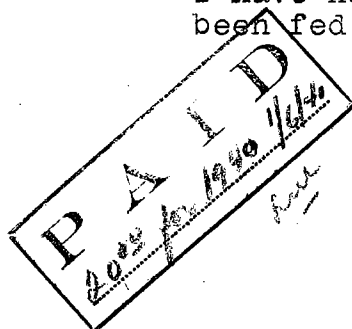
During the last several months I have been pretty close to the Washington situation, and have been impressed by the Institutes complete impotence and the ineptness with which the profession's interests have served by the representatives of the Institute. Because of this the profession, unquestionably has suffered a loss of prestige. Even outstanding Institute members in official positions, ~~some~~ who might have influenced government policy, have been fearful of jeopardizing their own interests.

My quarrel, I suspect, is with with human nature, and there is very little we can do about it. But I have no patience with pretence. The Profession has been fed a lot of bunk.





I doubt if it will do much good to further urge Mr. Jones to retain his Institute membership. When he first went with the War Production Board several of his public addresses, notably one in Chicago, aroused bitter criticism from various architects and from spokesmen of various groups in the building industry. At that time priority rulings were being issued to preserve materials for the defense program and concerning which there was much controversy.

Also it is reported that Mr. Jones lost confidence in The Institute during the period it was officially represented in Washington by the then President, Mr. Bergstrom. These things are hearsay, and I have no personal knowledge in the matter.

With regard to the case of Mr. Howard Steitz, The Board terminated his membership at the request of the Brooklyn Chapter - for non-payment of Chapter dues. It is the general rule of The Board to terminate any corporate membership when a Chapter so recommends - after due notice to the member concerned.

(30 days)

Following The Board meeting Mr. Steitz received the customary termination notice.

A reinstatement can be effected at any time, if he will apply for it, and will meet the outstanding obligations for Chapter and Institute dues. Of course such reinstatement would have to be with the approval of the Brooklyn Chapter.

Check will come forward in due course covering your trip to meet with the New York Chapter.

Thank you indeed for your frank letter of December 15th concerning the status of your membership in The American Institute of Architects.

Whether you need the Institute or not, I am sure the Institute needs you and I am, therefore, very sorry indeed if a man of your eminence in the profession does not care to retain his membership.

If I could discern in your expression any degree of desire to continue your membership, I would offer my mediation in endeavoring to arrange for its continuance until such time as you are able to re-establish good standing within the requirements of the by-laws. I stand ready and desirous to undertake such mediation.

If your intent is to let your membership lapse at the present time, I still express the hope that some time in the future you will feel that the Institute is worthy of your affiliation as a corporate member.
