PERSONNEL OF FIRM OF HARRY INGE JOHNSTONE, ARCHITECT

The firm is built around a small permanent nucleus of personnel of well-balanced educational background. The organization is flexible, the size and composition being adjusted to actual commissions on hand. Inasmuch as the firm has adequate professional assistants in the office or available, no organization chart is included in this brochure. A specific list of available personnel will be submitted in connection with any actual, contemplated work.

In addition to the principal architect and the associate architect, the firm has on its permanent staff its own structural designer, N. H. Holmes, Jr., who graduated from the Alabama Polytechnic Institute and studied advanced structural design at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Copenhagen. Mr. Holmes served three years with the U. S. Army in World War II.

The number of persons in the office averages six. Under its heaviest load a total of forty-eight was employed. Currently, eight persons are engaged on work of this individual firm, with several on leave of absence immediately available.

In the joint venture of J. B. Converse and Company, Inc. and Harry Inge Johnstone, Architect-Engineers, twenty-one employees have been utilized on the average since August 1950, in connection with defense work for the Corps of Engineers of the U. S. Army.

TYPES OF PRACTICE

Work in Mobile Office since 1937 has included public, commercial, and residential building. In 1938 the Principal was made Chief Architect for the Mobile Housing Board, and continued as such throughout the duration of the Slum-Clearance Program under the United States Housing Authority. On the declaration of the state of emergency, he was then made Architect-Engineer on a number of Federal Public Housing Authority projects in and near Mobile. The Principal has participated in two peace-time school building programs in Mobile County, and was Architect-Engineer on a large high school project of the Public Buildings Administration. The Principal was Architect-in-Charge of Mobile's Emergency Hospital Expansion Program under the Federal Works Agency in 1940-43, until he volunteered in the Army and suspended private practice.

Since resumption of private practice in 1945, work in the office has been commercial, residential and institutional; and has included two hospital projects for the State of Alabama at the State Negro Insane Hospital at Mt. Vernon, Alabama; and a project now in development involving the area Tuberculosis Hospital to be constructed under the current Federal Hospital Expansion Program.




