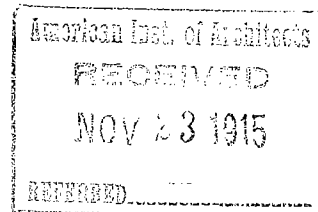

Dear Mr. Mauran:

Mr. Lubechez tells me that Mr. Austin Allen died with typhoid fever. He had been to Florida with his family for about a month and on the way home stopped off in New Orleans for the Mardi Gras and to see Mr. Favrot.

After reaching home he started in to make up for lost time at both the home office and his office at Joplin. He developed typhoid suddenly and only lived about ten days.
