



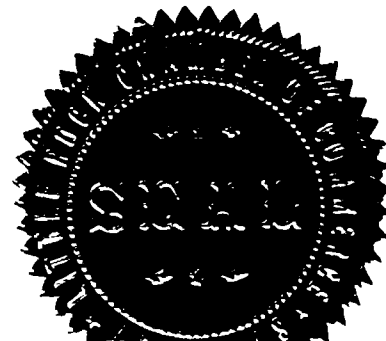

William S. Allen

In the course of his life's work an outstanding architect erects his own monuments in the public and private buildings he designs. So it was with William S. Allen, whose unexpected death Friday shocked those of the community who knew him in the practice of his profession and in his broad participation in civic and church affairs. Mr. Allen had a guiding hand in the construction of such edifices as St. Vincent Infirmary, the new Federal Office Building, the Veterans Administration Hospital on Roosevelt Road, Catholic High School, the state Revenue Building and the Game and Fish Commission Building. He was a leading figure in such public-spirited organizations as the United Fund and the Arkansas Region of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Indeed, his achievements abounded in many areas of activity. Perhaps the most appropriate point to be made about the life of Bill Allen, however, is to recognize that he left his community richer because of the time and the energy he devoted to its betterment.
