I am not a registered architect, due to the fact that my work has been primarily of a consulting nature, in large part with industry. I have done considerable writing of an editorial and technical nature. Among the articles I have prepared was one on "Dry Basements" for Pencil Points Magazine in 1940; another, "Resume of Air Conditioning," which appeared in the December 1941 and January 1942 issues of the same magazine.

I was retained by the Architectural Record to prepare, during the year 1941, their Time-Saver Standards, which disseminated data on design and construction for architectural practice. These data sheets appeared in the magazine each month. The Record published my article on "Window Selection." I also contributed to this magazine a monthly two-page editorial feature called "Architecture Meets Advertising," which crusaded for a type of advertising which would be helpful to the profession.

I have prepared a number of technical catalogues for various companies in the building field, among which are, American Radiator Company, Accurate Metal Weather Strip Company, Marchand Bathroom Accessories, Koppers Company, Architect Samples Corporation, Smyser-Royer Company, Orange Screen Company, Carrier Corporation, Herske and Timmis, and others.

He represented the School of Architecture on the Alumni Trustee Nominating Committee in 1960, he was Chairman in 1962, and in 1963 presented the name of Morris Ketchum, F.A.I.A. as a candidate for Trustee. He served again in 1964. His active advocacy of the need for an architect as a University Trustee during an important period of planning and building development was realized when Vincent Kling, F.A.I.A. was elected a University Trustee in 1965.

American Institute of Architects. Prior to his appointment to the National Judicial Board he had been a member of the Committee on the Collaborating Arts.

He has been active in the New York Chapter since 1949 when he designed the Chapter offices in the Architectural League Building. His membership on the Executive Committee, his three-year term as Treasurer followed by another three years on the Finance Committee attest to his administrative contribution to the Chapter's sound financial position. Twice he was elected to the Chapter's Nominating Committee and once served as its chairman.

The Architectural League of New York. The New York Chapter had its offices in the League Building from 1888 to 1967 and the ties were close. The League provided meeting and dining facilities for the Chapter and many Chapter members were also members of the League. During his term of office as President, the principal rooms were redesigned and refurbished. He initiated the creation of the J. Clawson Mills Fellowship, to be awarded to an instructor in Architecture who desired to pursue his studies for a higher degree. The A.I.A. Committee on the Collaborating Arts comprised the jury. He also initiated a fellowship in Landscape Architecture, and another in Sculpture.

He administered the National Gold Medal Exhibition in which awards were made to designers in the fields of architecture, engineering, mural painting, sculpture, landscape architecture, design, and craftsmanship. He promoted the creation of numerous exhibitions of a small and intimate character to give architects, designer, artists, and craftsmen an opportunity to exhibit their work.

He appointed committees to develop programs of public interest such as the five forums presented by the Architectural League and the Museum of Modern Art on 'The Shape of Cities in Our Time." In 1966 he awarded the President's 'Medal to Kenzo Tange, and presented the Friedsam Medal to Seymour H. Knox, both of whom were designated on his recommendation.

NCARB and THE NEW YORK STATE BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF ARCHITECTS. As Chairman of the State Board of Examiners, he urged changes in the State Education Regulations that effected a closer uniformity with NCARB recommendations. His Chairmanship of the NCARB Middle Atlantic Regional Conferences furthered efforts to achieve national uniformity in registration procedures and led to his election as a Director of the NCARB Board. As current Chairman of the Interprofessional Committee he is seeking to create closer collaboration with the engineering and landscape architectural professions on registration matters of mutual concern.

RONALD ALLWORK

Funeral services will be in Lake Placid, N.Y., for Ronald Allwork, architect, designer and writer, who died today at his home in Boca Raton at the age of 72.

From 1939 to 1942 Mr. All-work was deputy director and then acting director of the plumbing & heating division of the war production board. He was subsequently executive officer of the conservation commission, combined production and resources board, and secretary of the Anglo-American screw thread standardization.

In 1943 Mr. Allwork started private architectural practice in New York City. During those years, he was advisor and author for the American Institute of Decorator's Manual of Professional Practice for Decorators. For this he was made an honorary member of the A.I.D. and later a Fellow of that group. He has also been the author of booklets for Good Housekeeping magazine, a contributor to Pencil Points, Architectural Record, House Beautiful. He received the Columbia Alumni medal in 1952.

By 1950 Mr. Allwork was chairman of the New York State Board of Examiners of Architects and was made a Fellow in the American Institute of Architects. From 1970 to 1975 he was a member of the National Judicial Board and served as vice president of the New York Society of Architects as well as second vice president of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards.

Among his many club affiliations are the Grolier, Century Association, University Club, Lake Placid Club, the Chevy Chase Club and the Royal Palm Yacht and Country Club.

He is survived by his wife, Rae Allen Allwork of Boca Raton and his daughter, Winifred Allwork Treadwell of Tucson, Ariz.
