
Gentlemen:-

Would you be kind enough to let me know approximately how many practicing architects there are in the United States? If you have these figures, could you tell me how many additional architectural draftsmen there are? Have you any idea how much of the designing of buildings and structures in the United States is done by engineers, and also how many dollars worth of building work is designed by Owner's own staffs of engineers?

In other words, what I would like to know is how much work do the architects handle out of the four billion dollars worth of building work that is usually done in a year. If we knew this, we could divide it by the number of practicing architects and see just how much each of them handles each year.

We are afraid when we get the results we will find that there are too many architects in the United States, the same as lawyers and doctors.

Responding to yours of September 27:

There is no use sending you a lot of guesses about the number of practicing architects in the United States, the number of architectural draftsmen, the amount of work done by architects, etc.

Even under normal conditions we were not able to establish these statistics on a reliable basis except to say that on the basis of registration laws there were approximately 15,000 architects in the United States entitled to use the title "architect".

Under war conditions it is futile to even speculate.

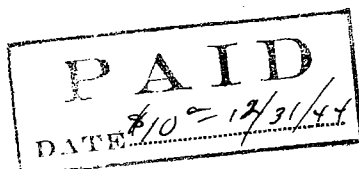

Dear Mr. Caproni:

We wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of January 16th. (See 874)

I appreciate your conveying to us the advice given to you by the R. C. Hawth Company of New York City.

Through our broker, Cochran Fisher of Washington, D. C., sometime ago we looked into the matter of professional liability insurance offered by Lloyds of London. Lloyds, as you know, will undertake to insure practically any sort of risk. However, I think you will find upon investigation that their premiums for professional liability and/or malpractice are extremely high. Furthermore, as Lloyds is not licensed to operate in all of the States in this country, it was obviously impossible for The Institute to work out anything with them.

As you are probably aware, the A.I.A. is withdrawing from any semblance of participation in a professional liability insurance program. However, we understand that the General Accident Assurance Corporation is preparing a slightly different form of liability insurance which we anticipate will be made available to members of the A.I.A. Additional information on this subject will appear in the BULLETIN as soon as the information is available.

I trust I have answered your letter. If there are points which you feel I have not covered, please let me know.

Your letter of July 20th addressed to Mr. Clair W. Ditchy is at hand. As you know, Mr. Ditchy is no longer The President of The Institute. Mr. George Bain Cummings was elected to that office at the Convention in Minneapolis in June last.

I know of no way in which The American Institute of Architects can insure that the terms of the contract of the working agreement between the architect and his client be to the liking of the architect in each case. We can discuss the matter with the Associated General Contractors of America and we can exhort our members to be firm in dealing with their contractor-clients. But after all, it is up to the individual architect in each instance to negotiate a contract which is satisfying to the architect.

If you think there are any steps which The American Institute of Architects can or should take we should be pleased to be advised.

In the absence of Mr. Purves I am taking the liberty of answering your letter to him of August 21 regarding architectural license requirements in California. The license requirements in California are set up by state law and differ from those in other states because of the very well-known earthquake situation which exists in the state. While the AIA works very closely with the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards and has always been in favor of consistency in state licensing requirements, this is probably not the sort of case where the Institute would feel justified in intervening.

It is interesting to note that although a great many of our most prominent members are registered in the state of California, yours is the first objection we have heard to the licensing requirements.

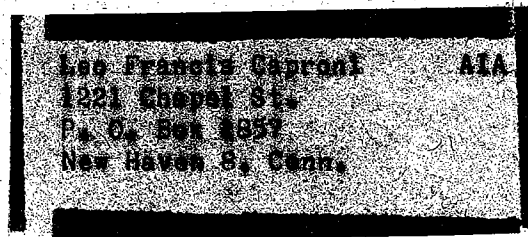


