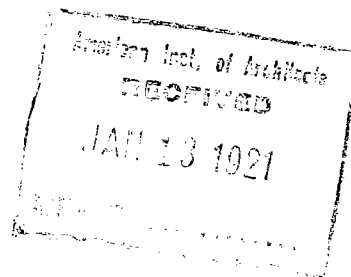

My dear Mr. Kemper;

Please pardon my delay in replying to your valued favor of Dec. 29th. enclosing receipt for preliminary fee for Membership.

I duly received your telegram yesterday, and replied that my exhibits would follow by mail today, and I have accordingly sent you the following works:-

1/8" Scale drawings of The Junior High School, and also the South-West Ward School Buildings, both at Chickasha, Okla. Also, typical full size details applying to both these buildings. I had intended sending you the drawings of the First Methodist Church at Iola, Kansas, but found that these had been so damaged that they were not fit to send. However you will find a Photograph of my perspective, and also of the completed structure.

The other photographs are poor, as I found it difficult to obtain good work, and the photo. of the South-West Ward School is but an enlargement from a Kodak negative, and merely shows that the building was built.

You will notice that the school work above referred to was carried out by Macklin & Faught, and in fairness to my late Partner I wish to state that this work was the product of our joint studies, though the contract was in my name, and I was personally responsible to the School Board for the proper execution of the programme.

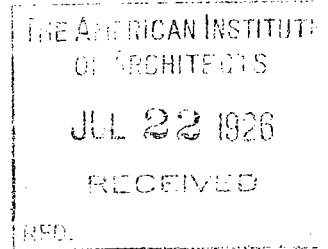

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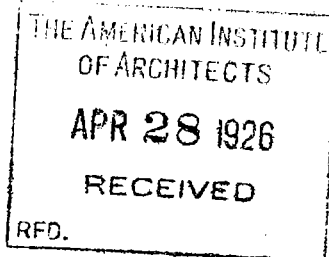

My dear Mr. Macklin:

At the December meeting of the Board of Directors of the Institute your name appeared on the list of delinquent members who are indebted for Institute dues for more than one year - as of December, 1927.

The Board took action on the list as a whole to the effect that those not making payment in full, or some arrangement with the Treasurer as to future payment - before February 15, 1928 - must lose their memberships.

As Secretary of the Institute and because the Institute needs your moral support, as evidenced by your membership, I ask the privilege of addressing you this letter on a somewhat personal basis.

It is a serious thing to forego your membership in the Institute, and in your Chapter. Termination of Institute membership automatically terminates Chapter membership.



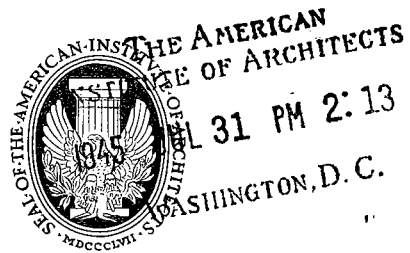

Dear Mr. Deitrick:

Meetings in Washington and vacations of members of the staff at The Octagon have delayed a response to your letter of July 30, concerning the status of Mr. Harold Macklin, formerly a member of The Institute.

We find that Mr. Macklin's membership terminated on December 31, 1929, at which time he owed for Institute dues for 1928 and 1929 in the amount of \$50.00.

A former member need not fill in an application for membership unless he prefers to do so. A letter addressed to The Secretary of The Institute and to the Chapter to which he had been assigned would be sufficient - requesting readmission and stating that he is a practising architect. Such letter should be accompanied by payments of any outstanding Institute and chapter dues which were owing at the time membership terminated.

I have been practicing architecture continuously in this State since 1919, with the exception of two years during the late war; however, I am now again established.

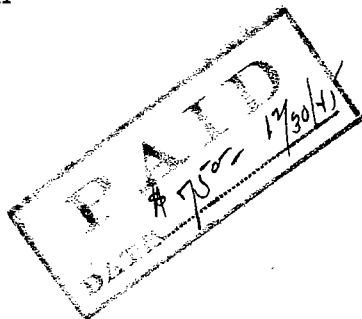

Announcement has been made that a television service will be available to the people in every section of the nation within the next few years and also constant improvement in television service.

Harold Macklin

Harold Macklin was another gift of Britain to America who became eminently useful as a community builder. A very able architect, he designed during nearly 30 years of residence in this city many of the most prominent public and commercial buildings in Winston-Salem, including the Y.M.C.A. building, The Journal and Sentinel building, the studio-office building of station WSJS, the new Y.W.C.A. edifice, and many others. He also collaborated with a famed New York architect in designing St. Paul's Episcopal Church, one of the most beautiful church structures in North Carolina.

Mr. Macklin was more than an able artist or craftsman. He was an excellent citizen, a quiet but influential civic leader, a devoted Christian, loyal and helpful in the work of his church. Both the artist and the citizen will be gravely missed, but the influence of his life will remain as a benediction to Winston-Salem.

Harold Macklin, Architect, Dies After 5-Week Illness

Harold Macklin, 62, one of Winston-Salem's leading architects, died at a local hospital at 5:45 a.m. today after a serious illness of five weeks. He had been ill since August. Mr. Macklin lived at 929 West Fifth Street.

He was born in Portland, England, April 11, 1885, and educated at the cathedral schools in Salisbury, England, and the Architectural School in London. He married Miss Isma Lyle Stultz on Feb. 18, 1919, and came to Winston-Salem that year to make his home. He was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, the American Institute of Architects, and the North Carolina Society of Engineers.

Survivors include the wife; a daughter, Miss Margaret Macklin; and three sons, Albert, Gordon, and Roland Macklin, all of this city.

The body will remain at Vogler's Chapel until 2:45 p.m. Saturday, when it will be taken to St. Paul's Episcopal Church for funeral services at 3 p.m. Rev. James S. Cox will officiate. Burial will be in Salem Cemetery.

Buildings Are Memorials

Many Winston-Salem buildings are monuments to Mr. Macklin's architectural skill. He designed the Y.M.C.A. building in the downtown area and the new Y.W.C.A. building. He collaborated, with the assistance of a famous New York architect, on the St. Paul's Episcopal Church structure.

His latest major project, not yet built, was the new Mineral Springs High School. He also designed the Haverty Furniture Company building, the new Rominger Furniture store front and many other business structures in this area.

Included among these are The Journal and Sentinel building, which he designed some 20 years ago and which won considerable acclaim in architectural circles, and the studio-office building of WSJS, also an outstanding example of its type.
