Your letter of September 19th is received, and we can well understand your sense of shock on receiving the letter addressed to your late husband.

This can be explained by the fact that the last edition of the membership roster published by The American Institute of Architects was printed before Mr. Malkus's death, so his name appears in that list.

There are many copies of this membership roster in existence, as it was distributed to nearly 15,000 AIA members when it was released. We know that these members cannot begin to keep those lists up-to-date, and unless a person writing to a member had had personal knowledge it would not be evident that a member had died in the interim.

This is mentioned only by way of explanation, and with the assurance that the loss of the members of The Institute who contribute so much to the advancement of their profession is by no means overlooked.

We are calling your letter to the attention of the member of The Institute residing and practising in Florida who mailed the letter in order that he will be informed of the situation.

Dear Mrs. Malkus:

Several days ago we received a letter from Miss Florence H. Gervais, Secretary to the A.I.A. Jury of Fellows, telling me of the unfortunate error on our part in addressing a letter to Mr. Malkus regarding the Fellowship nomination of Robert H. Levison. I can thoroughly understand your shock and dismay upon receiving our communication and want you to know of our sincere regret; we apologize most humbly and want to let you know the reason for the error.

As Chairman of the Fellowship Committee of the Florida Central Chapter, I was responsible some two years ago for accumulating the necessary data and support for Mr. Levison's nomination and at that time Mr. Malkus was carried on the A.I.A. Roster. Unfortunately, Mr. Levison was not successful on the first consideration by the Jury and inasmuch as the usual procedure in such cases is to maintain the list of the names of the nominees for three years without prejudice, we naturally attempted this year to build up the case by obtaining additional support. We had not learned of any action taken by your husband on the first attempt and for this reason I personally mailed out the information once again to those from whom I had no word on the first submission. Unfortunately, I was not personally acquainted with your husband and was completely unaware that he had passed away, hence the unfortunate result.

Again, please accept the apology, both for our Chapter and myself personally.
