My dear Mr. Manley:

At the December meeting of the Board of Directors of the Institute your name appeared on the list of delinquent members who are indebted for Institute dues for more than one year - as of December, 1927.

The Board took action on the list as a whole to the effect that those not making payment in full, or some arrangement with the Treasurer as to future payment - before February 15, 1928 - must lose their memberships.

As Secretary of the Institute and because the Institute needs your moral support, as evidenced by your membership, I ask the privilege of addressing you this letter on a somewhat personal basis.

It is a serious thing to forego your membership in the Institute, and in your Chapter. Termination of Institute membership automatically terminates Chapter membership.

It is a serious thing for the Institute and the Chapter to lose a member who, in the beginning, was enthusiastic about both and determined to make his contribution to the cause of the architectural profession.

If you will make a special effort and send to the Treasurer, at The Octagon, a check for at least the indebtedness of one full year, it will permit us to carry your membership during 1928. If 1928 is as good as it promises to be the future should take care of itself.

Will you not let me hear from you, personally if you prefer, at your early convenience - and certainly by February 15th.

Dear Mr. Manley:

At the direction of the Secretary of the Institute, and with regret, I write to advise you that your membership in The American Institute of Architects and the Florida Chapter has been terminated effective December 31, 1927, for non-payment of Institute dues.

You are indebted for \$30.00 - \$5.00 for 1926, and \$25.00 for 1927.

If I might add a word of explanation, it would be to say that the Officers and Directors of the Institute are more than sorry that this action is necessary. They regret to lose your name and influence.

But the Institute is largely dependent upon the dues of its members for carrying on its work. It is not fair to those who pay their dues to carry, indefinitely, those who do not pay. Under the general resolution adopted at the December meeting of the Board, and about which we advised you, we are obliged to drop those owing for two years or more.

It is hoped that the future will bring about improved business conditions for you, and that you will consider renewing your professional society affiliations.

Frankly, the trouble is not with the Board, but with the lady! She was elected October 30, 1926, and has not made a single payment on account of Institute dues. We have written her some kind, personal letters about the account, to which she has paid not the slightest attention.

Had she shown any interest, and had she been willing to make some arrangement for future payment, her membership would have been preserved. Her membership was discontinued with others, all of whom were on the final list - the list of those who apparently have not enough interest in the Institute to even make a response to personal letters.

However, nobody hates to see the loss of an Institute member any worse than I do. They are too hard to get. If Miss Manley will apply for reinstatement as per procedure shown on the marked document herewith, she can depend upon The Octagon to give special and sympathetic attention to the matter.

It is encouraging to learn that two other former members of the Chapter are interested in applying for reinstatement. For your information the status of each is given below:

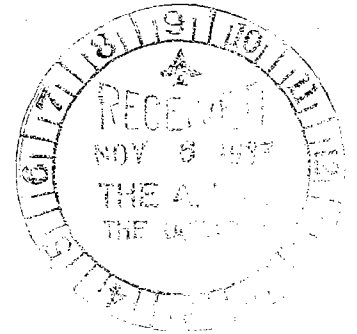



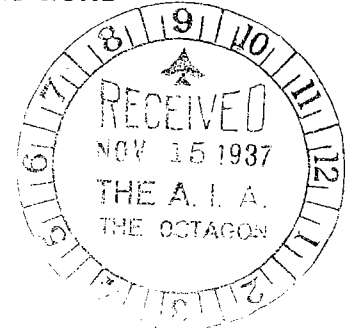

A member pays annual dues both to The Institute and to the chapter. The annual dues to The Institute normally are twenty-five dollars (for 1936 Institute dues were reduced to twenty dollars) and those to the chapter are fixed in its by-laws.

Normally the period between the time of filing

an application and the time it is acted on by The Board of The Institute is four months. The period will be longer if the application must be returned to the applicant for corrections or if additional exhibits of the applicant's work are required by The Board of Examiners.

If an application is denied, the amount prepaid by the applicant for annual dues and for admission fee, less five dollars for examination fee, will be returned to him.

An applicant whose application has been denied without prejudice may reapply for admission to membership a year or more after the date of The Secretary's notice to him of his non-admission.

Marion I. Manley, 90, nationally known

Marion I. Manley, a nationally known Miami architect, died Saturday at the age of 90.

Born in Junction City, Kan., Ms. Manley was the first woman to graduate with a bachelor's

degree in architecture from the University of Illinois and was one of the first women to practice architecture in Florida.

Since her move to Miami in 1917, she was active in the planning and design of the federal

building in downtown Miami and University of Miami campus buildings. In 1973, she received the Gold Medal Award from the Florida Association of the American Institute of Architects.

Ms. Manley was a member and twice president of the American Institute of Architects' South Florida chapter and twice vice president of the Florida Association of Architects. She was a former member of the Miami Planning Board and Coral Gables Board of Supervising Architects, as well as the Historical Association of Southern Florida, Coconut Grove Civic Association, and Friends of the Coconut Grove Library.

She also was a member of the Kappa Alpha Theta Sorority, from

which she received the Bertha Foster Award. *NO WIVES LOCAL*

Surviving her are a niece, Joan Altmayer, and a nephew, Bob Manley.
