in addition is an Associate Member of the Pittsburgh Chapter, he takes a very active part on Committees and other work entrusted to him, and is a worthy candidate.

Lyle E. Swiger is a little younger than the men just noted, and is still working as a draftsman in the Asheville office of Douglas D. Ellington, a Member of the Pittsburgh Chapter. Mr. Swiger's affiliations are with the Pittsburgh territory and although he is temporary in Asheville, N.C., it is his intention to return to Pittsburgh in the very near future, and has requested in making application for Institute Membership, that he be posted to our Chapter. Our Directors hope that the Executive body of the Institute will see their way clear to concede Mr. Swiger's request.

Jacob A. Altschuler - The application of this gentleman has been pending for two years chiefly because he failed to take the required steps to obtain the signatures of members of the Institute to endorse his application. The Executive Officers of the Chapter who have endorsed his application have done so on the strength of correspondence received from Mr. Altschuler, in which he binds himself to uphold the Canons of Ethics and all principles of practice as laid down by the Institute. The Directors are holding a Meeting in New Castle on October 28th for the purpose of meeting Mr. Altschuler and any other Architects in that city, with the view to interesting some or all of them to join the Institute. Mr. Eckles, Sr. an Institute Member in New Castle has written us most favorably in respect to Mr. Altschuler and on his recommendation the Board were unanimous in their approval that it should be forwarded to Washington for action.

We will continue our drive to increase the Membership in the Institute in this district up to the end of this year. With the beginning of next year and the increased initiation fee, I doubt exceedingly if we will be as successful in obtaining new members, as have during the past year. Practically all of the older men, who are eligible to join the Institute are either in that body or have objections against them, and the younger men will, I feel sure, find difficulty in paying the raised initiation fee of the Institute together with Institute & Chapter dues which will make a total of \$75.00 the first year.

Mr. Marlier was especially effective as an organizer of and leader of a group of Pittsburgh Chapter members engaged, at the request of the Pittsburgh Housing Association, in preliminary studies and negotiations which expedited the undertaking of extensive housing projects in Pittsburgh.

Through his chairmanship of an unpaid citizens committee, advisory to the Allegheny County Government, he made a marked contribution to proper determination of the site location and development of his community's first official major airport.

He made, and continues with unflagging energy to make, constructive contribution to the civic life of his community through membership in, or service with, the Board of Directors of the Pittsburgh Housing Association, the Pittsburgh District Aviation Commission, and the City of Pittsburgh's Building Code Revision Committee.





**CUMMINS
ENGINE WILL
GET CITATION**

Given in recognition of achievement in any field related to architecture and planning, the citation will be presented at this year's convention in Atlanta, May 18-22.

In selecting the Cummins Engine Foundation, which has for 18 years paid architectural fees for new schools and public building projects in the city of Columbus, the Jury on Institute Honors commented that few organizations have done as much to raise the level of respect and recognition for the architectural profession as the Cummins Engine Foundation."

"The Foundation's efforts," said the jury, "have made Columbus an architectural showcase and perhaps the best possible example of how architecture can improve the physical environment and the quality of life."

The Foundation's approach is simple as well as unique. It pays architectural fees with the stipulation that distinguished, nationally known architects be selected as designers. The architect is chosen from a list of six drawn up for each project, and is given responsibility for the entire building—from landscaping to interiors.

Since the program first began in 1957, the Foundation has paid the architectural fees for a total of 18 buildings, including schools, a retirement center, a fire station, and a mental health center.

GEMINI GEL WILL RECEIVE INDUSTRIAL ARTS MEDAL

Gemini GEL, a Los Angeles lithography firm, will receive the Institute's Industrial Arts Medal this year.

Given in recognition of design for execution by machines, the medal covers such fields as furniture, textiles, typography, building products and equipment, and consumer products.

The medal will be presented during this year's AIA convention in Atlanta, May 18-22.

The eight-year-old firm is being honored for the excellence of its lithography, the "unparalleled" technical assistance it offers artists, and the research and development of new materials and techniques. These are all factors that the Jury on Institute Honors said "fostered an atmosphere of creative collaboration among artists, designers, and craftsmen, which has led to a valuable interaction and collaboration with the art community."

Gemini GEL has found new ways of executing the artist's vision, rather than imposing technical limitations on it. This approach has called for new printing techniques, new papers, and new materials, many of them specifically developed for the work of individual artists. All of these developments have extended the range of lithography in contemporary art.

NEWS BRIEFS

The Energy Research and Development Administration (ERDA) has recently released its "Interim Report: National Plan for Solar Heating and Cooling." This 120 page document supersedes the "Program Plan" published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration last December. The publication pulls together all federal work in the solar field, and presents a detailed proposal of the strategies and procurement procedures for the implementation of the Solar Heating and Cooling Demonstration Act of 1974.
