Washington State Chapter

We received in our mail today a copy of a letter dated January 15, addressed to you in which the Washington State Chapter voted to request the Institute's suspension of Wm. A. Manley and Francis B. Mayer. This suspension was predicated upon nonpayment of dues. According to our records the fourth quarter of 1957 was paid and on November 6, 1958, we sent to the Washington State Chapter a check in the amount of \$60.00 to cover the four quarters of 1958, basing this upon a minimum of \$7.50 per member per quarter. On December 23, the Washington State Chapter returned our check to us uncashed, asking us to please revise the check in accordance with some new rules. If we can find what they believe is currently due we will be most happy to forward them our payment.


We, who live in Alaska, have felt that we have received very little benefit from the dues which we have been required to pay to the Washington State Chapter. Due to our geographical location it is impossible for us to attend meetings. The problems which arise in the State of Washington are entirely different from those which we encounter here. Therefore, it has been the opinion of both Mr. Manley and myself that we should not be required to pay more than the minimum set forth by the Chapter. We cannot recall of any instances of ever receiving what we would classify as a single benefit from the Washington State Chapter. It is hoped, by those of us who belong to the AIA in Alaska, that we will soon be able to have our own State Chapter and we surely do not wish to be suspended for nonpayment of dues which we actually attempted to pay. We do not feel that it is the fault of the Washington State Chapter that we have not received any benefits from the association-ship but geographic location makes it an impossibility.

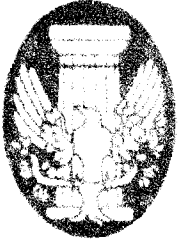

Gentlemen:

Regarding your letter of January 19, addressed to Institute Secretary Wilson, concerning dues to this Chapter:

For some time, our Executive Secretary has suspected that your firm has paid incorrect dues to the Chapter, that you have been overpaying the amount intended. When the new dues system went into effect, statements for which were mailed in April, 1958, the Chapter Office was directed by the Executive Committee to cash only those dues checks accompanied by completed dues statements.

This requirement was intended to insure that members neither over nor under paid their dues. We feel that this policy has been very successful because it has provided means of our knowing which members did not understand the method of dues calculation, and has given us opportunity to see that the process is explained to them in such a manner that it is understood. Now, when a statement is received which does not seem to have been completed on the basis of the information requested, it is returned to the member with the suggestion that the form be fully completed and the amount paid, varified. This is the sort of letter received by you on December 23.

By reading the statement form from the top (a copy is enclosed), you will find that you are first to choose whether the upper or lower portion is to be completed. If you do have employees, the upper block is to be checked and the blanks in that area filled.

If you, as a firm, employ two people, the total due on the basis of \$2.50 per employee per month is \$15 per quarter which, split between you both is \$7.50 per partner, as you have been paying. However, this amount fails to take into consideration the stipulation listed at the bottom of the statement, that members residing and practicing 20 land-miles from Seattle, or further, are to pay dues of one-half. We are not able to make

retroactive adjustment on your overpayments - if they have been overpayments... this information having appeared on each statement sent you for the past four years that I know of. But with the institution of the newsystem, designed to point up cases such as yours appears to be, we hope that all dues payments will become accurate. We need each members' cooperation to achieve this end, however.

Current records in the Chapter Office go back to January, 1956. They indicate that your dues for 1956's first two quarters were paid by a check deposited by us on August 30, 1956; dues for the third quarter, paid by a check deposited on April 30, 1957; and for the fourth quarter of 1956 and the first two quarters of 1957, by a check deposited on August 20, 1957. The last check credited to your accounts was deposited on December 31, 1957, for the third quarter of 1957, according to our records. Each billing subsequent to that date should have indicated which quarters were in arrears and if a check were lost, which periodically happens, perhaps your records will indicate that it has never been cashed. If an error previous to January 1956 is involved, we will go into our dead file if you will provide additional information on the variance in our records.

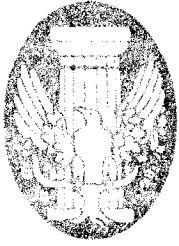



The applicant may supplement the above reasons in writing below or on sheets which he shall attach to this application. Under exceptional conditions and circumstances, the Board of Directors may lessen the period of good standing but not the requirements as checked above.
