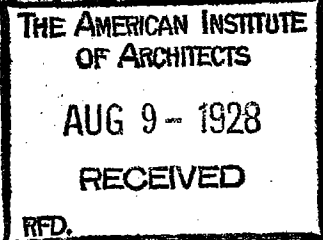

Hoping this will be satisfactory and regretting the delay in completing my application, I am

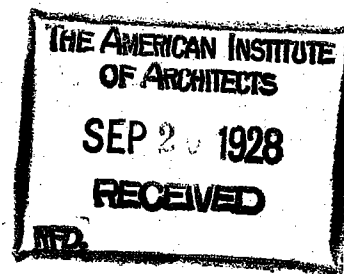
