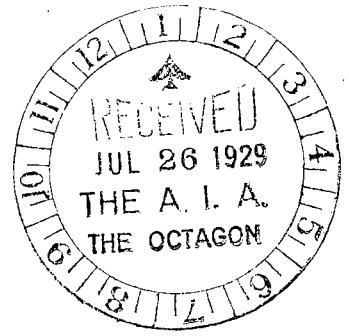

Dear Sir:

I am very sorry for several reasons that I cannot comply with your request regarding a photostatic copy of my certificate of graduation from Cornell. The fact that I have no certificate makes this impossible. I am, if I am not mistaken, considered a graduate of Cornell, but cannot have my degree until I clear up some high school entrance requirements which I lacked, French being one of them. If this certificate makes any difference, in my case, you might write Dean George Young Jr. College of Architecture, Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y.

When Mr. Albert O. Larson, my partner, *sent Exp.* and myself applied for Institute membership, we asked to be admitted on the same basis, he having had two years at Pennsylvania and I four at Cornell. He was admitted to institute membership and I was not. I did not state in my application that I had a degree from Cornell, merely that I had attended Cornell and had completed the four years Architectural course. You might refer to Mr. Larsons letter of Feb. 9, 1929 regarding my admittance to the Institute by "Exhibit".

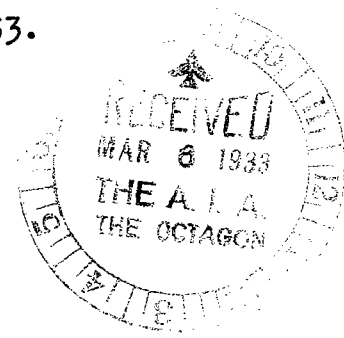

Dear Sirs:

This will acknowledge, with regret, your letter of March 2nd, tendering your resignations as members of the Institute, as of January 1, 1933.

As you know, severance of Institute membership also carries with it termination of Chapter membership. Neither the Institute nor the Minnesota Chapter can afford to lose your affiliation and support.

The Officers and Directors of the Institute are keenly aware of the financial problems which confront every practicing architect.

At the last meeting of the Executive Committee of the Institute it was directed that resignations of members, submitted on account of the economic crisis, be not accepted at present. Therefore, the Institute asks that you continue your affiliation with the national body and with the Minnesota Chapter - on the understanding that at the end of 1933, if conditions have not improved, your resignation will be accepted by the Institute as of December 31, 1932 - subject, of course, to your status as a member at the time the resignation was submitted.

May I add a personal word to this general statement of policy? We simply cannot afford to lose from the Institute men like yourself. Many of us believe that 1933 will show some improvement in the practice of architecture. We must stand together, and we must carry on.

Please accept this letter as confidential, and please be advised that we are continuing you on the records at The Octagon as active members of the Institute and the Minnesota Chapter - throughout the year 1933 - unless you specifically order otherwise.

Dear Mr. McLaren:

This is the first opportunity to write to you with regard to the continuation of your Institute and Chapter membership.

You will recall previous correspondence, and that your resignation from the Institute is pending at The Octagon.

The Board at its last meeting was not willing to accept the resignation, thereby losing your support of the Institute and the profession, without making a final effort.

The Secretary was directed to call your attention to the new plan for adjusting dues for the period 1931-1933, and to the action of the Board in reducing the dues for the year 1934 to \$15.00.

Dear Mr. Jones:

The resignation of Messrs. Charles L. Ellis, Albert O. Larson, and Don A. McLaren, Institute members of the Minnesota Chapter, have been pending for a long time.

When they were submitted, we believe because of financial difficulties - they were in good standing with respect to Institute dues.

But the Executive Committee did not accept the resignations - in view of depression conditions. Messrs. Ellis, Larson and McLaren were so advised, and in a letter of September 6, 1934, the Secretary of the Institute wrote to them personally - seeking a reconsideration.


