Thank you for sending photostat of the clippings that appeared in the San Francisco News and the Daily Builders

You will find, if you have not already done so, that instances like this are quite discouraging to any public relations effort. I am afraid the only cure is education and that is not necessarily sure fire because it is pretty difficult to curb the passion for public expression of opinion that besets the individual architect. This has gotten us into trouble time and time again. This instance examplifies what I fear all of you must be weary of hearing me say, namely: that the individual member of the profession is the most important cog in the whole public relations machine and no amount of energy and money and thinking that we put into our public relations program will offset the immediate impression of the profession created by the individual.

This building was planned as the basic unit of a much larger plant and to eventually be used solely by the merchandizing and development groups. When opened it accommodated three organizations: an electronics development company; manufacturers of the equipment; and a merchandizing and engineering firm.

ARCHITECT WRE

The electronic development unit on the ground floor has offices in the northeast wing, adjoining the laboratory and drafting room. Shops, stockroom, assembly and testing areas are in the west wing. The manufacturing company occupied the main wing on the second floor, and the merchandizing company the northeast wing, which is designed for the reception of customers.

Foundations are concrete, framing is wood post and lintel. Walls are prefabricated concrete-block panels, with plywood board on the interior. Ceilings are acoustic tile in offices, fiber insulation board in shop areas. The building is air conditioned throughout, and heated by warm air.

Born 1910; educated Stanford University, California School of fine Arts. Own practice since 1938, President NCCAIA 1950-51, FAIA 1957; Art Commissioner San Francisco 1949-51; Faculty Stanford University 1955 to date.

2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

The nominee's career has been marked with a strong pioneering philosophy of architecture. Much of his energy and his interest have been directed towards bringing advanced architecture to areas where it has been previously unknown. The very fact that such architecturally backward areas have accepted his purely contemporary design, and are living happily with it, attests to the success of his philosophy.

Raised in the pioneer city of Virginia City, in the heart of a desert area, Mr. McCarthy had the opportunity early in his career to introduce contemporary design to these isolated communities. His recent works are found in remote Independence, Bishop, Lone Pine and Carlsbad in California, and as far as Fairbanks, Alaska—all virgin territory as far as contemporary architecture is concerned.

It has been a constant challenge to him to explore fields where architects have never worked before, either because of geographical barriers or because of intellectual barriers. As Mr. McCarthy himself has put it, he always prefers to "extend the fringe of sound architectural thinking rather than work within the periphery."

This pieneering philosophy has been extended to his urban architectural work as well. For example, in remodelling parts of the Palace Hotel in San Francisco, which was steeped in classicism, he managed to introduce the contemporary without disturbing the historic charm of this famous hotel.

In his work for the American Seed and Nursery Company and for the International Minerals and Chemicals Company, he was able to elevate their thinking from the prosaic to the imaginative, and produced buildings for them which have a real flow of contemporary design and planning.

His philosophy of design is one of totality, encompassing the smallest detail of design. For example, as a member of the Art Commission in San Francisco, he saw to it that even the park benches and the light standards were not neglected in the design of civic projects which came before the Art Commission for approval.

As a result, his counsel has been sought on various civic levels. He was retained by the San Francisco Planning Commission as a critic on the spectacular Diamond Heights housing study. This planning study was developed by the Commission in order that proper zoning controls would be established, the project being the last large tract of land in San Francisco available for housing. The project will cost in excess of 100 million dollars.

In addition, the nominee is currently serving in an advisory capacity to the City of San Francisco on Bus Airport Terminal facilities.

Mr. McCarthy's completed works have been published in all of the top-ranking architectural magazines, both in this country and abroad, including Architectural Forum, Architectural Record, Progressive Architecture, Arts and Architecture, Architectural Review (England), Nuestra Arquitectura (Argentina), and L'Architecture D'Aujourd'hui (France.)

Examples of his work have consistently appeared in consumer and trade magazines as well, including Sunset, House and Garden, House Beautiful, and Holiday. His work has been included in eight different travelling exhibits, two of which are now circulating as State Department exhibits in South America and Europe. Locally, his work is currently on display at the San Francisco Museum of Art, the A.I.A. Chapter office, and the Vienna Technical School.

He has received the following architectural awards:

- 1951: Award of Merit, national A.I.A. Honor Awards Program, for the Electronic Engineering Associates Bldg. in San Carlos.
- 1953: Award of Honor, Northern Calif. Chapter, for the American Seed and Mursery Company in San Francisco.
- 1953: Award of Merit, Northern Calif. Chapter, for the Hanna Car Wash in Burlingame, California.

- 1934-35: Under the adult education program of the depression years, the nominee taught the art of ceramics to a group of high school teachers in the towns of Grass Valley and Nevada City, California, so that this art could be included in the curricula program of these high schools. His work in this field was well known during the early years of his career.
- 1950 to date: Member of a speakers' bureau of the Northern California Chapter, and has given many lectures to high school groups throughout the State. The nominee is a firm believer in carrying architectural education into secondary schools in order that the general public may become acquainted with our profession.
- 1955-57: Senior design lecturer, Stanford University architectural school. In this capacity, he is carrying his knowledge and experience in regional planning and design to the graduate students, and is proving a source of real inspiration to them.

During the nominee's presidency of the Northern California Chapter, a program of public relations was instigated, with far-reaching results. The Chapter's dues structure was implemented in order to retain a public relations counsel, and the Chapter as a professional whole entered upon a program of community service and betterment.

Chapter meetings were held with public efficials for the first time. Reports of Chapter activities began to appear consistently in the press in support of good architecture and good planning.

The Civic Center Master Plan program for San Francisco was conceived and acted upon during the nominee's presidency. The approval of the City Manager and Mayor were obtained, and a budget studied to determine the cost of a re-study of civic needs to encompass the 100 million dollars needed for a building program to combine city, federal, and state agencies in proper juxtaposition to each other. This study is now under way, with private architectural and engineering firms and city departments cooperating on the work.

Mr. McCarthy was asked to assist in the formulation of the A.I.A.'s national public relations program, and served on a committee with John Root, Mr. Sleeper, and Mr. Kamrath for this purpose. As a result of their combined efforts, we now have our national program of public relations.

Subsequently, as chairman of the public relations committee of the California Council of Architects, he helped to establish a similar program on a state-wide basis.

The nominee raised funds for the establishment of a permanent Chapter headquarters. This program finally resulted in a suite of offices where almost daily committee meetings are now held with staff members, consisting of a public relations counsel, a full-time executive secretary, and an office assistant. The nominee's design work forms part of an architectural exhibit in these offices.

- 2951-53: Chairman and leader of work started during his Chapter presidency for the Civic Center Master Plan expansion program.

In San Francisco and the Bay Area, the nominee has leng been known for his efforts on behalf of better design and city planning. While on the Art Commission, he achieved and won the respect of civic leaders for the soundness of his views, his integrity and avoidance of personal gain.

The nominee raised the stature of San Francisco's Art Commission to a point of real power in the formulation of plans for city development and effective control of the design of city structures. His close collaboration with the Planning Commission made possible many drastic changes in the thinking of civic leaders in the interests of good planning.

From 1938 to 1942, the nominee led a workshep group in a series of regional and city planning studies. The group included such noted planners as Jack Kent and Francis Vielich. The detailed studies which resulted formed an impressive exhibit for several years at the San Francisco Museum of Art, and focused the need for a planning commission in San Francisco. As a result of these exhibits, a charter amendment was passed calling for a strong planning commission, which is now functioning under the leadership of Paul Oppermann, Director of City Planning.

When the expansion of San Francisco's overcrowded Civic Center became imminent, and no talent or funds were available for study, the nominee as Chapter president enlisted the Chapter's support in the campaign for the execution of a Civic Center master plan, as a public service.
