Absence from the City has delayed an earlier response to your letter of September 13.

I believe it is a matter of state law which governs the question you raise, and therefore this can be different from one state to another. However, I believe your attorney will tell you that your responsibility as an architect does not disappear simply because you retire.

The rule on following assets of an architect into his estate, and then to his heirs, again varies from state to state, but there are a variety of state laws which set up barriers, such as special statutes of limitations or non-claim statutes, in order to protect the heirs and the estate from endless claims.

For detailed information as to how these statutes work, and exactly what they are in your own State, you will wish to consult your own attorney.
