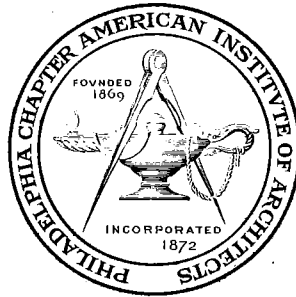

The nominee has been a diligent worker for the A.I.A. since his admission January 5, 1922. He organized the Scranton-Wilkesbarre Chapter during 1922-23, and was the first president of same.

He has been the author of technical articles for the A.I.A. Journal, Pennsylvania Engineer, Washington Post, and other periodicals.

He is a member of the Speakers Panel, Philadelphia Citizens Council on City Planning, and has had many speaking engagements on behalf of the A.I.A., appearing before the Pennsylvania State Society of Municipal officials, and many civic organizations.

He has served on the Philadelphia Chapter A.I.A. Committees for:

Building Regulations	1947-49
Fees & Contract Documents	1949-50
Municipal Improvements	1946-50

He has also served on the National Committee of Fees from 1946 to the present. From June to December 1949, as a member of this committee, he gave unstintingly of his time and efforts in negotiations with the Public Housing Administration to promote more equitable compensations for the architect's services. As a result of this effort, an average increase of approximately 35% in fees was obtained, and a much higher regard for the Institute and the individual architect was entertained by the Administration officials and personnel.

Our nomination would be incomplete without an acknowledgement of our warm regard, humble admiration and sincere appreciation of his having given so unselfishly of his time and efforts, and his ever willingness to assist in any way called upon, to the advancement of his fellow workers.
