CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS OF THE ATLANTA CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN  
INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTS.

C O N S T I T U T I O N .

A I A

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this Society shall be the ATLANTA CHAPTER OF  
THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTS.

ARTICLE II

OBJECTS.

The objects of this Chapter are to unite in fellowship  
the architects of the State of Georgia, and to combine their efforts  
so as to promote the artistic, scientific and practical efficiency  
of the profession.

ARTICLE III

MEANS OF  
ACCOMPLISHMENT

The means of accomplishing this end may be: Regular  
meetings of the members for the discussion of subjects of general  
importance; lectures upon topics of general interest; exhibitions  
of architectural drawings; a library; a collection of designs  
and models; and any other means calculated to promote the objects  
of the Chapter.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

1. The Chapter shall consist of Professional, Junior,  
Corresponding and Honorary Members.
2. The condition of Professional Membership shall be the  
honorable practice of the profession according to the Constitution  
of the Chapter and the American Institute of Architects.
3. The conditions of Junior, Honorary and Corresponding  
Membership shall be as defined by the By Laws.



CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

The officers of the Chapter shall be a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary, who shall also be Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI

MEETINGS

The Chapter shall hold an annual meeting, and such other meetings as may be determined by the By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII

GOVERNMENT

The government of the affairs of the Chapter, and the election of members and officers, shall be in accordance with such By-Laws, not inconsistent with the Constitution, as shall be enacted by the Chapter.

ARTICLE VIII

AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION

The Constitution shall be altered or amended only upon a two-thirds vote of the members present at an annual meeting, or a meeting called for the purpose, at which not less than two-thirds of the members of the Chapter are present; the proposed amendment or alteration having been previously discussed at either a regular or special meeting; and the vote thereupon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

B Y - L A W S

ARTICLE I

MEMBERSHIP MEMBERS

- 1. Professional members shall be Practicing Architects who

have had an experience in the profession, independently, for at least two years.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS

2. Candidates for professional membership shall hand their application, containing name and residence of the applicant, with the endorsement of two architects (professional members of the Chapter), to the Secretary, who shall hand them over to the Committee on Admissions for examination into their professional capacity. The Committee on Admissions shall report to the Chapter at a regular or called meeting, the results of their investigations, and, if there is no opposition to the applicant, the Secretary shall then issue letter ballots upon the candidate's election to all professional members of the Chapter. If, upon counting the letter ballots received, it is found that one ballot has been cast against the admission of any candidate, he shall be declared rejected - otherwise, he shall be declared duly elected a member of the Chapter.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS

3. Corresponding members shall be such as shall be elected by a two-thirds vote of the Chapter; and Secretaries of Architectural Associations ex-officio.

JUNIOR MEMBERS

4. The class "Junior Members" shall be composed of Architects' Assistants, Draughtsmen, and such persons engaged in the study of the art under the care of an architect in honorable practice, not less than twelve months. They shall be entitled to the use of the library, reading room; to attendance at all meetings of the Chapter; and they are eligible on special Committees. They shall be elected in the same manner as professional members.

BY-LAWS

HONORARY MEMBERS

5. Honorary members can be elected only by unanimous vote of the Chapter at a regular meeting.

MEMBERS WHO CANNOT VOTE

6. Junior, Honorary and Corresponding members shall not be entitled to vote or to hold office.

CHAPTER PROPERTY

7. All interest in the property of the Chapter of the members resigning, or otherwise ceasing to be members, shall be vested in the Chapter.

CENSURE AND EXPULSION OF MEMBERS

8. If the conduct of any member shall appear to the Executive Committee to be injurious to the interests of the Chapter, or contrary to its Constitution or By-Laws, or the Constitution or Code of Ethics of the American Institute of Architects, the Committee shall inform him thereof in writing, and if, after the member so charged shall opportunity for explanation, the committee shall still deem to require action on the part of the Chapter, the member so complained of may be censured or expelled by a vote of the majority of the Committee.

A member so expelled shall have the right of appeal from the Executive Committee at the next meeting of the Chapter following his expulsion.

After receiving written notice of such appeal, the Secretary shall notify the members in the call for the meeting of the consideration of the Committee's action as being appealed.

business of the meeting. A two-third majority of those present is necessary to reverse the action of the Committee. A motion involving censure or expulsion shall be decided by secret ballot.

ARTICLE II  
FINANCE  
INITIATION FEE

1. The initiation fee for Professional Members shall be ten dollars, payable within three months of the day of election. An election shall become void unless this fee, together with the first semi-annual due, is paid within three months of notice of same.

There shall be no initiation fee for Junior, Honorary or Corresponding members.

ANNUAL DUES

2. The annual dues to the Chapter shall be: For Professional members, six dollars; for Juniors, two dollars. There are no dues for Honorary and Corresponding members.

WHEN DUE

Dues are payable in two equal instalments, one each on the first day of January and July.

3. All dues are to be paid in advance.

NON-PAYMENT OF DUES

3. If the annual dues in any year are not paid within thirty days from the time at which they become due, the delinquent shall be notified by the Treasurer of the fact, and of the requirements of the By-Law; and should he neglect payment, without good cause until the last day of the third month then next occurring, he shall ipso facto, cease to be a member: Provided, That upon his written application, and the payment of all dues to the date thereof, the Chapter may, upon such terms as it may deem proper, remit this penalty of the By-Law, the Secretary making a minute of the

transaction. And provided further, That this penalty shall not apply to the case of a member who may be seriously ill, or absent from the country.

REMISSION OF DUES  
ON ACCOUNT OF ABSENCE  
FROM THE COUNTRY

4. Any member who has paid the annual dues for one year, and who is absent from the country for the continuous period of one year, shall be exempt from the payment of annual dues for the period of his absence, if he shall have given previous written notice to the Treasurer of his intention so to be absent. Such absentees are not to be counted as members in reckoning a quorum.

ARTICLE III

MEETINGS  
REGULAR MEETINGS

1. The regular meetings of the Chapter shall be quarterly, the first Saturday in January, April, July and October, unless otherwise arranged by the Secretary. One-third of the Professional members of the Chapter shall at all meetings constitute of quorum, except as provided in Article VIII of the Constitution.

ORDER OF  
BUSINESS

2. At the meeting of the Chapter, the order of business, so far as the character and nature of the meeting may admit, shall be as follows:

- a. Reading of the minutes of the last meeting.
  - b. Reports of Standing Committees.
  - c. Reports of Special Committees.
  - d. Election of members.
  - e. Unfinished business.
  - f. General business.
  - g. Debates on subjects of interest to the profession.
- But this order of business may be changed by a majority

of the members present at the meeting.

SPECIAL MEETINGS

3. Special meetings of the Chapter shall be called whenever the President or Vice-President shall be requested to do so by the written application of three members, setting forth the purpose of such meeting. At any such special meeting, business other than that specified in the call may be considered.

ANNUAL MEETINGS AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

4. The annual meeting shall be that held in January; at which an election shall be held for a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, and a Committee on Admissions. The vote to be by ballot, a majority of votes cast being necessary for a choice. These officials shall hold their places until their successors are elected and have signified their acceptance.

5. No member shall hold the same office for more than two successive terms.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES.

PRESIDENT

1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter. He shall appoint any officers and Committees not otherwise provided for, and perform such other duties as custom and parliamentary usage may require of him.

VICE-PRESIDENT

2. The Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall perform all the duties of the President. In the absence of both President and Vice-President at any meetings of the Chapter, a presiding officer shall be elected by the members present.

BY-LAWS

SECRETARY

3. The Secretary, who shall also serve as Treasurer, shall keep in proper books a record of the proceedings of the Chapter, a letter-book copy of all official letters written, the names and addresses of all members of the Chapter. Also a record of reports of any Committees, and other matters of importance to the Chapter. He shall notify the members of their election, and issue notices for all meetings.

The records and the correspondence, except those of the Committee on Admissions, shall, at all reasonable times, be open to the inspection of any member of the Chapter.

REPORT TO A. I. A.

The Secretary shall forward to the Secretary of the American Institute of Architects such papers as may be of general interest to the profession; make an annual report, with a list of all members of the Chapter, one month before the annual Convention, to the Secretary A. I. A., and report thereon to the Chapter at the annual meeting.

The Secretary shall be the Librarian of the Chapter.

TREASURER

4. The Secretary as Treasurer, shall collect the dues and contributions, giving receipts therefor; he shall disburse the funds on orders drawn upon him by the Chairman of the Executive Committee, retaining such orders as vouchers; he shall keep account of receipts and expenditures in records open to the inspection of members of the Executive Committee, and shall report at every annual meeting, and oftener, if required, on the state of the funds. At the end of his term of office, he shall settle his accounts with the Executive Committee, and turn over all funds,

vouchers, books and papers to his successor in office.

The Secretary shall be exempt from the annual assessment.

## COMMITTEE ON ADMISSIONS.

5. The Committee on Admissions shall consist of three Professional members. The names of proposed candidates being handed to them by the Secretary of the Chapter, it shall be the duty of this Committee to make careful inquiry as to the professional experience, moral character and merit of the candidate, and endorse their conclusions on the application as promptly as the respective cases admit, and will return same to the Secretary.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

6. The Chairman of the Committee on Admissions, together with the President, Vice-President and Secretary of the Chapter, shall constitute an Executive Committee. The President shall act as Chairman, and the Secretary shall act as Secretary of this Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

The Executive Committee shall have the duty and power to control the funds and property of the Chapter. It shall provide rooms, stationery, record-books, and all necessary accommodations and articles for the use of, and attend to the ordinary business of, the Chapter. Except in trifling matters, all expenditures shall be passed upon by the Executive Committee, drawn upon the Secretary, signed by the Chairman of the Executive Committee, and paid by the Secretary. The Executive Committee shall not, without permission of the Chapter, incur any liability exceeding the amount of unappropriated funds in the hands of the Secretary. The Executive Committee shall be subject to such instructions as the Chapter may give at any time. The Executive Committee is empowered to fill vacancies in the offices and Committees.

The Executive Committee is also to act in the case of apparent or reported conduct of members contrary to the Constitution

or By-Laws, or injurious to the interests of the Chapter, as specified before.

ARTICLE V

These By-Laws may be amended by the Chapter at any regular meeting; provided, That twenty days' notice of the proposed amendment shall have been given to each Professional Member.






