The nominee has designed many buildings in reinforced concrete with particular emphasis on smooth-ceiling construction (elimination of beams and girders).

With the economic factor of today's construction in mind and since, modern buildings most generally reveal the true structural skeleton, the nominee is at present working with Hess Goldsmith Company's research people on further development of fiberglass reinforced polyester for use on paroboloid roofs etc. It is our understanding that he will soon give a paper to the Society on the research currently developed on stressed-skin polystyrene insulated plastic for spandrels and thin-wall construction.
