
Mr. Munger has for many years been an active member of his profession enjoying the respect of his colleagues.

Mr. Harold H. Munger represents to me the arch-
type of man which I expect the Fellowship of the In-
stitute was created to identify. And, in passing, may
I say that my conception of the significance of the
honor was formed long before reading an evaluation of
the Fellowship's meaning which was recently published.
As the writer is a school man, rather than a practi-
tioner, this endorsement of the nomination of Mr. Mun-
ger for a Fellowship is intended to indicate briefly
that he has done much for the schools of architecture
in this section, - the setting forth of his accomplish-
ments in practice being left to others who will doubt-
less endorse him; however, former Cornell students of
mine, who have been associated with Mr. Munger in his
office, have made known to me his quality behind the
scenes so I might quite well venture, I think, to com-
ment on this factor of the man.

Restricting my comment to Mr. Munger's relation-
ship to the schools, especially by reason of his presi-
dency of the Ohio State Board of Examiners of Archi-
tects, permit me to say that the profession could scarce-
ly have had a man in this important position who would
