Murphy's early career in architecture was as assistant to Ernest R. Graham, head of the noted Chicago firm of Graham, Anderson, Probst & White. During his time under Graham, spanning the years 1914 until Graham's death in 1936, the following were among the principal works executed by the firm: Wrigley Building, Union Station, Merchandise Mart, Chicago Post Office, and Field Building in Chicago, the Cleveland Union Terminal Buildings in Cleveland, and the Chase Bank in New York.

Following 1936, Murphy was a principal in the firm of Shaw, Naess and Murphy (1936–1946), Naess and Murphy (1946–1962) and C. F. Murphy (1962–). Among projects executed as a principal: Prudential Building, Chicago Sun-Times and Daily News Building, Continental Companies Building, Chicago – O'Hare International Airport, addition to the Federal Reserve bank of Chicago, and in association with other firms: Chicago Federal Center complex, and Chicago Civic Center (both currently in progress).

The nominee, Charles F. Murphy, was entrusted as executor of the estate of Ernest R. Graham, prominent Chicago architect, upon the latter's death in 1936. Through foresight and capable management, Mr. Murphy was able to restore the depression-reduced values of the estate to the point where in 1956 the assets were sufficient to activate the Graham Foundation for Advanced Studies in the Fine Arts in accordance with Graham's will.

The aim of the Foundation is to further the art of architecture and arts germane thereto, principally thru assistance to gifted individuals to further their study, but also thru supporting grants for specific related projects.

The original guide lines for the Foundation were established by a seminar organized by John Ely Burchard, Dean of Humanities at M.I.T., at Aspen in 1955. Participants included Burchard, Eero and Arline Saarinen, Pietro Belluschi, Jimmy Ernst, Rudolph Arnheim, William and Catherine Wurster, William Hartmann and Murphy. In addition to the above, advisors to the Foundation have been Mies Van der Rohe, James Johnson Sweeney, Jose Luis Sert, Sigfried Giedion, Grace L. McCann Morley, Daniel Catton Rich and Philip Johnson.

Since the inception of the Foundation, Murphy has served as the president of its Board of Trustees. Among the fellowships granted have been those to the following:

In addition there have been grants to the Department of Architecture at Yale to support publication of the student magazine "Perspecta"; to the Chicago Landmark Commission for the publication of a guide book to Chicago architecture; to Columbia University for "Four Great Makers" convocation; to the University of Minnesota for publication of book on architecture; to the Society of Architectural Historians for a publication; to Allied Architectural Schools and the A.I.A. for a summer training seminar for architectural teachers, and to the State of Illinois for a study of graphics and for the organization of an Advisory Arts Council.

In addition there have been grants to the Museum of Modern Art, New York and the Art Institute of Chicago for a comprehensive exhibit of recent works of Le Corbusier and to the Smithsonian Institution for an exhibit of Alvar Aglto.

The Foundation has also instituted program of "Graham Scholars" selecting approximately 15 top students from different architectural schools each year to participate in a series of lectures and seminars at the annual Aspen Conference. Several professors from the schools have accompanied the students along with the director of the Foundation, John D. Entenza.

The Foundation has recently acquired as its permanent home the Madlener House at 4 West Burton Place, Chicago. This fine old residence now classified as something of an architectural landmark (although not yet officially named), was designed by Richard E. Schmidt and Hugh Garden. The structure was slated for demolition to make way for a new apartment house until rescued and restored by the Foundation for its headquarters.

## Wagner, architectural journal editor, dies



Walter F. Wagner: challenged architects.

Walter Frederick Wagner, Jr., long-time editor-in-chief of *Architectural Record*, died suddenly at his home in Weston, Conn., recently. He was 58 years old.

From his post at the head of one of the most prestigious architectural journals, Wagner often challenged architects to upgrade professional ethics, education, and quality in their work—from houses and housing to entire towns and cities.

Wagner, a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, was made a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects in 1984. Among his other honors were two citations for special service by the Society of American Registered Architects and a certificate for exceptional service from the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards. For his work in journalism, Wagner received a number of American Business Press Jessie H. Neal Awards and two National Magazine Awards.

He joined Architectural Record, published by McGraw-Hill, Inc., in 1965, and became editor-in-chief in 1967. Prior to that, he was editor of Popular Boating magazine and managing editor of Time-Life's House and Home.

Chicago architect Charles F. Murphy, whose firms have designed the FBI building in Washington, D.C., and Daley Center, McCormick Place and the State of Illinois building in Chicago, died at age 95. Murphy, who started his

career as a stenographer with famed Chicago architect Daniel Burnham in the early 1900s and got his architect's license after taking night courses, was most recently a partner in the firm of Murphy/Jahn. Murphy first formed his own company in 1936 with Alfred Shaw and Sigurd Naess in 1947. The firm's design credits include Chicago's Prudential Building and the the Sun-Times Building. After becoming C.F. Murphy Associates in 1958, the firm designed O'Hare International Airport, Daley Center and McCormick Place. In 1981, with the addition of partner Helmut Jahn, Murphy's firm designed the State of Illinois building, the Chicago & Northwestern train station and the Xerox Center, all in Chicago.

William H. Mueser, 85, died in Charlottesville, Va. Prior to retirement at the end of 1975, he had been associated for 52 years with Mueser Rutledge Consulting Engineers and its predecessor firms in New York City. As a partner of the firm for 40 years, he had responsibility for foundation designs for bridges, marine projects and many buildings in downtown Manhattan, including eight on Wall Street alone. During World War II, he represented his firm in the

joint venture called Dry neers, where he was invol and construction of 13 dry U.S. Navy. He was an hom of the American Society neers and a 1975 recip Moles Award.
