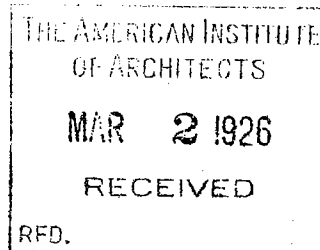

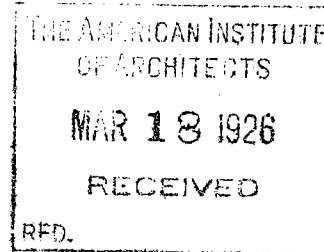

## H. K. Murphy, Was Architect in China

BRANFORD, Conn., Oct. 13--

Henry Killam Murphy, seventy-seven, formerly architectural adviser to China under Chiang Kai-shek, died yesterday at his home on Killam's Point.

Before the Japanese invasion of China in 1937 Mr. Murphy had been commissioned to design elaborate new buildings for the Chinese government at Nanking, which were to preserve the characteristics of ancient Chinese architecture, adapted to modern use. He had also designed the Yale-in-China buildings at Changsha and other university buildings, in China, as well as banks and business houses in several Far Eastern cities.

He was a native of New Haven, and was graduated from Yale University. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Rosalie Smith Exum Murphy; a brother, John Murphy, and a sister, Mrs. Edwin Whiting.

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
