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

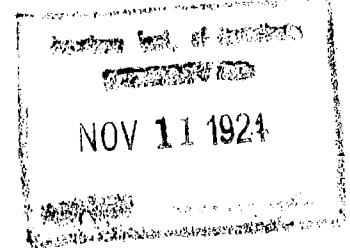

Oscar H. Murray Dies, Rhinebeck Architect Was 74

Oscar Harold Murray, 74, Rhinebeck architect who resided in Slate Quarry road, Rhinebeck, died last night in the Northern Dutchess Health center, Rhinebeck, where he had been receiving treatment since last Friday. He had been in failing health for some time, but had continued with his architectural activities.

A former partner in the architectural firm of Myers, Murray and Phillip, successor to B. G. Goodhue in New York City, for a number of years, Mr. Murray had been the supervisor for the construction of the Church of the Messiah, Rhinebeck, which the company had designed. Mr. Murray also was the architect for the Pleasant Valley Methodist church which was built a few years ago and for a new wing at the Astor home in Rhinebeck.

BORN IN GATESHEAD, Yorkshire, England, Feb. 24, 1883, the son of the late James and Georgina Worden Murray, Mr. Murray came to this country in 1906 and had made his home in Rhinebeck since 1940, going there from Mamaroneck, where he had resided for many years.

Mr. Murray was educated in private schools in England, including the Birmingham Municipal School of Art. He had conducted his architectural office at 23 Mill street, Rhinebeck, since 1940. Mr. Murray had served with the United States Army in the World War.

A member and vestryman of the Church of the Messiah, Mr. Murray also was a member of the Rhinebeck Rotary club and the American Institute of Architects.

SURVIVING ARE his wife, Mrs. Margaret Meigs Murray, whom he married in 1915; two daughters, Mrs. Barbara Dykman, Gettysburg, Pa., and Mrs. Annan Allen, Rhinebeck; four sons, Thomas R. Murray, Clifton, N. J., Technical Sergeant Michael M. Murray, with the United States Air Force in England, David J. Murray, New York City, Jonathan MacConnell Murray, with the United States Army in Miami, Fla.; nine grandchildren and a sister, Mrs. Ronald Taylor in England.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Dapson Funeral home, 65 West Market street, Rhinebeck, at 10:30 o'clock, Friday. The Rev. Richard Cartwell, rector of the Church of the Messiah, will officiate. A further service will be conducted at the Ferncliff chapel, Hartsdale, at 3 o'clock Friday.
