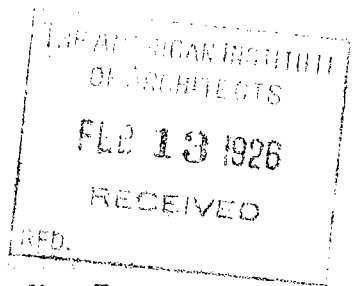

Dear Mr. Kearney;

I have just received a confidential communication from Mr. Kemper of the Institute advising me of the action of the Board of Directors regarding members who are delinquent in the payment of Institute dues.

It was directed that those members who, on December 31, 1925, were delinquent for more than one year be given until February 15, 1926, to make payment in full or to reach some agreement with the Treasurer as to future payment.
