2. Describe the nominee's achievements in education that are considered notable contributions to the advancement of the profession:

LOUISIANA TECH UNIVERSITY RUSTON, LOUISIANA

Instrumental in starting a statewide program whereby 5th year students holding Associate AIA membership status while concurrently being enrolled in I.D.P. would have state and chapter dues waived, except for meal cost.

Initiated IDP enrollment as one of four requirements to be admitted to fifth year level at Louisiana Tech University.

Was able to double number of faculty to young architectural program to a total of nine and 1/2 positions.

Was able to elevate individual faculty salaries up to a competitive level within the region.

Was able to triple "operating budget" in 1978 which initiated new Professional Services (Guest lecturers from the profession).

Initiated the "Architecture Learning Resource Center" (ALRC) which included books, pertinent architectural periodicals and audio visual equipment. In concept the ALRC was a gathering place, a living room for learning for the architecture students and faculty.

Initiated "Creative Continuum, Back to Basics", an in-depth week long intense program of "Graphic/Basic Design" for national, regional and state practitioner/educator/student participants.

Initiated and implemented a new 4 + 1 professional degree program with newly defined published goals, curriculum structure, course outlines, responsibilities and requirements. For maximum communications for students and faculty a printed document was published.

Primarily responsible for initiation of "Down Town UDAG" grant which outlined positive direction on updating and improvement of Downtown Ruston.

As member of Planning and Zoning Commission have advocated long range planning and maintaining consistency on commission on zoning changes.

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Initiated enrollment of city and all commissioners to be members of American Planning Association (APA). This has brought about more progressive thinking and immediate reference to outstanding examples nationwide in lieu of looking to West Monroe (as was done in past) for what they did.

Initiated an Alumni and Student Newsletter. "ARRIS".

AUBURN UNIVERSITY AUBURN, ALABAMA

Initiated the Architectural Extension services program as a first comprehensive such program know to exist in the region. Its approach was planned to be quite broad, encompassing not only continuing professional development opportunities for the design professionals in the state and region, but also extending to students throughout the University campus and the general public of the region.

Initiated 2 + 2 + 1 program where with a two year architectural design base, students could choose to:

- 1. Continue in Professional Architecture program five year sequence to choose a single tract:
 - A. Design Concentration
 - B. Architectural Management Concentration
 - C. Technical Concentration

- 2. Change to a Landscape Architecture five year program.
- 3. Change to an Interior Architecture four year program.
- 4. Change to a two year undergraduate strength in planning and a two year graduate degree in Regional and City Planning.

Initiated the establishment of an optional program in Architectural Management for fifth-year students, one of the first such programs at the undergraduate level in the country.

Initiated Landscape Architecture degree program.

Initiated the graduate program in Regional and City Planning in the Architecture Department.

Initiated four-year non-professional design oriented degree Bachelor of Science in Environmental Design.

Initiated semi-annual Alumni "News" to better inform practitioners and alumni what was happening in the program.

UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA NORMAN, OKLAHOMA

As executive secretary of the University's President Committee on Architecture and Environmental Design was primarily responsible to initiate new College of Environmental Design. This new college initiated interdisciplinary new programs:

- 1. 4 + 2 Master of Architecture with four distinct new programs with undergraduate degrees from (a) Environmental Design (b) Engineering (c) Arts and Science (d) General studies.
- 2. Undergraduate degree in Construction Science.
- 3. Undergraduate degree in Landscape Architecture.
- 4. Moved the undergraduate degree in Interior Design to the College of Environmental Design.
- 5. Moved the graduate degree of Regional and City Planning to the College of Environmental Design.
- 6. Initiated a research division known as "Institute for Studies in the Human Environment Inc."

Initiated Self and Professional Improvement Seminars which had great impact on students and their education. As direct result the following were achieved.

 Initiated weekly mini-seminars for practitioners, construction people, etc. to discuss the profession and related disciplines.

- 2. Initiated bi-weekly film series related to architecture and construction industry.
- 3. Initiated "Telesis" a monthly student publication.
- 4. Initiated solar design consideration for residential construction.
- 5. Initiated design and construction of 70' dia geodesic dome constructed of 2" square aluminum struts.
- 6. Initiated Operational Gaming Seminar which fostered interdisciplinary and community involvement.

ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE ARLINGTON, TEXAS

INTERN-ARCHITECT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (IDP)

As committee member and AIA chair of IDP Coordinating Committee since January 1984, it must be said that these are dynamic, energetic and serious working people. No one person initiates or carries a single banner. It is a TEAM effort. Many positive improvements have been accomplished in this time frame:

- 1. The number of states mandating the training requirements has increased from six (6) to twenty-three (23) with fourteen state registration boards accepting IDP training requirements.
- 2. It is reported by staff that an increase from 4,000 to more than 10,000 students and interns are satisfying their states' training requirements via IDP.
- 3. Participating firms increased from 700 to over 1,500 now serve as sponsors and/or advisors to IDP intern-architects.
- 4. AIA Associate Membership in this same time frame has increased from 6377 to 8636.
- 5. A new regional coordination system has been established using coordinating committee member (one AIA/one NCARB) to enhance marketing/outreach plan to grassroots and individual states.
- 6. Initiated IDP liaison network listing identifying program leadership in schools, state and local components, member firms, and registration boards. Educator advisors appointed in 87 of the 92 schools of architecture. This was personally done by Kemp by mail or telephone for ACSA would not accept the responsibility.
- 7. IDP promotion established at National AIA Convention .
- 8. IDP Seminar series developed.
- 9. ACSA representation on Coordinating Committee reestablished.
- 10. IDP Sponsor/Advisor Guidelines completely revised.
- "Target Sheets" and case studies developed for students, interns, firms, practitioners (sponsors and advisors), faculty (educator advisors), AIA components registration boards.

- 12. Revisions made to several AIA Sup-Ed Guides. New Guides developed for the 1987 AIA Handbook of Professional Practice.
- 13. Model rules developed for registration boards adopting IDP training standard.
- 14. IDP status map revised to show registration boards' actions re: IDP training standard.

SYNOPSIS:

"A PROPOSAL, COLLEGE OF ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN, UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA"

Oklahoma was becoming an Urban State, with 80 percent of its people living in towns, cities or metropolitan centers.

The problems and opportunities of modern urban life present vastly different human and technical problems than did the relatively simple living patterns of the recent past.

The deterioration of vital phases of our natural and human environments, including inadequacies of conditions for living in our urban and rural communities, have become prime national concerns.

The accelerating changes of technology, coupled with the dilemma of an exploding population in flux, have made obsolete many of the long established definitions and responsibilities of the traditional specialist-professional, often replacing him with a multi-disciplinary team.

It was the desire and obligation of professionals in aspects of Environmental Design and in allied disciplines at the University of Oklahoma to meet squarely the present and future difficulties involved in the search for genuine solution to problems of man's environment in the state and nation with maximum relevance and effectiveness.

We found that existing administrative patterns within the University, based in part on the problems, assumptions and definitions of another age, effectively limit many of our efforts to accomplish these goals.

IT WAS RESPECTFULLY REQUESTED THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF REGENTS APPROVE AND ACTIVATE PROMPTLY A NEW FUNCTIONAL DIVISION OF THE UNIVERSITY TO BE IDENTIFIED AS THE COLLEGE OF ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN.

These written proceedings and recommendations were directly responsible in separating the Department of Architecture from the College of Engineering thus allowing the formation of the NEW COLLEGE OF ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN.

This established a new four plus two (4+2) Master of Architecture program with a new four interdisciplinary entry. Additionally, new programs in Construction, Interior Design and Landscape Architecture were initiated.

SYNOPSIS:

"EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN (EDP) 1979, AN NAAB ACCREDITATION REPORT"

This new method of documenting the educational development of the first professional architecture degree program at Louisiana Tech University as a "pilot school" addressed new areas of information and specific concerns.

The new format was divided into three basic sections: 1. Introduction, 2. Assessment and 3. Description. Within the Assessment section were very specific items to be addressed, i.e. Introduction, Educational Intentions, Self-evaluation, Program Strengths, Program Weaknesses, Suggestions and Responses. The most significant within this category were The Criteria for Program Evaluation (7-Criteria) and Intentions and Strategies.

The Description section dealt with narrative concerning Students, Faculty Processes, The Educational Process Facilities and Governance.

As the result of this oversized cumbersome document coupled with an on site Visitation a second period of accreditation for the new program at Louisiana Tech University Department of Architecture was received!

The EDP system proved to be too extensive and cumbersome and was discontinued by $\mathtt{NAAB}_{\:\raisebox{1pt}{\text{\circle*{1.5}}}}$
