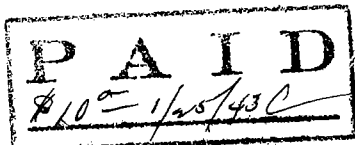

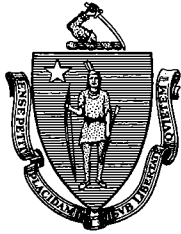

Gentlemen:

You have before you a proposal to advance to fellowship Mr. Eugene F. Kennedy, Jr., of the firm of Maginnis & Walsh, Boston, Massachusetts, for service to the Institute and for design.

Mr. Kennedy has just finished a term as President of the Massachusetts State Association of Architects. As you know, after a long period of deliberation, the Boston Society of Architects relinquished its role as the Chapter of the American Institute of Architects here, and the Massachusetts State Association became the Chapter.

There has for many years been a cleavage in the profession in Boston which seemed to follow social lines, with traces of religious antagonism showing. While many expressed themselves as not wanting the Boston Society of Architects to represent the whole State, the antagonism ran deeper than that and found its roots in the history of this region.

OBITUARIES

Eugene Kennedy, 82; architect

Eugene F. Kennedy of Boston, a noted Boston architect, died Friday in New England Deaconess Hospital after a brief illness. He was 82.

For many years, Mr. Kennedy was a partner in the Boston firm of Maginnis and Walsh and Kennedy. He spent most of his career there and in 1969 the firm became Kennedy and Kennedy Architects when his brother was made his chief partner in the firm. He retired in 1984.

A few of his better-known works are the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C., the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in Baltimore, Md., Carney Hospital in Dorchester and many Catholic churches and schools across the country. He also designed the front doors and part of the altar of St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

In 1974, he was named by Pope Paul VI a Knight of St. Gregory the Great. The presentation was made in the building Mr. Kennedy himself had designed — the National Shrine — by its director, Msgr. John Murphy, on behalf of the former pontiff.

Though he didn't formally graduate from high school, Mr. Kennedy studied at prominent architectural institutions both in the United States and abroad. He did however, eventually attain a high school equivalency diploma at the age of 60 because he needed it in order to become a licensed architect in the state of New York.

From 1920 to 1924, he studied at the Boston Architectural Center and then won the Rotch Traveling Scholarship, a prestigious architectural accomplishment. At 20, he was the youngest person to win the award, which allows aspiring architects to study in Europe for two years.

Later, Mr. Kennedy also studied at the American Academy in Rome, and Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris.

He was a fellow of the American Institute of Architects, a member of the Boston Society of Architects and the Massachusetts State Association of Architects and was an elected associate of the National Academy of Design.

He was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., and lived for many years in Milton and Boston.

He leaves his wife, Jayne (McGuire); two sons, Peter M. of Pensacola, Fla., and Michael F. Kennedy of Brookline; two daughters, Roselyn K. McMillin of Centerville and Maura K. McCaw of

Scarsdale, N.Y.; two brothers, Arthur of Wellesley and Lee Kennedy of Duxbury; a sister, Marie Lyons of Wellesley; and 13 grandchildren.

A funeral Mass will be said at 10 a.m. Monday, Nov. 10, in St. Mary of the Assumption Church, Brookline. Interment will be in Holyhood Cemetery in Brookline.
