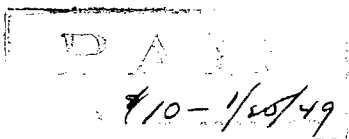

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Expo '74 site architect Thomas Adkison dies

Prominent Spokane architect and civic leader Thomas R. Adkison, 68, who served as executive site architect for Expo '74 and enhanced Spokane's architectural character, died of cancer Wednesday at his home.



Adkison

Charged with creating the world's fair site that became Riverfront Park, Mr. Adkison helped transform Spokane's riverfront from a railroad district into a revitalized downtown park.

The park created when he designed Expo '74 was one of his favorite works.

Ten years after Spokane's fair, he served as one of 10 community leaders on an advisory committee to oversee Spokane's citizen participation program for planning the future of Riverfront Park.

He also was one of the authors of a site evaluation report in 1984 for a Spokane Metro Center. Long an advocate of a "strong central city," Mr. Adkison believed a recent design plan for the North River Bank would enhance the city's central core and have a "significant impact upon existing businesses and cultural and civic facilities.

The son of former Idaho legislator James Loyal Adkison and Adda Adkison, he was born in Whitebird, Idaho, in 1917 and came to Spokane in 1927. He was a graduate of Lewis and Clark High School and the University of Washington.

A Spokane architect since 1947, he headed the firm Adkison Leigh Sims & Cuppage Architects for many years. The firm earlier was known as Adkison Architects.

Mr. Adkison was principal in charge of the recent Review Tower project. Of that project, he wrote: "Each of us, when thinking of it, realizes that any work of art must be prepared to speak with its own voice; a voice that must be experienced; a voice not easily explained.

"Architecture is a specialized form of functional art. No one person is responsible for a building in its entirety. It is produced by a great number of ordinary people and is, one hopes, understood and appreciated by a great number of ordinary people."

His work ranges from Spokane's U.S. Courthouse, to churches — St. Stephen's Episcopal and Emmanuel Presbyterian — to homes throughout the city.

Among his architectural projects in education are Gonzaga University's John F. Kennedy Pavilion and the campus entry — the Boone Avenue Mall; Joel E. Ferris High School, Fort Wright College's Regis Hall, the Arts and Humanities Building and the Mathematics Building at Whitman College and the Seeley Mudd Chapel and Aquatic Center at Whitworth College.

Mr. Adkison was elected to the College of Fellows, American Institute of Architects (AIA), in 1978. Fellowship in the AIA is a lifetime honor bestowed for outstanding contribution to the profession.

Mr. Adkison served on the Washington State AIA Council and was a past president of the group's Spokane chapter. He also served on the urban design and housing committee of the AIA, representing Washington, Idaho, Montana and Oregon.

In 1969, he was named by then-Gov. Dan Evans to a five-year term on the newly created state Board of Registration for Landscape Architects.

He was a charter member of the Planning Association of Washington, served on the board of directors of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and served as chairman of the Spokane Metropolitan Transportation Study Citizens Advisory Committee.

In 1970, Mr. Adkison was named by the Washington State Highway Department as one of five members of an urban highway design team to advise in the design and location of freeway facilities in the area.

He was selected in 1975 by Spokane Unlimited as one of four consultants to help produce a new comprehensive plan for the central Spokane business district.

Long active in civic affairs, he served more than 10 years on the Spokane Park Board — including two terms as president — and was with Spokane's Plan Commission from 1968 to 1972.

He also served with the Gover-

nor's Urban Affairs Council, Washington State Community College District 17 art steering committee, Spokane Art School board, Eastern Washington State Historical Society, Spokane-Nishinomiya Sister City Society, KSPS Television Educational Advisory Panel and Economics Development Council.

Mr. Adkison was a past president of the Spokane Symphony Orchestra, a former member of the board of the Inland Empire Zoological Society, a former chairman of the Spokane Arts Commission, a director of the Spokane Arts Foundation and a former member of the board of Forward Spokane.

He was named honorary chairman for WAMPUM in 1985 for his years of continued interest and work with the arts in Spokane.

He was co-chairman of the Spokane Centennial Expo '74 Anniversary Committee and served as co-chairman of the Citizens for Swimming Pools during Spokane's 1983 swimming pool bond issue campaign.

He was active in senior citizen and youth programs, and was a member of the Kiwanis Club. He also was a member of the Pacific Northwest Ski Association and had served as secretary of the Spokane Ski Racing Association.

In a recent interview, Mr. Adkison said: "From my late father I received a sense of duty toward your community. I truly believe there is a subservience the individual should feel and observe and demonstrate with regard to his city."

Survivors include his wife, Kath-

leen, at the home; two sons, Drexel Adkison of Vashon Island, Wash., and Craig Adkison of Kirkland, Wash.; three daughters, Cheryl Adkison of Port Townsend, Wash., Sarah Stevens of Rumsey, Calif., and Kristen Adkison of Lake Tahoe, Calif.; one stepdaughter, Helen Braden of Salem, Ore.; one stepson, John VanDerwerker of Laguna Beach, Calif.; his stepmother, Eunice Adkison of Grangeville, Idaho; and nine grandchildren.

The family suggests memorials to the American Cancer Society.

The park created when he designed Expo '74 was one of his favorite works.

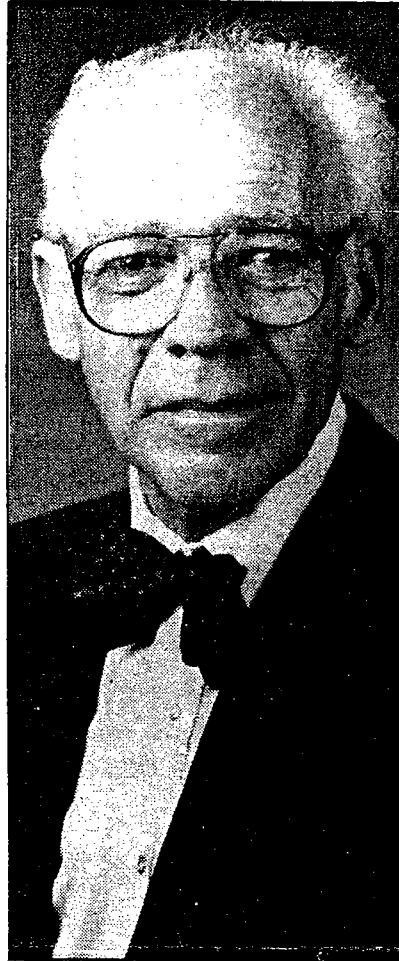
