Dear Mr. Anderson:

With regard to your membership in The Institute, we must advise that under the By-laws every corporate member must be, also, a member of a local chapter and state organization.

We note that you were elected a member in 1925, and without checking back in our records for that year (which are in storage) it has occurred to us that you may be eligible for Membership Emeritus. Such members must be seventy years of ago or over; or, incapacitated and unable to engage in any other vocation; provided, further, that they have been members of the A.I.A. for at least fifteen years. If you could qualify for such election, let us know and we will send a form to you to be signed and returned.

Members Emeriti are permitted to retain all the rights and privileges of active members, while being exempted from the payment of further Institute, chapter, and state organization dues.

The only other alternatives would be to write to the Executive Secretary of the New York Chapter, Mrs. Jane C. Short, 115 East 40th Street, New York 16, N. Y., to ascertain if the Chapter has any provision which would cover your case; or to have your chapter assignment transferred to another chapter in your vicinity, should you reside, for example, in the territory of the Long Island Society of Architects, the Brooklyn, Queens, Bronx, or some such chapter whose dues might not be as high as those of the New York Chapter.

Let us know if we can do anything along the lines of any of the above suggestions.
