In the case of Mr. George I. Lovatt, Jr., who has been nominated for Public Service and Service to The Institute, the Jury feels that there is not enough evidence on hand showing just what he accomplished while holding the offices and memberships listed.

The Jury would like to call to your attention that these two categories are the most difficult ones to pass upon, in that the mere holding of offices, no matter how numerous and regardless of the amount of time an individual has spent in such work, is not sufficient grounds for the award of a Fellowship. There should be shown accomplishments which would not have occurred had he not been in these positions.

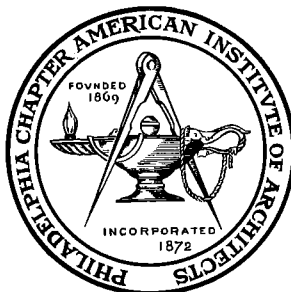


Your letter has called to my attention the fact that the Chapter By-Laws,






