

Houston Chronicle 3 STAR 39 English (Copyright 2002 Houston Chronicle) Lavone Dickensheets Andrews, one of the city's first woman architects, who once owned and restored a 500-year-old Irish castle, **died** Tuesday in her Houston home. She was 89.

The only woman to win a degree in architecture in 1935 at the Rice Institute, she found work with Houston architect John Staub, creator of Bayou Bend, the home of Houston cultural benefactor Ima Hogg.

"In those days," Andrews once said, "it was difficult (for a woman) to be taken seriously as an **architect.** They wanted me to type the specifications."

She surmounted this problem, however, by asserting herself. "And maybe that part of my nature has helped me to be successful **architect**," she once said.

In 1940, she converted a Houston facility owned by Anderson, Clayton & Co. - the former international cotton firm - into a gun- barrel plant as part of the emerging defense effort.

After World War II, she opened a private practice, designing De Zavala Elementary School in the Houston Independent School District and the North Side Public Health Center. She also oversaw renovation of an older building to house the Naval Historical Museum in Washington, D.C.

In 1948, she married Mark Edwin Andrews, a native Houstonian and lawyer who at the time was assistant secretary of the Navy. After Andrews left that post in 1949, the couple returned to Houston from Washington and thereafter devoted themselves to their company, Ancon Oil & Gas. Lavone Andrews was vice president of the firm.

In the 1960s, on a pleasure trip to Ireland, the Andrewses visited the ruins of Knappogue Castle in County Clare. The castle, part of which dates to 1467, had fallen into ruins during Ireland's civil war of 1919-1921.

"My parents fell in love with it and decided to take it on," said the couple's son, Mark Edwin Andrews III of New York City.

Although the Andrewses bought the castle, the Irish government helped with the expense of the restoration, which took several years.

After Mark Andrews **died** in 1992, the castle was sold to the Irish government. It is now an important tourist attraction, featuring medieval banquets with dancing and music that celebrate the Celtic past.

Texas to Lavone Dickensheets was born in Beaumont, the daughter of a newspaperman, Charles Dickensheets, who came to write about the emerging oil business. Impressed with the prospects for the new industry, Dickensheets abandoned journalism and went into the oil business.

In 1929, his daughter enrolled at Rice Institute, where, during her undergraduate days she devoted herself to dramatics, starring in student productions and serving as president of the school's dramatic club.

"I just got through architecture by the skin of my teeth," she said.

Andrews was a trustee of the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, the Byzantine Institute in Washington and the YWCA World Service Council.

She is survived by her son.
