The Gold Medal for 1957 will be awarded to Louis Skidmore of New York in recognition of his leadership in the formation and conduct of an outstanding firm which has made major contributions to the architecture of this nation. With unusual skill and imagination, Skidmore, Owings and Merrill has utilized fully the resources of contemporary building technology.

The firm has received many honors for its buildings and an extremely high quality of architecture is evident in all of its work. Skidmore, with his partners, successfully built up a large organization and developed procedures which permit the focussing of architectural talent simultaneously on a variety of projects in many parts of the country. In so doing, they have broadened the dimensions of architectural practice.

Former AIA President Ralph Walker of New York is to be awarded the special Centennial Gold Medal in recognition of his distinguished accomplishments in architecture, his outstanding service to the Institute and the profession, his leadership in related fields of education and the arts, and for his devoted and continuing efforts to encourage the free interchange of ideas among men of good will throughout the world.

It seemed to the AIA Board of Directors that the unique contributions made by Walker over the years would be recognized most fittingly by the Institute through the creation of a special honor to be given only once -- on the great occasion of the Centennial.

This will confirm and perhaps clarify the verbal statement which I made to you earlier this year.

After ten years of continuous chairmanship of a national committee, AIA, I feel I should turn at least part of my efforts outside my practice to other areas of interest.

These last two years have required particularly an enormous amount of my personal time which I have given only at the expense of my practice and my family.

In one respect I feel I am asking relief before the completion of the task I originally hoped to see accomplished. At the Point Clear meeting of the Board, AIA, I pointed out the apparent need for developing "Aids to Practice", and a program covering this development was proposed. This program is not completed.

The following year during the reorganization of the Institute's Committee structure the Office Practice Committee as presently constituted was established. This committee took on the responsibility of four former committees and was charged with the following in the order of priority named:

- . 1. Completion and securing the adoption of Document 330.
 - 2. Restudy and revision or rewriting of Contract Documents
 - 3. Rewriting of the Handbook of Architectural Practice
 - 4. Development of Aids to Practice
 - 5. Responsibility for Standardized Accounting for Architects

Other responsibilities have been added from time to time. The work that has been involved with this large and heavy program has forced postponement of certain items until others have been completed.

As a natural result the original program as outlined to develop "Aids to Practice" has been deferred some years. For this reason the original program in which I was very much interested has not been completed. It is just now being gotten under way. During the last Steering Committee meeting we set up this program anew and I am now in the process of allocating the work to task forces.

I shall continue to retain my interest in the whole area of Architectural Practice and hope I may continue to be of service to the Institute in connection therewith, but in some more limited capacity than during the last two years. I am particularly interested in assisting in obtaining industry acceptance of the documents which have been developed by the Office Practice Committee and which have been reviewed by the Board Committee chaired by Mr. Philip Will, Jr. I am also anxious to have Standardized Accounting for Architects appared and its use expanded to an ever greater number of Architectural firms.



I have just talked with the Jury of Fellows advising it of the Board's action concerning Dave Baer's fellowship, as a former winner of the Kemper Award.

Reg Roberts is on the Jury and commented, from the Texas viewpoint, that he hoped the Houston Chapter would not be too upset. I explained the trouble you and Director Harrell had taken to assure yourselves that such would not be the case. He was still somewhat querulous. However, Dan Schwartzman was also present and had served under Dave Baer as vice chairmen of a committee. He spoke very strongly on Dave's behalf, admitting his personality problems.

The Jury said it hoped it would be possible to withhold the announcement of Dave's Fellowship until all newly elected Fellows are announced in the Spring, at which time Dave's name would appear as having been elected.
