I have your favour of the 16th of December and have been hoping to answer same before and I beg of you to accept my apologies.

I am going to ask a favour which you may not be able to grant although I feel sure you will want to. I have had two very lean years partly due (in fact largely due) to some considerable sacrifices I have made for the Architectural profession of this State. You will recall that two years^{ago} after a prolonged effort we got the Legislature to pass a License Law governing and regulating the practice of Architecture. As I took a leading part in the securing of this legislation the Governor saw fit to make me the presiding member of the Board of Examiners of Architects. The work connected with the administration of that Law has been of such proportions and the remuneration connected therewith so small that it has caused me considerable loss financially. I have tried to resign but the Architects of the State have urged me to stay on a little longer in order that some changes could be made in the Statute and the operation of same be perfected before I turned the job over to someone else.

I am just getting out of the woods and feel that if you could give me a short time longer I can make the necessary arrangements to get square with the Institute again. We have been trying to start a Chapter in the State, and it is badly needed, and I would hate to find myself in the position of not being able to join such a Chapter when I had done a fair share to establish its value to the profession.

The facts connected with the situation in which I find myself can be verified by writing to any of the Institute members resident in the State who are intimately acquainted with what I have stated above.

I would not ask you or expect you to do any more than you are permitted to do and have hesitated to write this letter accordingly. But if you can hold on to me a little longer I think I can prove to the Institute that it was worth while.

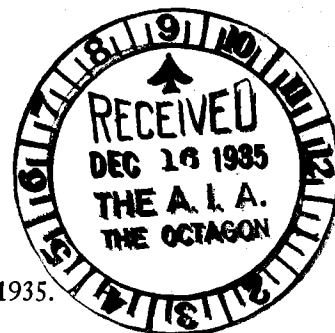

November 30, 1935.

To EACH MEMBER OF THE INSTITUTE
DELINQUENT IN PAYMENT OF DUES:

This is a final notice to each member who is in default for dues, bringing to his attention the fact that if his indebtedness be not paid on or before December 31, 1935, his membership in the Institute shall terminate ipso facto on that date, as provided in the By-laws.

This notice is given in conformity with the By-laws and with the action of the Sixty-sixth Convention (1934) which reduced drastically the amounts owed by members in default; permitted the balance to be paid in any way that they preferred; permitted them to remain as members until December 31, 1935, and fixed that date as the limit beyond which delinquent members could not be carried.

Each member in arrears has received four statements of account during the current year, the last as of November 1, 1935.

The Board of Directors sincerely hopes that each member in default will take the action necessary to preserve his membership in the Institute and the Chapter to which he is assigned.

The above notice was not sent on the date noted because of the impending meeting of the Board of Directors on December 5th. At that meeting the matter of defaulted dues was considered with relation to the financial condition of the profession, reluctance to terminate memberships, the effect of terminations upon Chapters, the resolution of the 1934 Convention and the general interests of the Institute.

The action of the Board was to extend the time fixed for payment of defaulted dues from December 31, 1935, to January 31, 1936, in the hope that the extended period would enable more members to meet their obligations, failing which the memberships must automatically terminate.



Dear Mr. Smay:-

On November 9th Kemper was asked this question -
"Does a man have to pay his dues promptly each year in order
to come within the category of the ten consecutive years men-
tioned in the By-Laws?" His reply dated November 11th reads
as follows:-

"A man does have to pay his dues promptly - that is, in
the year in which they are due - in order to be within
the By-law provision which reads:

'Chapter III, Article 1, Section 1:

A corporate member may be advanced to a fellow-
ship if he is in good standing in The Institute at
the time of his nomination for advancement and has
been so for not less than ten consecutive years im-
mediately prior to his nomination**.

There is one exception, as follows: The Board ruled that
any nominee for fellowship, who owed Institute dues dur-
ing the five-year period between January, 1931, and Decem-
ber, 1935, and who had paid all of such dues on or before
January 31, 1936, should be considered as having been in
good standing, so far as the payment of dues was concerned
for that five-year period. A copy of that ruling, in
the form of a resolution, is enclosed.

Mr. Ingham will be here tomorrow, in advance of the Board
meeting, and we are submitting your letter to him with
a copy of this reply, in case he wishes to supplement the
above."

On November 29th Kemper gives the following additional information:

"We took up with The Secretary the question of good standing with respect to those proposed for advancement to Fellowship.

He pointed out that a corporate member to be advanced to Fellowship must have been in good standing in The Institute at the time of his nomination for not less than ten consecutive years immediately prior to his nomination. This general rule and a relevant resolution of The Board were sent to you in a previous letter.

Apparently there is no way of waiving the requirement except through an amendment of the By-laws."

Dear Mr. Ingham:

Due to inquiries concerning eligibility of members for advancement to fellowship, we need a clarification, in the light of the following references:

1. Chapter III, Article 1, Section 1.

"A corporate member may be advanced to a fellowship if he is in good standing in The Institute at the time of his nomination for advancement and has been so for not less than ten consecutive years immediately prior to his nomination," etc.

2. Convention Action - 1934

"Default Period for Dues Extended.

"Resolved, That The Board of Directors, at its discretion, be and hereby is authorized to defer the time fixed for any default of dues, subsequent to January 1, 1931, but not beyond December 31, 1935, and all members affected by any such deferment shall be carried on the rolls without default for the period of such deferment."

3. The Board, under this authorization, adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, The sixty-sixth convention authorized The Board of Directors to defer the time fixed for any default of dues subsequent to January 1, 1931, but not beyond December 31, 1935, and provided that all members affected by any such deferments should be carried on the rolls without default for the period of deferment; be it

"Resolved, That all dues of members in default prior to April 1, 1934, and all dues of members that may become defaulted

subsequent to March 31, 1934, and prior to January 1, 1935, be and hereby are deferred until December 31, 1935; and The Secretary be and hereby is instructed not to send the final notice of default to such members at the close of this fiscal year.
(105-B-5-34)

4. A memorandum by The Treasurer in THE OCTAGON for June, 1934, contains the following sections:

"Every member who has paid less than \$25.00 for the 3-year period, 1931 to 1933 inclusive, may pay the difference between the amount he paid and the \$25.00, in whole or in installments, until the amount owed by him is liquidated. Such installments may be as low as \$5.00 annually."

5. The Board at its meeting in December, 1935, under the heading "Good Standing before The Jury of Fellows," adopted the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That The Jury of Fellows be and hereby is instructed that a nominee for a fellowship who owed The Institute for dues for any period during said five years, beginning January 1, 1931, and ending December 31, 1935, and who paid all such indebtedness on or before January 31, 1936, is and has been in good standing so far as payment of dues is concerned for the said period of five consecutive years."

QUESTION: What is the status of a corporate member proposed on January 1, 1930 for advancement to fellowship whose ten-year record of good standing with respect to the payment of dues is unimpaired except that subsequent to January 31, 1936 he was still indebted for dues on account of the three-year period of 1931-33 which indebtedness he was still paying off - in installments of \$5.00 a year - as billed?

This question has already arisen in two cases and will arise in others. Therefore, we would appreciate your guidance and are sending a copy of this memorandum to Mr. Bergstrom.

My dear Joe:

Yours of the 18th received and I am grateful for the persistence with which you are working to clear such obstacles as yet remain and are likely to retard or defeat the Oklahoma Chapter's action in unanimously proposing me for a fellowship in the Institute.

Ed Kemper's statement of my account for dues with the Institute (if I read figures correctly) shows that I am paid up to date. It also shows that during those critical years referred to in the last two paragraphs of his letter I took advantage of the generous action of the Institute in allowing me among others to pay our arrears in small amounts added to the regular dues. Pursuant thereto I paid as and when I was billed for the same. I am sure that had the Octagon known at the time that there was a possibility my chapter would want to propose my name for a fellowship, then in billing me for these dues Mr. Kemper would have undoubtedly warned me of any risk to which such proposal might be subjected by reason of rules adopted by the Institute Directors.

Of course such a situation could not be anticipated, consequently I necessarily and gratefully availed myself of the generous terms extended to me by the Institute in complete ignorance of the fatal circumstances involved.

The irony of the position in which I find myself (unless the milk of human kindness has not entirely evaporated) lies in the fact that at this critical time I was, by correspondence and otherwise, exerting myself to the utmost with W.P.A., other Federal Boards and City Commissioners in an effort to secure a reasonable and fair distribution of Federal and Federal aided work for deserving and at that time destitute architects. You will remember that the Civic Center buildings of Oklahoma City were to be awarded to one firm and the Government work at Fort Sill was to be done by the War Department at Washington. In this I was quite successful as these buildings were divided among several architects, among them several members of our chapter. To enumerate: Leon Senter was commissioned to design the Administration building at Fort Sill, I was awarded the Military

Chapel; Joe Parr, George Winkler, C. L. Monnot, Guy Reid, B. G. Noftger, J. D. Jeffers; Clair Drury and myself were awarded buildings in connection with the Oklahoma City Civic Center. The five names underlined benefited so much financially and in prestige that they were later able to apply and become members of the Institute. In addition there were several other architects, not members of the Institute who were also benefited and who are now quite prosperous. W. H. Vahlberg, Tom Bramblett, Ed Gahl, and W. H. Schumacher. There was some excuse therefore in me finding myself unable, with the best intentions in the world, to meet some rules and especially those unknown to me, or anticipate the favors which my chapter subsequently extended.

It is embarrassing to me to write you in regard to this matter as it is so personal. I do so only at your most earnest and emphatic request. You have my permission to use any or every part of this letter which may appear to you as helping to clear up my terrible record.

Before my time in Oklahoma, I have learned that he was largely responsible for the formation of the Oklahoma Chapter and is, I believe, one of its charter members. Through his efforts also, the state license law was obtained. He also took active part in the formation of the State Society of Architects and has been president of all these organizations. Since I have been in Oklahoma I have heard him speak eloquently with tears in his eyes to uphold the honor and the dignity of the profession. He has been untiring in his efforts to uphold its traditions and ethics. He has sacrificed his time which might have been spent more profitably toward pushing his own practice. In the last year or so it was to his credit that the Construction Industries League of Oklahoma City was established. He has been a tireless civic worker in addition to his activities in the profession of architecture.





Dear Charles:

Replying to your letter of January 20, regarding Kemper's letter of January 18, concerning the good standing of nominees for fellowship.

The provisions of the by-laws and the actions of the Board and convention seem clear on the point involved. The actions were as follows:

1. The dues for 1931, 1932 and 1933 were consolidated at \$25.00 total.
2. Those who had not paid the \$25.00 by December 31, 1933 were subject to suspension, but the Convention in 1934 deferred their suspension and good standing until December 31, 1935 (paragraphs 2 and 3 of Kemper's letter).
3. All who owed any part of the \$25.00 after December, 1935 would have been automatically suspended on that date, but the action of the Board (paragraph 5 of Kemper's letter) permitted one month of grace.
4. The Treasurer's memo of June 1934 did not affect good standing; Its purpose and effect was to keep the member on the rolls and not terminate his membership because of that particular default.

As the convention in 1934 fixed the time of default for the cases involved, the problem is to find a way to declare the member in good standing.

Would you consider the Board has the general power to declare that those who completed their \$25.00 payment without lapse of any \$5.00 installment had completed such payment as of January 31, 1936? It would seem that might be in their power, though counsel might hold otherwise. The Board has the power to remit dues, retroactively, and the suggested declaration would seem not to presume a greater authority.

The proposed action would apply to all members within its perview, and so be general in its application. Undoubtedly it would be generally approved. Hence, if you think the conclusion at all reasonable, perhaps the Executive Committee would act and have its action ratified by the Board (it would take a two-thirds vote of the Board I think and so the Executive Committee could not act finally). I believe neither you nor I would want to assume it. What do you think?

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

To the Jury of Fellows:

Gentlemen:

Supporting our request for granting a Fellowship to Mr. Leonard H. Bailey, we respectfully submit the following:

At the age of 14 years he was Articled to the office of Mr. John A. Gill Knight, A.R.I.B.A. of 21 Godliman Street, St. Pauls Church Yard, London, England. During the last two years of this period and for two years following he studied Architecture and Building Construction in the school of architecture connected with the London Polytechnic Institute from which he graduated. He was employed for three years in the office of Ernest Flint, F.R.I.B.A. of 80 Coleman Street, London, England where he had a large and varied experience as a draftsman and the planning of many important buildings executed by this firm. At the age of 21, he left this employment and came to the U. S. A. coming direct to Oklahoma City, Okla. He became associated with A. J. Williams, who was at that time State Architect. During the 18 months he was thus employed he assisted in designing and supervising the erection of buildings for the State University at Norman, Oklahoma; St. Pauls Cathedral, Oklahoma City, and other prominent buildings. After severing his connections with Mr. Williams in 1904, he entered into business for himself and has since then designed a large number of highly creditable buildings of all types throughout the State of Oklahoma. His work has included such buildings as the \$1,500,000 Masonic Temple, two 600 room hotels, several large churches, among which might be noted the \$250,000 Wesley M. E. Church in Oklahoma City and the \$100,000 Military Chapel at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and the \$1,000,000 City Hall at Oklahoma City. He has also designed many of our larger grade and high school buildings and business blocks. He was one of the Senior Architects who designed the \$3,500,000 housing project in Oklahoma City. He has been very active and has had much to do with the development of Architecture and the building industry in this State.

His work has long placed him among the leading Architects of this part of the country, a fact generally recognized amongst the members of his chosen profession, who have honored him on many occasions and now seek to have him elected to a Fellowship in the American Institute of which he has been an active member for many years. For six years he served as President of the State Society of Architects. He was later appointed by Governor Trapp as a member of the State Board of Architects

immediately following the creation of said Board by the State Legislature in 1925. He was elected its first President serving six years as such. He has been appointed by each succeeding Governor since that date and is the only one of those originally appointed who is still a member of the Board. Mr. Bailey is a charter member and has served two years as President of the Oklahoma Chapter of the A. I. A. and is now its secretary-treasurer. He has represented our Chapter several times as its delegate to the National Convention of the A. I. A. While the facts stated above indicate that Mr. Bailey has enjoyed a highly creditable, prominent and active career as a practicing architect, there is one phase of his service to the profession which emphatically claims our respect and for which we feel deeply obligated. He has labored more than any other architect in raising the standard of architectural practice in this State and has constantly been identified in every movement looking to this end. He was largely instrumental in forming the State Society of Architects. He led the fight through several succeeding sessions of the Legislature for a registration law beginning with the State Constitutional Convention in 1907 until in 1925 when we secured the passage of this important statute. During this long and at times almost hopeless period he persisted in his efforts and gave generously of his time, money and talents to finally secure the passage of this much needed legislation. Many of the younger architects who are now successfully practicing here and elsewhere have received their inspiration and much of their knowledge from having worked as draftsmen in Mr. Bailey's office.

Mr. Bailey has on many occasions addressed the Architectural students at the University of Oklahoma, and A. & M. College, and in many ways has evidenced his deep interest in their work. He has served as a member of the committee appointed to grade their work and they have benefited by his advice and criticism of their drawings. In every way he has consistently shown a deep interest in their studies and as a consequence these students frequently go to him for council and advice.

He has been prominently connected with all kinds of Civic activity, a few of these as follows:

Co-author of the Oklahoma City Building Code, Chairman of C. of C. Fire Prevention Committee two years, President of the Welfare Board two years, President of the Oklahoma City Rotary Club and County Chairman of the Four Minute Men during the War. He was President of the Allied Architects who designed the new City Hall and the Jail Buildings erected in Oklahoma City's Civic Center. He was also a Senior member of the Associated Architects, who were commissioned by the U. S. Government to design the \$3,500,000 Federal Housing scheme now completed in Okla. City.

BY-LAW PROVISIONS AND RULES OF PROCEDURE CONCERNING
ADVANCEMENT TO FELLOWSHIP.

ADDRESS COMMUNICATIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN, THE JURY OF FELLOWS
The Octagon, Washington, D. C.

BY-LAWS OF THE INSTITUTE.

Chapter II, Article 1. General Conditions of Fellowship.

Section 1. Qualifications.

(a) Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects is conferred upon a member who is a citizen of the United States who, in the opinion of an authorized jury of fellows, shall have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession in design, construction, literature, education, or public service.

Section 2. Prerequisite.

(a) Membership in the Institute for not less than ten years shall be a prerequisite to fellowship.

Section 3. Jury of Fellows.

(a) The Jury of Fellows shall consist of six fellows appointed by the President, two of whom shall serve for periods of one, two, and three years, respectively, and until their successors are appointed. The President shall appoint the chairman of the Jury, and shall fill all vacancies occurring in the Jury of Fellows by death, resignation, expiration of term or otherwise.

Section 4. Recommendations for Fellowship.

(a) Method. Any group of five or more members may recommend to the Jury for consideration the name of a member whom they deem qualified for fellowship. Such recommendation shall contain a brief statement of the notable service or achievements which, in the opinion of the nominators, justify the nomination.

(b) Supporting Data. Names of nominees for fellowship shall be submitted with full and explicit data to the Jury of Fellows on forms prepared for this purpose. The Jury shall then request from the chapter officials, the Directors of the Institute, and such other sources as it deems necessary privileged communications relating to the qualifications of the nominees. All recommendations shall remain on file with the Jury of Fellows for at least twelve months prior to final action.

Section 5. Rules of Procedure.

(a) The Jury shall formulate rules for its procedure subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Article 2. Election to Fellowship.

Section 1. Procedure.

(a) Election. Election to fellowship shall be by the Jury of Fellows. Fellows may be elected at any regular meeting of the Jury of Fellows.

(b) Method. Such election shall be by ballot. Four affirmative votes shall be necessary to elect.

(c) Announcements. The names of all fellows so elected shall be announced to the convention.

Article 3. Nomenclature.

Section 1. Nomenclature.

(a) Fellowship in the Institute shall be designated by the initials "F. A. I. A."

RULES OF PROCEDURE.

1. A meeting of the Jury of Fellows may be held at the call of the Chairman, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, and in any event this meeting should occur at least 60 days prior to the date of the Convention.

2. Suggestions to the Jury for advancement to Fellowship may be made as stated in the By-laws.

3. The validity of any objection raised to any candidate shall rest solely with the Jury, and all communications shall be considered only as informative data.

4. The Jury shall file with the archives of the Institute the original recommendation and a statement of its action with

the reasons for election in each case. Privileged communications shall not be preserved.

5. Proposals for Fellowship must be filed with the Jury of Fellows, at The Octagon, not later than February 1st of any calendar year. All proposals so filed will be considered by the Jury and those selected will be cited for the honor of Fellowship at the second succeeding convention.

6. In the event of failure to act favorably upon any recommendation within three years due notice shall be given to the proponents, the recommendation surrendered and privileged communications destroyed. No recommendation so surrendered shall again be presented within two years from such notice.

This is a revised copy of the Rules of Procedure of the Jury of Fellows as amended and approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting on November 14, 1930.





Dear Mr. Russell:

While in Tulsa last Saturday at the Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma Chapter, I made it a point to get as much information as possible about the man of whom we spoke last week and whose name has been before the Jury of Fellows for some time. This gentleman is Leonard H. Bailey, an Englishman by birth I believe, but for many years resident in Oklahoma. Mr. Bailey is the real spark plug for the profession in Oklahoma. Without him I do not know what the Institute or the profession at large would do. He is the perennial Secretary of the Oklahoma Chapter, and was re-elected again last Saturday. I do not know whether he has ever been President of the Chapter or not, but I do not believe anyone would wish to accept the Presidency if he would refuse the Secretaryship. He is, and has been for some time, the Secretary of the Oklahoma Architects' Licensing Body, and runs the whole show. I am not sure what is his present connection with the State Society of Architects in Oklahoma, but in the past he has been very active in this body as well. In fact, there is a very little difference between the Oklahoma Chapter, the State Society, and the State Licensing Board. They all seem to be operated and officered by the same group.





Dear Mr. Bailey:

Thank you very much for your letter of June 20, enclosing copy of a letter from the Preston Construction Company of San Francisco, concerning bids on certain buildings to be constructed in Oklahoma City. (S. 2)

You are perfectly correct in assuming that architects should not bid, and that they should not be asked to bid. As you state, this certainly does indicate a lack of understanding on the part of the clients, of the professional status of an architect.

It is certainly evident that architects who bid on this work are violating paragraph 3, Article II, of the Standards of Professional Practice, which states:

"An Architect shall not knowingly compete with a fellow Architect on a basis of professional charges, nor shall he offer his services in a competition with others except as provided in the Institute's Competition Code."

For your information we are sending herewith two copies of the Standards.

We are also sending copies of this letter, with enclosures of the Standards, to the Secretary and President of the Oklahoma Chapter and James H. Mitchell, Director of the Sierra-Nevada Regional District. We also enclose a copy of our letter to the Preston Construction Company of San Francisco.

We trust that in the future you will adopt some other method of selecting an architect for your projects.

Architect Denies Morals Charge Involving Boy, 14

Bruce Goff, 50-year-old former chairman of the University of Oklahoma's School of Architecture, was charged Saturday in County Court with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

He pleaded not guilty to the morals charge at his arraignment before Judge Silas C. Wolfe and was released on a \$2,500 cash bond pending trial.

The charge is a misdemeanor which means Goff will not undergo a preliminary hearing, but will face trial during the next term of County Court.

Southward Signs Complaint

He was represented at Saturday's arraignment by T. R. Benedum, Norman attorney.

County Attorney Hez J. Bussey said the charge was filed in connection with an incident on Nov. 26 involving a 14-year-old Norman boy.

The official complaint against Goff was signed by Claude Southward, Cleveland County juvenile officer.

As witnesses in the case, the complaint listed the names of the youth, Police Chief J. W. (Dub) Wheeler, Assistant Chief Albert Dodd, Southward, Patrolman Debs Followwill, George Brett and Police Capt. Lacy Claunch.

Goff Resigns

Specifically, the allegations in the complaint against Goff accuse him of "willfully, wrongfully and knowingly, cause, aid, abet and encourage" the youth to "become a delinquent child."

Goff resigned from the University staff effective, Dec. 1, giving "poor health" as the reason.

The architect returned to Norman Friday from Chicago where he appeared as guest speaker at an architectural conference sponsored by the Arthur Research Foundation of the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Goff designed the ultramodern Bavinger house five miles east of Norman, the Spee house on Wetzler Way and a modern home at the corner of Brook Street and Chautauque Avenue.

Many other structures designed by Goff have been featured in magazines in the U.S. and abroad.

Architect Denies Morals Complaint

(Oklahoma Times Norman Bureau)
NORMAN, Dec. 3—Bruce Goff, 50, former chairman of the University of Oklahoma school of architecture, entered a plea of innocence in Cleveland county court Saturday to a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Goff, represented by T. R. Benedum, Norman attorney, posted a \$2,500 cash bond and was released until time for appearance at the next term of county court.

A complaint signed by Claude Southward, county juvenile officer, accuses Goff of "encouraging a 14-year-old Norman boy to become a delinquent child by intentionally and designedly looking upon, touching, mauling and feeling" his body.

County Attorney Hez J. Bussey says the alleged incident occurred Saturday, November 26, on the OU campus, and was reported to Norman police the same afternoon.

Goff resigned as chairman of the

school of architecture Tuesday and said poor health made it impossible to carry on his private practice as an architect and also serve as chairman of the school.

The misdemeanor charge was filed after an investigation conducted by Norman police and Bussey. Maximum penalty for such a charge carries a \$500 fine or a 6 months jail term, or both.

Goff is considered one of the nation's outstanding contemporary architects. When he was 22-years-old he designed the Boston Avenue Methodist church in Tulsa.

He came to the university in 1947 and was later named a full professor, and appointed chairman of the OU architecture school, even though he holds no degree from any college or university.

Before coming to OU, Goff taught at the Chicago Academy of Fine Arts and had a private practice in Berkeley, Calif.

This person was for some unexplainable reason frequently called upon by A.I.A. Chapters (but not the Okla Chapter) to be guest speaker.

Architect Fined In Morals Case

(Oklahoma Times Norman Bureau)

NORMAN, Sept. 11—Bruce Goff, former chairman of the University of Oklahoma school of architecture, was fined \$500 and costs late Tuesday in Cleveland county court after pleading guilty to contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Goff, who did not appear in court, was represented by his attorney T. R. Benedum of Norman.

The fine was the maximum allowed under the law for such a charge, though a six-month jail term also could have been levied.

Considered one of the nation's outstanding contemporary architects, the former OU faculty member resigned his post last December because of "ill health."

The offense with which he was charged occurred Nov. 26, 1955. At his arraignment last December, Goff pleaded not guilty and has been free on a \$2,500 cash appearance bond pending trial in county court.

The original complaint against Goff, signed by Cleveland county juvenile officer Claude Southward, accused the former faculty member of "encouraging a 14-year-old Norman boy to become a delinquent by intentionally and designedly looking upon, touching and mauling and feeling his body."

The offense occurred on the OU campus, County Attorney Hez J. Bussey said.

Benedum did not disclose why his client decided to change his plea. The case had been set for jury trial on the county court criminal docket scheduled to start next Monday.
