My dear Mr. Hoyt:

We have received a letter from Mr. Thomas P. Barber, Institute Member of the Colorado Chapter, located in the Bank Building, Colorado Springs, in which he tenders his resignation as a member of the Institute.

We have written to him that such resignation, to become effective, must come through the Executive Committee of the Colorado Chapter, following the procedure shown on the attached document.

It often happens that resignations are submitted impulsively, or because of some misunderstanding, which can be cleared away by a word of personal interest from the President of the Chapter. Sometimes members do not understand that the severance of their Institute membership will also bring about loss of Chapter membership, although we endeavor to make this point clear.
