



Welton Becket, FAIA, head of the California firm of Welton Becket and Associates, architects and engineers, today announced that he has now opened an office at 1114 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, to service clients in the mid-west.

The firm's home office is in Los Angeles with other principal branches in San Francisco, Washington, D.C., and New York. Welton Becket and Associates has won international recognition for the design of such structures as the Prudential and General Petroleum buildings in Los Angeles, Bullock's stores in Pasadena, Westwood Village and Palm Springs, the Jai Alai Auditorium in Manila and scores of other major projects from Japan to Cuba. Becket also designed the Hall's store on Grand Avenue, voted the best commercial structure of 1951 by the Kansas City Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Within the organizational structure of this architectural group is a staff of hospital architects, engineers and designers who are currently completing plans for a \$25,000,000 hospital and medical school for the University of California at Los Angeles, the Mt. Sinai Hospital in Beverly Hills, California, and a 1000-bed Naval Hospital in San Diego. Becket is also supervising architect for the entire UCLA campus.

A pioneer in the use of lightweight construction techniques—which have resulted in the development of so-called "flyweight skyscrapers"—Becket is also well known as an exponent of "total design," with his 100-man firm equipped to execute all the components of a modern building from the structure itself to the furniture, fixtures and interior details.

Recognition of Becket's ability in the architectural field was expressed by his contemporaries last July, when, at the national convention of the American Institute of Architects in New York City he was raised to a Fellowship in the Institute.

Simultaneously with the announcement of his plans to establish a major branch office in Kansas City, Becket also stated that Albert C. Peterson would head the new office.

An expert in the commercial architectural field, Becket's organization currently is designing nine multi-million-dollar major shopping centers to be constructed in midwestern states. On the west coast the firm has such commissions as the Stonestown Shopping Center and the Hillsdale Shopping Center, both in the San Francisco area, as well as two other Bay area regional shopping centers yet to be announced.

In making public the opening of the Kansas City office Becket also announced that his firm had been commissioned by J. C. Hall, president of the famous greeting-card company, to handle an extensive building expansion program for Hall Brothers, Inc.

"The prime reason for establishing our office in Kansas City is the growing importance of the area as one of the world's greatest industrial centers. Geographically situated half-way between the population centers of our country, Kansas City is ideally suited as the focal point for serving our clients in Chicago, St. Louis and other midwest cities. It also affords an ideal opportunity for us to follow closely the commercial and industrial development anticipated in the mid-west," Becket stated.

WELTON BECKET, LOS ANGELES ARCHITECT, VISITS EISENHOWER, NAGUIB AND BATISTA

Within the past six weeks, Welton Becket, Los Angeles architect, has conferred with the heads of three governments. Becket returned to Los Angeles last week.

The internationally known architect conferred with President Eisenhower in Abilene, Kansas, President Naguib of Egypt in Cairo and Juan Batista, president of Cuba, in Havana.

Just priot to his recent European-Middle East-West Indies tour Becket traveled from Kansas City to Abilene, Kansas, in the presidential plane and discussed with the President the Eisenhower Foundation Building he was to dedicate.

The four-acre site on which the Foundation Building stands also includes the house in which Eisenhower was born. Welton Becket was architecutral supervisor of the memorial building that provides a permanent resting-place for the hundreds of historical souvenirs collected by the President during his distinguished military career.

Construction cost of the building was raised through public subscription and was sponsored by the National Foundation to Honor Dwight D. Eisehhower and the United States Armed Forces, Inc., headed by Sam R. Heller, a prominent Kansan.

The museum itself is a one-story building of native stone, with one wing devoted to an exhibit area. The sponsoring committee hopes to add a second wing to the structure to be used as a public meeting place.

President Eisenhower agreed to the memorial using his name only under the condition that it be dedicated to the men and women of the armed forces, and with special emphasis on the promotion and teaching of Americanism, democracy and citizenship.

According to Becket, the building will be open to the public early in 1954.

The visit with Naguib in Egypt followed successful negotiations by Hilton Hotels International, Inc., for the construction of a \$6,000,000 modern hotel on the banks of the Nile. Becket's firm has been named architects for the new hotel.

In Havana, Conrad Hilton, President of Hilton Hotels Corporation and architect Becket met with the Cuban leader Batista following a discussion of plans for ground-breaking ceremonies launching the construction of the 26-story Hilton Havana hotel to be located in the center of Greater Havana. Becket has also been selected as architect for this latest addition to the Hilton hotel chain.

Becket characterized President Naguib as a forceful personality with a good command of the English language. Batista, Becket said, epitomized the term "human dynamo". The Cuban leader works eighteen to twenty hours every day and frequently holds cabinet meetings from midnight until three and four in the morning.

The announcement that the Los Angeles architect would handle the "total design" of the new Cairo hotel brings to three the number of major projects his firm is working on for the Hilton organization. The Beverly Hilton Hotel, in Beverly Hills, now under construction, was also designed by Becket.

Born in Seattle, Becket received his degree in Architecture from the University of Washington in 1927 and then attended Ecole des Beaux Arts in France for post-graduate study in architecture.

In 1934 he entered a competition for the design of the Pan Pacific Auditorium. His plans won the award and established his then small firm as one continuous promising on the west coast.

During the last decade Welton Becket and Associates have designed such local monumental structures as the General Petroleum Building, the Prudential Building, the new "glass skyscraper" Standard Federal Savings and Loan Building, Bullock's Pasadena and Westwood stores and the Los Angeles City Police Facilities Building now under construction in the Civic Center.

AIR SECRETARY APPOINTS ARCHITECT WELTON BECKET
AIR ACADEMY ADVISOR

Los Angeles... Secretary of the Air Force Donald A. Quarles in a letter to Architect Welton Becket, F.A.I.A., today asked the head of the nationally known architectural and engineering firm to continue to serve as consultant for the Air Force Academy.

In August, 1954, Architect Becket was asked by Harold E. Talbott, then Secretary of the Air Force, to advise him on plans for the Air Academy to be constructed at Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Following Secretary Talbott's resignation last August, Becket, in accordance with accepted governmental procedure, tendered his resignation to the new Air Secretary.

"I should now like to ask you if you would consent to continue as a consultant to the Secretary of the Air Force on the Air Force Academy Project.

I am sure that your advice as an outstanding architect-engineer would be of great assistance to me in reaching determinations on features of the Academy design", Secretary Quarles' letter stated.

Becket began his architectural practice in Los Angeles in 1934. In the past two decades his building designs have won both national and international awards.

Among his most noted structures in this area are the General Petroleum Building, the Prudential Building, the Beverly Hilton Hotel, UCLA Medical Center, Bullock's Westwood and Pasadena stores, and the new Police Administration Building.

Becket is also the supervising architect for the University of California at Los Angeles' campus building program.

Thank you very much for your letter of October 28 in which you express interest in becoming a member of the Dallas Chapter.

When an architect is elected to membership in The Institute, he is assigned to the chapter of his choice, which must be where he resides or maintains his principal place of business. Thereafter, The Secretary will reassign him to another chapter which meets this same criteria upon his request, subject to the approval of his chapter and the chapter to which he washes to be assigned.

BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION: Welton Becket, F.A.I.A., architect

Welton Becket, F.A.I.A., heads the architectural firm of Welton Becket and Associates, architects and engineers, considered to be the most active architectural firm in practice today, with a backleg of work figuring well over \$220,000,000.

Many experts credit Becket's phenomenal rise to fame to his pioneering spirit not only in his design and construction methods, but also his unique ability to sense specific geographical areas that are on the threshold of commercial and industrial expansion.

Dallas, Kansas City, St. Louis, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Cotswold, North Carolina, are several of the mushrooming metropolises where Becket has multi-million dollar projects "on the boards" or under construction.

Becket's ability in the architectural profession has won numerous awards both nationally and internationally. In 1952 his contemporaries in the American Institute of Architects voted him their highest honor, that of a Fellow in the Institute.

Creator of numerous nationally known landmarks and monumental structures he has in the past two decades made major contributions to the ever-changing skyline of American cities.

As a pioneer in lightweight construction techniques he has been instrumental in slicing millions of dollars off conventional building costs. And, as an exponent of "total design" he has widened the entire field of architecture to embrace every detail of a building from its exterior facing to the pattern of the carpets on its floors.

A graduate of the University of Washington's school of architecture (1927) and the Ecole des Beaux Arts at Fontainebleu, Becket arrived in Los Angeles in 1933 and in partnership with the late Walter Wurdeman, an old friend and college classmate, opened a modest architectural office. When, the next year, the young partners won the prize for the best plan for the Pan-Pacific Auditorium, Los Angeles, they were at once established as two of the West's most promising architects and soon found themselves in constant demand designing residences, many for motion picture stars, and an occasional restaurant. In 1939, at the invitation of the Philippine Government, Becket spent two years in Manila designing the enermous Jai Alai Auditorium which was completed just before Pearl Harbor, and subsequently proved to be the only building in the city center to survive bombardment by both Japanese and American planes during the war. At home Becket's firm built more than a dozen huge housing projects, and at war's end had already acquired the nucleus of a staff that has grown into an office of 186 highly skilled specialists.

Currently Becket and his Associates, who are fast becoming known in the architectural profession as "shopping center" specialists, are designing 19 major shopping centers throughout the United States.

The firm's hospital work has attracted such national attention with such commissions as the \$17,000,000 U.C.L.A. Medical School and Hospital, the new Mt. Sinai Hospital in Los Angeles, a 1000-bed Navy hospital in San Diego and the \$8,000,000 Baptist Memorial Hospital in Kansas City, that Welton Becket and Associates have established a hospital division staffed with experts in the field of architecture, design and interior decoration.

Becket's work in the office building field has won him numerous awards in both the architectural and design fields. Two of his most outstanding contributions to the Los Angeles skyline are the Prudential and General Petroleum Buildings which are height limit buildings of 10 and 13 stories respectively. Each of these structures contains more than 500,000 square feet

of floor space and costs approximately \$8,000,000. Recently completed is the \$1,000,000 office building for Standard Federal Savings and Loan Association. Known as the "narrowest little skyscraper" in the West it has a 41-foot frontage, is 166-feet deep and rises 9 stories.

In the office and banking building category the firm also has under construction or completed the National City Bank in Sao Paulo, Brazil, the Remington Rand Building, Los Angeles, the Police Facilities Building in Los Angeles and the City National Bank, Beverly Hills.

At present Welton Becket and Associates are planning three major hotels for the Hilton Hotels Corp. The \$14,000,000 Beverly Hilton Hotel in Beverly Hills, now under construction; the Hilton Habana, in Habana, Cuba; and the Hilton Nile in Cairo, Egypt. Also on the boards are three more Hilton Hotels as yet unannounced.

Fifty-one major stores, some in multi-million dellar regional shopping centers, are in various stages of planning and construction, architect Becket has disclosed. These stores include Gimbels in Philadelphia, Minneapolis and Milwaukee; Frederick and Nelson in Washington; A. Harris & Company, Dallas; Goldwaters Department Store, Phoenix, Arizona; I. Magnin, Seattle; Chrbach's, Long Island; Capwell's Walmut Creek, California; Macy's in San Mateo, California; and other stores in Billings, Montana; St. Louis, Missouri; and Indianapolis.

Other projects handled by the Becket office include the President Eisenhower Foundation Building in Abilene, Kansas, a \$7,000,000 greeting card factory and office building for Hallmark Company in Kansas City, the remodeling of famed Hollywood Bowl and the California Air National Guard recreation building in Van Nuys, California.

About one-eighth of Mr. Becket's time is spent travelling. These junkets involve trips for new business, conferences on planned projects and inspecting jobs under construction.

In the short space of six weeks, Mr. Becket this year visited with President Eisenhower in Abilene regarding the Eisenhower Foundation Building, President Naguib of Egypt, in Cairo, to discuss the Hilton Nile Hotel and Jaun Batista, president of Cuba, in Hawana, to review plans for the Habana Hilton Hotel in that country.

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WELTON BECKET, NOTED ARCHITECT

Designer of the Los Angeles Music Center Dies at 66

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 18—Welton Becket, a prominent architect who designed office buildings, hotels, shopping and cultural centers in the United States and abroad, died last night at St. Vincent's Hospital. He was 66 years old and had been suffering from heart disease. He lived in West Los Angeles.

Mr. Becket's office was one of the largest producers of commerical architecture in the country, with emphasis on a competent, sleek, professional product. He was one of the big business practitioners of architecture in terms of the volume of work and of the size and type of corporate client.

Mr. Becket was president of Welton Becket and Associates, one of the country's largest architectural firms, from 1949 until recently. He was succeeded by his nephew, Macdonald Becket, and became loard chairman board chairman.

Among Mr. Becket's projects

have been the \$33.5-million Los Angeles Music Center, completed almost two years ago and comprising the Doro-thy Chandler Pavilion, the Mark Forum and the Ahmanson Theater and Century City, a complex of office and residential buildings being built on the former 20th Century-Fox lot in West Los Angeles. Mr. Becket also has served as master planner and architectural coordinator for the campus of the University of California at Los Angeles.

In the East, the architect's In the East, the architect's projects in recent years have included Xerox Square, the headquarters of the Xerox Corporation in Rochester; Center Plaza, a large office complex opposite City Hall in Boston; the Worcester (Mass.) Center redevelopment project, and the Gulf Life Insurance tower in Jacksonville Fla

Now being designed by the Becket firm in the New York area are the Coliseum at the John F. Kennedy Arts Center in Mineola, L. I., and the Westchester County Court House in

White Plains.

Welton David Becket was born in Seattle and received his architectural degree from the University of Washington in 1927. He did graduate work at the School of Fine Arts in Fontainebleau, France.

In the years before and during World War II, he was a partner of Walter Wurdeman, who died in 1948. The firm of Wurdeman and Becket gained a reputation for designing expensive homes for film stars. During the war, the concern designed 14,000 units of ci-vilian and military housing.

When the postwar suburban building boom began, Mr. Becket designed the first branch for Bullock's, the Los Angeles department store, in Pasadena. He sought to impart a residential flavor to the design, and was credited with setting a style that has been widely copied in the proliferation of suburban branches of big-city stores. Mr. Becket, who was di-

vorced may years ago, is survived by two sons, Bruce, an architect with the firm, and Welton Jr., and two grandchildren.

West Coast Architect Dies at 66

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17 — Welton Becket, 66, an internationally known Los Angeles architect whose buildings stand as landmarks died Thursday after a heart attack.

Mr. Becket, whose work spanned nearly four decades, and was recognized as one of the giants on the architectural profession, had produced scores of award-winning buildings for public and private interests.

The projects he designed ranged from Los Angeles' Music Center to Xerox Square in Rochester, N.Y., his most recent.

In the 1940s, his design for Bullock's Pasadena, the Nation's first suburban department store, set a postwar trend in department store planning.

In the same period, Mr. Becket's plans for the Prudential Insurance Co. and General Petroleum office buildings—Los Angeles' first two major postwar structures—established the principle of lightweight construction.

Following post-graduate at the School of Fine Arts in Fountainbleau, France, he founded a practice with a former classmate, Walter Wurdeman. During World War II, the firm designed more than 14,000 housing units for military and civilian families. What was regarded as their "big break" came later with the commission to design Bullock's Pasadena.
