The Treasurer directs me to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 17th instant enclosing your check for \$47.50

There appears to be some misunderstanding about the Initiation Fee. Previous to the action of the last Convention, the Examination Fee was \$5.00 and the Initiation Fee \$25.00, making \$30.00 in all. The last Convention ordered that the Initiation Fee be raised to \$30.00, and that the \$5.00 fatherstan Fee be credited on account of the Initiation Fee. Thus you will see that it has always required a payment of \$30.00 to complete both Examination and Initiation Fees. 

My dear Mr. Bellows:

At the December meeting of the Board of Directors of the Institute your name appeared on the list of delinquent members who are indebted for Institute dues for more than one year - as of December, 1927.

The Board took action on the list as a whole to the effect that those not making payment in full, or some arrangement with the Treasurer as to future payment - before February 15,1928 - must less their memberships.

As Secretary of the Institute and because the Institute needs your moral support, as evidenced by your membership, I ask the privilege of addressing you this letter of a somewhat personal basis.

It is a serious thing to forego your membership in the Institute, and in your Chapter. Termination of Institute membership automatically terminates Chapter membership.

At the direction of the Secretary of the Institute, and with regrets I write to advise you that your membership in The American Institute of Architects and the Columbus Chapter, has been terminated, effective December 31, 1927, for non-payment of Institute dues.

You are indebted for \$50.00, covering the years 1926 and 1927.

If I might add a word of explanation, it would be to say that the Officers and Directors of the Institute are more than sorry that this action is necessary. They regret to lose your name and influence.

But the Institute is largely dependent upon the dues of its members for carrying on its work. It is not fair to those who pay their dues to earry, indefinitely, those who do not pay. Under the general resolution adopted at the December meeting of the Board, and about which we advised you, we are obliged to drop those whing for two years or more.
