

His outstanding contribution has been in the field of apartment house design. This is a field in which, in our nation's capital, the speculative builder has reigned almost supreme and the architect has been slave rather than master in design. The nominee has been one of the very few who have had the persistence, the courage and the ability to assert the need for good architectural design for apartment houses — and the skill to supply the need.

The design of the Boston House, the Crestwood and, above all, the Crestview, is characterized by a fresh approach towards simplicity and a skillful use of materials. It is an achievement which is all the more noteworthy because of the limitations which control most architects in this field.

Julian E. Berla, 73, an architect in the Washington area for many years, died Monday at the Wisconsin Avenue Nursing Home after a long illness.

A partner in the former firm of Berla and Abel, he had been in private practice from 1937 until retiring in 1971:

Born in Newark, N.J., Mr. Berla received a degree in architecture from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and took further studies in Germany.

He designed part of the Kamehameha School in Honolulu and practiced in New York before coming here in 1935 to join the Resettlement Administration and participate in the design of the Greenbelt community.

Mr. Berla later designed the Van Ness Center, the Farragut Building, the Indiana Building, private homes, and other large buildings.

During the 1950s, he was chairman of the Citizens Committee for the Preservation of the Capitol, which opposed extension of the East Front.

Mr. Berla was a fellow of the American Institute of Architects and a past president of the Washington chapter.

He had been a consultant to the Danish government on public housing, the Washington Board of Trade, and the design review board of the Baltimore Housing Department.

He belonged to the Cosmos club and the MIT Alumni Club.

He is survived by his wife, Freda Berla, of the home, 1517 26th St. NW; a son, Michael J. Berla, of Ann Arbor, Mich., and four grand-children.

Julian E. Berla, 73, a former president of the District chapter of the American Institute of Architects, died Monday in the Wisconsin Avenue Nursing Home here. He lived on 26th Street NW.

Berla was one of the architects of Greenbelt, Md., a project of the New Deal's Resettlement Administration.

Later he was in private practice here as a principal of the firm of Berla and Abel. His work included numerous office buildings—the Van Ness Center, the Farragut Building and the Indiana Building.

During the last 10 years Berla was a visiting critic at the architectural schools of the University of Virginia and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He received an architectural engineering degree from MIT in the 1920s.
