GEORGE A. BOEHM, ARCHITECT, WAS 85

Designer of Schools Here
and in Mt. Vernon Dies—
Active in Citizens Union

MOUNT KISCO, N. Y., Dec. 16—George A. Boehm of Purdys, a retired architect who had practiced in New York for more than fifty years, died yesterday in Northern Westchester Hospital after a long illness. He was 85 years old.

Mr. Boehm graduated from Columbia University in 1897 and then studied in Paris and Rome. He had designed many public buildings, including the Training School for Nurses at Greenpoint Hospital, Brooklyn; the Fire Headquarters Administration Building in New York and many public schools in New York and Mount Vernon.

He prepared the Building Code for Mount Vernon and was a member of the advisory committee on the Building Code of New York City.

Mr. Boehm was for two years president of the Westchester County Chapter, American Institute of Architects. He had served also on the executive and legislative committees of the Citizens Union, on the laws and administration committees of the Citizens Housing and Planning Council and on the housing section of the Welfare Council, all of New York.

He was a member of the Society of Older Graduates of Columbia.

Survivors are a widow, Olive; a son, George A. Jr.; a daughter, Mrs. Edward Higgins, and a sister, Mrs. David Metzger.

A funeral service will be held here Saturday at 10:30 A. M. at Oelker & Cox, 262 Main Street.
