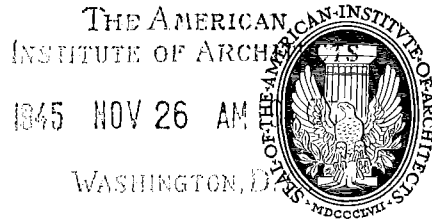

DIGEST OF THE CAREER AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF

IRVING HENRY BOWMAN, CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA

(a)

The early work of Mr. Bowman produced landmark achievements in technological research in the science of construction. Of particular importance was the pioneering of insulated metal thin wall/ribbon window construction for high-rise buildings, and advanced insight into pre-fabricated housing. He also produced an exhaustive research paper on electric welding of structural steel published by The Architectural Forum in 1933. The importance of the metal wall research was recognized in an analytical feature published in the July 1930 issue of The Architectural Record. The research advanced the profession by providing valuable technical expertise to the development of curtain wall construction.

Design work of Irving Bowman has been characterized by innovation, strength of expression and excellence in solution of design problems. His early work in Chicago earned him and his brother, his partner, an important niche in the Chicago School, a position confirmed by inclusion of their work in an exhibition of International Style at New York's Museum of Modern Art in 1932. A continued career of design excellence was evidenced recently when he won an "Honor Award for Excellence in Design" in WV Society of Architects competition. He has advanced the profession by passing the torch of design excellence and technical expertise to the many young architects for whom he has been tutor.

Mr. Bowman advanced the profession further through public service to Charleston, WV citizens. He served 20 years on the Municipal Planning Commission and 10 years on the Building Code Committee. These activities established codes and building construction guidelines and produced the first major comprehensive plan for the city. He has been a leader in promoting architects as problem solvers in the city, and the influence is evident in the Charleston skyline and development patterns. During 1979-80 Mr. Bowman organized the West Virginia Consultative Council of the National Institute of Building Sciences, making West Virginia the first state to be chartered by the Institute. He remains active on task force committees of NIBS.

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There are many areas of Mr. Bowman's life and work that have not been discussed or placed in a specific category in this nomination.

While a student at Illinois Institute of Technology he was honored with membership in the Scarab Honorary Fraternity, Edfon Temple, I.I.T.

Mr. Bowman's career experience other than the partnership with his brother has included one year as structural engineer with Ford, Bacon & Davis, one year as architectural project leader for Holabird & Root, Chicago, and one year with H.K. Ferguson of Cleveland, Ohio. Except for three years active duty with the U.S. Navy he has spent most of his career to this point in time as proprietor of his own firm in Charleston, WV.

During his years in Chicago he and his brother were responsible for the design of metal furniture for the Italian, Westinghouse and General Electric Pavilions at the Chicago World's Fair of 1933-34, "The Century of Progress." His West Virginia practice has been interesting and varied. Three of the more interesting and somewhat unusual architectural commissions were: The National Radio Astronomy Observatory at Green Bank, WV, funded by the National Science Foundation and directed by Associated Universities Inc. in which Irving Bowman's firm was responsible for the entire project including utilities, roads, water and sewage treatment, buildings and foundations and underground laboratories for the dish antennae; a

Silicones Production Facility for Union Carbide at Long Reach, WV, including buildings and all process piping; and a Cobalt 60 Laboratory for Union Carbide including a building for the laboratory and special radiation shielding.

Mr. Bowman has been very active in the community and in the WV Chapter of AIA. He is a member of the Baptist Temple, joining the church in 1950. He taught 9th grade Sunday School for ten years. He has served on many boards and committees of the church and currently is a member of the Board of Deacons.

Besides the outstanding service to the community noted elsewhere in this nomination, Mr. Bowman was a twenty year member of the Exchange Club, served as Director of the Charleston Chamber of Commerce 1960-63 and Director of the Kanawha Welfare Council 1959-63. He has just recently been appointed to the Advisory Committee on Engineering Technologies for the West Virginia Institute of Technology in Montgomery, WV.

Mr. Bowman was Secretary-Treasurer of the WV Chapter of AIA in 1950, Vice President in 1951, served two years as President, 1952-1953 and three years as a Director, 1954-1956. He was also editor of the Chapter newsletter. With the national AIA he was a corresponding member of the AIA Engineers Conference Committee in 1963 and a regular member of that committee in 1964; He was a member of the national AIA Committee on Professional Consultants in 1965 and 1966; He was a member of the national AIA Codes and Standards Committee from 1975 through 1977; He assisted the AIA-

Engineers Conference Committee in drafting a revision of the American Arbitration Association rules of procedure so as to be more readily applicable to building construction disputes, and assisted the AIA Committee on Professional Consultants in updating current forms of agreement between architects and professional consultants and in drafting ethical standards (recommendations) for all design professionals. Last year Mr. Bowman represented the WV Society of Architects on the Consultative Council of the National Institute of Building Sciences.

Throughout all this activity Mr. Bowman has found time to extend his education with AIA Continuing Education Programs through the state component, a Defense Education Course in Advanced Structural Design, Charleston - 1942, a rigorous U.S. Navy Course in Nuclear Studies at Oak Ridge, Tennessee - 1958, and an Energy Redesign/Retrofit and Solar Designing Course - 1977.
