

Mr. Bottomley, who had an office at 597 Fifth Avenue, New York, was noted for his design of town and country houses. Born in New York, he received his B. S. in architecture at Columbia University in 1906. He subsequently did post-graduate scholarship work at Columbia and studied at the American Academy in Rome and at the Beaux Arts School in Paris. Until 1919 he was a member of the firm of Hewitt & Bottomley.

I., the town house of William Ziegler Jr. in New York and Mr. Ziegler's country house in Middleburg, Va.; the town residences of Myron C. Taylor and James C.
