



2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

54 Elementary and High School Buildings throughout Northwestern Chio designed by the nominee attest to his ability as an authority in the field of educational buildings. The combined elementary and high school group at Delta, Chio, was awarded first mention in the Architects Society of Chio's annual competition (see Exhibit A) in 1941 and the Wauseen High School won the medal award in 1947.

Brand Whitlock Homes - In 1934 the firms of Britsch & Munger and Langdon & Hohly were commissioned as Architects for Brand Whitlock Homes, Toledo's first slum clearance and low-cost housing project, consisting of 376 family units, utilities and site improvements. In the association of the two firms, C. C. Britsch was selected as the designer for the project. Description of the project is set forth in a lecture delivered by the nomines to Toledo Federation of Social Service Agencies (Exhibit C).

American Legion National Headquarters, 1608 K Street, washington, D.C. Monumental in character and functional in planning for the varied service activities of the American Legion, together with the limitations of a narrow lot were among the problems confronting the Architect. Now after a year of use, the Owner confirms the wise conception and execution of the design in a building of extreme utility. The working drawings and specifications were prepared in the offices of Britsch & Munger, under the direction of the nominee and the supervision of construction was performed by him.

Williams County General Hospital - 43 bed, one-story hospital serving a community of approximately 25000 population in and around Montpelier, Ohio. Unique in plan, combining the County Health Offices, Health Center for out patients and the facilities of a General Hospital in one structure. The preliminary plans were prepared by the nominee and the working drawings, specifications and general supervision of the construction executed under his direction.

3. C. C. Britsch has also made a considerable contribution to the Art interests of Toledo as a water colorist and by his skillful pencil and pen and ink techniques. (See Exhibit A-2 and B-3).

#### NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN SCIENCE OF CONSTRUCTION

1. Construction Work

3. Describe nominee's notable work in the science of construction and any recognition thereof by other societies, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

In the construction of school buildings throughout Northwestern Chio in which the nominee has worked together with educators in the study of educational processes for which the physical facilities were provided resulting in structures that consider the health of the child and his surrounding as a great factor and inducement to greater learning. Also studying materials in their application to types of construction thus effecting great economies and giving to communities the greatest amount of education facilities for their tax dollar and still creating in design, structures in which the community may join in an expression of pride.

Williams County Hospital:— Construction was simplified in the use of masonry bearing walls, floor slab on crushed stone fill and water-proofed membrane. Roof slab manning from bearing wall to bearing wall also forms the ceiling. Foamglas insulation and bonded felt, pitch and gravel form the finished flat roof surfaces. Excavation provided only for mechanical equipment and pipe galleries under corridor floors. Aluminum sash. Face brick and Architectural concrete are the exterior surfaces.

Carnegie Institute of Technology, 1916. Awarded scholarship in Junior year for scholastic standing and was appointed assistant to faculty in Senior year at C.I.T. 1916 to 1918 served on faculty of Defiance College, Defiance, Ohio, conducting evening classes in Architectural and Mechanical drawing.

1920-1921 Toledo correspondent for Beaux Arts Institute, New York, receiving the programs and criting 3 draftsmen in offices of Stophlet & Stophlet in class B problems, preparatory to their entry of Carnegie Institute of Tenhnology with advanced credits. Now practicing architects. One of these, L.C. Page, Chief Architect for U.S.A. on Canal Zone.

Later in his own office practice, several young men were given training preliminary to college entrance, in perspective drawing, composition, shades and shadows and wash drawings.

1937-1938 - Lecturer on course "The Church - Its Architecture Past and Present" and "Planning Your New Church Edifice" in Toledo Sunday School Unions Munual Teacher Training Course.

1941 - Nominee arranged bus tour of city of Toledo for Toledo Women's Educational Club, stopping at 24 buildings and giving brief talk at each structure on its architectural merits.

1947-1948-1949 - Organized course in Architecture in Toledo University night school and together with two other practicing Architects of Toledo Chapter A.I.A. staffed the faculty, supplementing on the job training of several veterans with instruction in design problems and related subjects. (See article "An Adventure in Education" published in A.T.A. Journal 1947, Exhibit C).

#### NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

1. State fully the nominee's signal service to The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, or to the profession, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

In the early days of his private practice when Toledo Chapter A.I.A. was an exclusive organization and its membership was closed to the younger Architects, he was instrumental in organizing the young Architects of Toledo as the "Art Crafts Society" and served as President during the first two years of its existence. Through his leadership in 1926 this young organization instituted a campaign for an Architects Registration Law in Ohio. (See clippings Exhibit B). The activities of this group so alerted the local A.I.A. Chapter that doors were opened and invitations to membership extended. The campaign for a Registration Law was continued, other A.I.A. chapters of the state taking it up, which finally resulted effective legislation in 1929 in the form of the Architects Registration Act in Ohio.

As a member of Toledo Chapter A.I.A., he has at all times been active in the full program of the Chapter, working through the years with the various Toledo High Schools in Vocational Guidance in Architecture; lectures on Architecture as a vocation, sketching emonstrations and criting and assisting in judging of problems in High School Architectural classes and personal guidance to many, many young men giving generously of his time for interview.

In 1942 and 1943 he was chairman of Toledo Chapter's Committee fr Civilian Defense. He organized the Architects and Engineers in a very effective working unit in making a survey of the major portion of the City of Toledo to determine Air Raid Shelters. He personally spent several days in the study of city plots in research on types of existing structures, preparing zone maps, spot maps and outline forms to carry on the survey. Meeting with the committee to analyze the information and establish shelter areas. Then meeting weekly with Chief of Civilian Defense until an effective system was established.

Prior to the unification of the Architects Society of Chio, and the six chapters of A.I.A. in the state, C. C. Britsch served in 1942 as Vice President and in 1943 as President of the Toledo Section of the Architects Society of Chio and as a director of the state organization of the Architects Society of Chio, working constantly for the unification of these two organizations which in 1945 was completed.

In 1942 and 1943 he was Toledo Chapter representative on Toledo Technical Council. October 3, 1943, Chairman, Toledo Technical Council - Public Meeting - Waiter McCormack on Post War Building. (News clipping). Exhibit B.

He served Toledo Chapter A.I.A. as Vice President through 1944 and 1945 and as President in 1946; continuing on the Executive Committee through 1947 and 1948.

One of the activities during his administration as Toledo Chapter President was to call the Architects and Professional Engineers together to discuss problems which seemed to be constant barriers or sources of misunderstanding between the two groups, with the result of discovery that there was much common ground and mutual benefit in cooperation. The success of these local meetings was transmitted to the two Organizations on the state level. Today in Ohio, the Joint Committee of the Architects Society of Ohio and the Ohio Society of

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Professional Engineers, of which C. C. Britsch is a member, has been holding bi-monthly meetings for the past two years to discuss and process items of mutual interest and to agreeably solve some of the knotty problems of overlapping professional practice.

Through 1945 and 1946, C. C. Britsch represented Toledo Chapter on the Executive Board of the Architects Society of Ohio. In 1946 his name was placed in nomination for Director of the Great Lakes Region by the Architects Society of Ohio. The state of Michigan then claimed it was their turn in rotation of states to nominate the candidate for this office. After Mr. Britsch discussed this matter with Ed. Kamper, A.I.A. Scretary in Washington, he paid the courtesy to Michigan and withdraw his name in favor of Kenneth Black.

- 1948 3rd Vice President of Architects Society of Chio and acted as Chairman of the State Educational Committee during that year.
- 1949 2nd Vice President A.S.O. and Chairman of Educational Committee.
- 1950 1st Vice President A.S.O., Chairman of State Legislative Committee.

  The state convention was held in Toledo this year, and nominee C. C. Britsch was general chairman of the Convention. Mr. Britsch has served as a juror on several local art exhibits, high school art exhibits, etc.,

  May 25, 1950, selected by Beaux Arts Institute of Design to assist on Jury in judging the Tile Council of America Prize Competition. Judging was done at Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.
- 1951 President of the Architects Society of Ohio. (President's report of the years activities hereto attached).
- 1952 Past President A.S.O. Chairman of Committee on Registration and Violations of the Registration Act. During the past year, C. C. Britsch has carried on an active campaign in the prosecution of violations of the Architects Registration Act and has brought about the first testing of the strength of our law by gaining a favorable court decision through actual prosecution of violators.
- 1952 Chairman of Nominating Committee, Architects Society of Ohio.

#### NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

1. List the public offices held by the nominee and the positions of trust held by him in recognition of civic leadership, and state clearly his notable work in public service and the particular influence of that work which the nominators believe to be a notable contribution to the advancement of the profession.

1910 - Served as Vice President and President of Defiance District Epworth League. Organized a group of 50 boys in Archbold into the Kappa Sigma Pi, which in 1910 to 1912, was doing a similar work as the Boy Scouts of America. After completing his college days, he continued his work with boys and served 5 years as Scout Master of two Toledo troups of the Boy Scouts of America. 1917 - President of Toledo District Epworth Legue. 1920-1928 - Superintendent of Church School at Central Methodist Church. Taught classes of boys and young people for 15 additional years. 1942 - President of the Methodist Men's Organization of Greater Toledo. 1943 - President of Point Place Parent Teachers Association. Treasurer of the Toledo Sunday School Association for the past 12 years and has served on the annual campaigns for funds for Toledo Council of Churches and Toledo Community Chest.

He is a member of the Board of Directors of North Toledo Community House and on the Executive Board of Goodwill Industries Inc. of Toledo, a non-profit industry for opportunity and service to handicapped individuals. On the Board of Directors of Toledo Lions Club.

As a member of the Toledo Chamber of Commerce, he was in 1945 appointed on the Metropolitan Planning Committee to make a study of the downtown commercial areas, a preliminary to the program of a master plan for the entire city. He is in the current year, a member of the Central Business District Committee and the Housing and Urban Redevelopment Committee. (See Exhibit B).

After World War II he was appointed by the City Manager on a nine man "Citizens Memorial Committee" to study and make recommendations to the City Council for a fitting memorial building or other development to be dedicated to those who made the supreme sacrifice. As a member of this committee he made many studies in plans, elevations and perspectives without compensation. Time has eased many of the aching hearts that originally made the demand for the memorial, city council delayed, and it now seems that nothing will come of it. However endless hours were given in this effort.

As a member of the Toledo Regional Planning Association, nominee was appointed by City Manager in 1947 to a "Citizens Parking Panel" to study traffic and parking problems, especially in the congested business district. After months of studies, traffic surveys, charting of parking facilities present and future, hearings of various interests, this panel presented to Toledo City Council a comprehensive report, which included recommendations pointing toward some immediate relief and definite action of Council necessary for long term planning in the solution to traffic problems. Many of these recommendations have already been adopted in Council action and included in the City Plan Commissions Master Planning. (See Exhibit 2).

Mr. Britsch is a member of the American Legion and has served as 2nd Vice Commander, 1st Vice Commander and Commander of Vernon McCune Post, and on Lucas County Council. He was also consulting architect for the American Legion National Organization in the designing of the new national headquarters building at Indianapolis, Indiana, working with Walker & Weeks of Cleveland, who were commissioned by the State of Indiana for this project.

Has served on speaker's bureau of Toledo Regional Planning Association and Chamber of Commerce.



Dear Mr. Wachter:

I was very sorry to receive your letter of June 11 and learn of the dissappointment of yourself and the Toledo Chapter with respect to the failure of one of your members to be elected to Fellowship.

As you may be aware the proceedings of the Jury of Fellows is of such a confidential nature that I am not even aware of those whose names are before the Jury or of their disposition on the cases unless I receive such information unofficially from friends.

We very often find that the failure of one person to achieve Fellowship where another has received it is due almost entirely to the fact that the qualifications of one are much better presented by his friends and associates than is the case with the other.

I can speak freely in this matter since I know nothing of the subject matter which was presented in behalf of Mr. Britsch. It is possible that his nomination was made on the basis of several categories such as Public Service, Institute Service, and Design. It might be best, if that is the case, to concentrate on the most outstanding feature of his career and not to make the nomination in any other categories. In any event, if after a year has elapsed you resubmit your nomination if the Chapter is still interested we suggest that the necessary time be given to the preparation of a complete dossiar.

- 2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.
  - -- 54 Elementary and High School Buildings throughout Northwestern Ohio, designed by the nominee, attest to his ability as an authority in the field of educational buildings. The combined Elementary and High School group at Delta, Ohio, was awarded first mention in the Architects Society of Ohio's annual competition in 1941 and the Wauseon High School won the medal award in 1947.
  - -- Brand Whitlock Homes. In 1934 the firms of Britsch & Munger and Langdon & Hohly were commissioned as Architects for Brand Whitlock Homes, Toledo's first slum clearance and low-cost housing project, consisting of 376 family units, utilities and site improvements. In the association of the two firms, C.C. Britsch was selected as the designer for the project. (Description of the project is set forth in a lecture delivered by the nominee to Toledo Federation of Social Service Agencies.)

  - --- American Legion National Headquarters, 1608 K Street, Washington, D.C. Monumental in character and functional in planning for the varied service activities of the American Legion, together with the limitations of a narrow lot were among the problems confronting the Architect. Now, after five (5) years of use, the Owner confirms the wise conception and execution of the design in a building of extreme utility. The working drawings and specifications were prepared in the offices of Britsch & Munger, under the direction of the nominee, and the supervision of construction was performed by him.
  - --- Williams County General Hospital. 43-bed, one-story hospital serving a community of approximately 25,000 population in and around Montpelier, Ohio. Unique in plan, combining County Health Offices, Health Center for out-patients, and facilities of a General Hospital in one structure. Preliminary plans were prepared by the nominee and working drawings, specifications and general supervision of the construction executed under his direction.
- 3. C. C. Britsch has also made considerable contribution to the Art interests of Toledo as a water colorist and by his skillful pencil and pen and ink techniques.

In the construction of school buildings throughout Northwestern Ohio, in which the nominee has worked together with educators in the study of educational processes for which the physical facilities were provided, resulting in structures that consider the health of the child and his surrounding as a great factor and inducement to greater learning. Also studying materials in their application to types of construction, thus effecting great economies and giving to communities the greatest amount of education facilities for their tax dollar and still creating in design, structures in which the community may join in an expression of pride.

#### B. Churches

The nominee has made an especial contribution to the planning of Churches and Church Schools in the twenty-seven Churches throughout Northwestern Ohio he has designed during the past years. As a member of the Church Architectural Guild of America, he has made extensive studies and research in the trends of Religious Education and broadening program of the Church, and has been instrumental in bringing to many Church Boards new concepts in the planning of Church facilities to more efficiently meet the challenge of their future growth.

C. American Legion Headquarters Building in Washington, D. C.

A seven-story and basement, reinforced concrete structure, designed to house the Washington office of the Legion, having close contact with Legislation, Public Relations and Veterans' Administration. Framing designed to allow for three additional stories in height, if and when the expanding program of the Legion may require. The combination of materials to give a monumental character to the building and still keep within the confines of a limited budget and narrow lot restrictions imposed many problems in planning. Indiana limestone in 6' x 6' x 6" slabs provided the scale in facade upon which a 13 ft. stone figure of America's fighting man is mounted on a ledge 40 ft. above the street level. The facade above the entrance at the side is of glass panels in aluminum framing. Sliding aluminum sash, with thermopane glazing throughout answer cleaning problems as well as effect economies in heating and air conditioning.

D. Williams County Hospital

In this one-story hospital, construction was simplified in the use for masonry bearing walls, floor slab on crushed stone fill and water-proofed membrane. Roof slab spanning from bearing wall to bearing wall also forms the ceiling. Foamglas insulation and bonded felt, pitch and gravel form the finished flat roof surfaces. Excavation provided only for mechanical equipment and pipe galleries under corridor floors. Aluminum sash. Face brick and Architectural concrete are the exterior surfaces. The one-story design has greatly simplified food service to patients and effected considerable economy in the supervisory and nursing staff requirements of the hospital.

E. <u>District Tuberculosis Hospital, Lima, Ohio</u>

The problem of building a new central unit and two additional wings, and to demolish the old non-fireproof central unit and keep the hospital in undisturbed continuous operation during construction involved the genius of planning seldom encountered. To this problem, the nominee brought a most interesting solution and in cooperation with the Ohio State Department of Health, provided for this community a great forward step in the facilities for the treatment of Respiratory Diseases.

Later in his own office practice, several young men were given training preliminary to college entrance, in perspective drawing, composition, shades and shadows, wash drawings, and pencil sketching.

Unfinished as of this date - book - A biographical novel built around the life of H. G. Britsch, father of C.C. Britsch, who came to the United States from Switzerland at the age of 11 years, and grew up in Fulton County, Ohio, and as a builder helped to settle and build that area. Several of the chapters of this book describe construction of the 1880 to 1895 period. Except for the finishing chapters, this work is 3/4 completed.

State fully the nominee's signal service to The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, or to the profession, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

1926 - 1942 In the early days of his private practice, when Toledo Chapter A.I.A. was an exclusive organization and its membership was closed to the younger Architects, he was instrumental in organizing the young Architects of Toledo as the "Art Crafts Society" and served as President during the first two years of its existence.

Through his leadership in 1926, this young organization instituted a campaign for an Architects Registration Law in Ohio. The activities of this group so alerted the local A.I.A. Chapter that doors were opened and invitations to membership extended. The campaign for a Registration Law was continued, other A.I.A. chapters of the state taking it up, which finally resulted in effective legislation in 1929 in the form of the Architects Registration Act in Ohio.

As a member of Toledo Chapter, A.I.A., he has at all times been active in the full program of the Chapter, working through the years with the various Toledo High Schools in Vocational Guidance in Architecture; lectures on Architecture as a vocation; sketching demonstrations and criting and assisting in judging of problems in High School Architectural classes; and personal guidance to many, many young men, giving generously of his time for interview.

1942 - 1943 Chairman of Toledo Chapter's Committee for Civilian Defense. He organized the Architects and Engineers in a very effective working unit in making a survey of the major portion of the City of Toledo to determine Air Raid Shelters. He personally spent several days in the study of city plots in research on types of existing structures, preparing zone maps, spot maps, and outline forms to carry on the survey. Meeting with the committee to analyze the information and establish shelter areas. Then meeting weekly with Chief of Civilian Defense until an effective system was established.

Prior to the unification of the Architects Society of Ohio, and the six chapters of A.I.A. in the state, C.C. Britsch served in 1942 as Vice President and in 1943 as President of the Toledo Section of the Architects Society of Ohio and as a director of the state organization of the Architects Society of Ohio, working constantly for the unification of these two organizations, which in 1945 was completed.

In 1942 and 1943, he was Toledo Chapter representative on Toledo Technical Council. October 3, 1943, Chairman Toledo Technical Council - Public Meeting - Walter McCornack on Post War Building.

1944 - 1947 He served Toledo Chapter, A.I.A., as Vice President through 1944 and 1945, and as President in 1946, continuing on the Executive Committee through 1947 and 1948. During this time Mr. Britsch also served as Chairman.

One of the activities during his administration as Toledo Chapter President was to call the Architects and Professional Engineers together to discuss problems which seemed to be constant barriers or sources of misunderstanding between the two groups, with the result of discovery that there was much common ground and mutual benefit in cooperation. The success of these local meetings was transmitted to the two Organizations on the state level. Today in Ohio, the Joint Committee of the Architects Society of Ohio and the Ohio Society of Professional Engineers, of which C.C. Britsch is a member, has been holding bi-monthly meetings for the past two years to discuss and process items of mutual interest and to agreeably solve some of the knotty problems of overlapping professional practice.

Through 1945 and 1946, C.C. Britsch represented Toledo Chapter on the Executive Board of the Architects Society of Ohio. In 1946 his name was placed in nomination for Director of the Great Lakes Region by the Architects Society of Ohio. The State of Michigan then claimed it was their turn in rotation of states to nominate the candidate for this office. After Mr. Britsch discussed this matter with Ed. Kemper, A.I.A. Secretary in Washington, he paid the courtesy to Michigan and withdrew his name in favor of Kenneth Black.

  - 1950 Ist Vice President, A.S.O.; Chairman of State Legislative Committee. The state convection was held in Toledo this year and nominee C. C. Britsch was General Chairman of the Convection. Mr. Britsch has served as a juror on several local art exhibits, high school art exhibits, etc., and on May 25, 1950, was selected by Beaux Arts Institute of Design to assist on Jury in judging the Tile Council of America Prize Competition. Judging was done at Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.
  - President of the Architects Society of Ohio. (President's report of the year's activities hereto attached.)
  - 1952 1953 Past President, A.S.O. Chairman of Committee on Registration and Violations of the Registration Act. During the past year C.C. Britsch has carried on an active campaign in the prosecution of violations of the Architects Registration Act and has brought about the first testing of the strength of our law by gaining a favorable court decision through actual prosecution of violators.

Mr. Britsch is a member of the American Legion and has served as 2nd Vice Commander, 1st Vice Commander and Commander of Vernon McCune Post, and on Lucas County Council. He was also consulting architect for the American Legion, National Organization in the designing of the new national headquarters building at Indianapolis, Indiana, working with Walker & Weeks of Cleveland, who were commissioned by the State of Indiana for this project.

He has served on speaker's bureau of Toledo Regional Planning Association and Chamber of Commerce.

The Institute's committee structure has become so cumbersome and complicated that not only were we functioning inefficiently but also the financial burden of supporting the committees prevented us from engaging in other needed services to the members. The Board therefore had a study made for the purpose of streamlining our organization. This study recommended a number of changes which have been put into effect. These changes included the abolishment of some committees and reductions in personnel in others.

The Committee on Hospitals and Health has now become a standing vertical committee of only five members. The reduction naturally entails disappointment to those loyal and devoted members who have not been designated to continue on the committee. Personnel decisions were difficult in the extreme, as virtually without exception all members of committees have made substantial contributions to the welfare of the profession and prestige of The Institute.

Selections of those to continue was made by The Board by ballot - in many instances only after prolonged balloting.

Although you have not been selected to continue, The Board has requested me to convey to you its deep gratitude for the service you have rendered and expresses the hope that in the not too distant future further opportunity will be given to call upon you again.
