

We have your letter of February 20, advising us that four of our Chapter members have had their membership in the Institute terminated for non-payment of dues. We are glad that the other delinquent members on the former lists have been able to clear up their deficiencies. However, we regret losing two of the four named: Mr. Clarence J. Buckingham, Mr. Philip R. Hooton, Mr. Carl T. Meyer, and Mr. Max K. Teach.

Mr. Meyer and Mr. Teach were also delinquent in the Chapter. Mr. Meyer's delinquency in both the Institute and Chapter totals \$93.75 and Mr. Teach's totals \$65.00. This matter was brought before our Executive Committee at our regular meeting March 7, but the Committee declined to take any action. The extent of the delinquencies and the conditions attending both cases are such that the Chapter decided to let the matter rest, unless the men themselves should ask for re-consideration. Mr. Meyer lives within the Central Illinois Chapter territory and has shown some interest and attended our meetings a few times. Mr. Teach, however, has lived outside of our territory for many years, and has not attended our meetings during that time, so far as I can ascertain.

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Chapter, being paid up in full to January 1, 1936. His delinquency is due entirely to straitened circumstances. He is a worthy man, and our Executive Committee and Chapter will cooperate with the Institute in any way possible to secure his reinstatement. Will you kindly suggest a plan agreeable to the Institute? We feel that this may be regarded as a special case, since Mr. Buckingham has worked effectively under Mr. E. E. Lundeen in the Historic American Building Survey, and we wish to see his membership continued if possible. He, too, regrets that it was impossible for him to meet the payment of Institute dues.

Mr. Hooton's case is one for immediate consideration. He is and has always been in good standing in the Chapter, and has been active at all times in its activities, and a regular attendant at meetings.

I am enclosing a letter addressed to the Board of Directors, in compliance with the Institute rules for securing reinstatement, which I will ask you to pass on to the proper officials.


