Dear Mr. Butterfield:-

Responding to yours of March 20, I regret to write that apparently there is no way under the Institute By-laws by which your Institute membership can be retained other than through continued affiliation on your part with the Georgia Chapter.

Perhaps the Chapter has some provision for non-resident dues, or for an affiliation suitable for your case.

I know that the Officers of the Institute would regret very much to lose your Institute membership and it is hoped that this will not happen.

We have noted your permanent address as being 18 Avenue de la Sapiniere Uccle LLL (Prince d'Orange) Bruxelles, Belgium, and you should begin to receive shortly the Journal and other Institute documents which come to you as a part of the annual dues.

Dear Mr. Butterfield:

You hold a national membership in The American Institute of Architects, and also a membership in its Georgia Chapter.

These professional affiliations are valued by the two societies, and we believe that they are valued by you.

We are just in receipt of a letter from the Secretary of the Georgia Chapter, advising that your Chapter dues have remained unpaid since 1928. We find, here, that your dues to the Institute remain unpaid for the year 1930.

Under the established Institute procedure each member is expected to keep current his dues in his Chapter, as well as in the national Society. This is a fair and reasonable provision because, as you know, the Institute and the Chapter are entirely dependent upon the dues of their members for carrying on the work which they do for the profession as a whole.

The purpose of this letter is to let you know the situation, and to express the earnest hope that you will square the account with the Georgia Chapter by sending a check to the Treasurer, Mr. J. H. Gailey, 36 - 12th Street, N. E., Atlanta, Ga. If you will do this it will completely restore you to good standing in the Chapter.

The Institute is composed of a small group of men, scattered over the United States. It is a thin spread. The Society needs every one of its members, and it will be disappointed if it loses your support.

We hope that you will let the Chapter and this office hear from you soon.

Dear Mr. Butterfield:

It is with genuine regret that I write, as Secretary of the Institute, to advise you of the termination of your membership in the Institute and your Chapter, effective December 31, 1931, for non-payment of Institute dues.

The Treasurer, and the Secretary's Office, sent to you various statements of account and letters, in the hope that you would find it possible to make a remittance, in whole or in part, and thereby continue your affiliation with The American Institute of Architects and your Chapter.

It is realized that conditions in the building industry have remained on a most unfavorable basis during the past year, and for that reason the Institute made a special effort to retain your membership as long as possible.

It is believed that you will approve of the action taken. The alternative was to allow the dues to so increase as to make future reinstatement a heavy expense.

I am hoping very much that the circumstances which prevented you from carrying on your Institute membership will speedily change, and that you will soon be thinking of taking up your membership again. When you are ready to do so, I can assure you that the Institute will make the way back very simple and easy. The Board has already made provision whereby the old account can be paid off in installments and over a period of time that will not be onerous to you.

I am going to write to you from time to time, reminding you that the Institute desires your return to its membership and its councils, and so that your return can be worked out to your best convenience.
