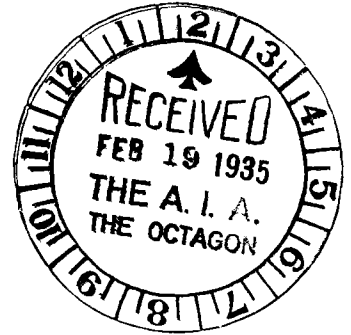

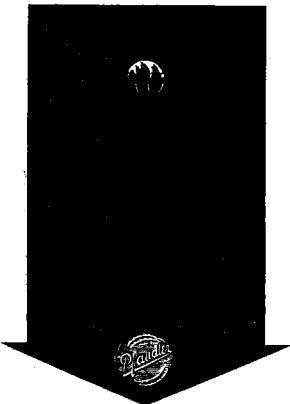

Dear Mr. Cocks:

Responding to your letter of April 28, at hand on May 1, with regard to monographs supported by advertising:

It would not be appropriate for this office to make an official ruling on a hypothetical case involving a question of professional ethics. Such rulings can be obtained from The Board or The Executive Committee if it is necessary.

However, The Institute has consistently held that participation by a member in the publication of a monograph supported by advertising - of the type you describe - is not right. At the recent Convention in Grand Rapids a revised code of ethics was adopted, which contained the following paragraph - which we believe gives a general answer to your question:

"7. An Architect shall avoid exaggerated, misleading, or paid publicity. He shall not take part, nor give assistance, in obtaining advertisements or other support toward meeting the expense of any publication illustrating his works, nor will he permit others to solicit such advertising or other support in his name."

Should you desire a more official response than this, please do not hesitate to write again; and we shall submit the matter to The Executive Committee in late July or early August.

Your letter of June 27th with reference to Professional Liability Insurance has been received.

The phraseology employed by insurance companies is confusing to all non-insurance people, including myself. We did publish a clarification of the G.A.A.C.'s definitions and descriptions in the May 1950 issue of the Journal of The Institute, a copy of which is enclosed.

At the time of the reorganization of the liability program, we went very thoroughly into the matter with the G.A.A.C. Whether or not the policy which is now being offered by that company is what the architects need, really is a matter of individual determination. Presumably, for a type of policy which the architects would like to have the premiums would be exorbitant. The policy which the G.A.A.C. now offers is, in my opinion, a good one for the premium charged.

The architect, however, is insured only when property damage or bodily injury results from an accident due to negligence, failure, or error on the part of the architect.

I trust this letter will be of some help to you. However, if further information is desired, I suggest that you write directly to Mr. John T. Orr, General Counsel, General Accident Assurance Corporation, 4th and Walnut Streets, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.



NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SERVICE TO THE INSTITUTE

1. State fully the nominee's signal service to The Institute, his chapter, or his state organization, or to the profession, which the nominators believe has notably contributed to the advancement of the profession, and list the offices in architectural organizations occupied by the nominee and the period of each.

Mr. Cocke served as President of the old San Antonio Section (Chapter) of the Texas Society of Architects in 1940; as Director and Vice-President of the Texas Society of Architects, and as President of the Texas Society of Architects for two years, 1944 and 1945; as member, Secretary-Treasurer and later Chairman of the Texas State Board of Architectural Examiners from April 24, 1947 to July 21, 1953; as member and later Vice-President of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards during approximately the same years; as Chairman of the Texas Region A.I.A. Judiciary Committee, 1955 to 1958; as Chairman of the Awards and Scholarship Committee, Texas Society of Architects from 1954 to 1957; and is serving as Chairman of Hospital and Health Committee of the Texas Society of Architects at this time.

It is recognized that service as an officer or as a committee member is not, in itself, sufficient to demonstrate achievement in "service to the Institute"; however, as the above listing of offices held by Mr. Cocke indicates, his organizational ability, his talents for getting along with people to such an extent that they follow his guidance, his willingness to sacrifice much time, expense and effort from a very active practice to travel and carry on correspondence for the good of the profession, caused him to be sought after to fill the numerous positions of trust and responsibility listed above, and in all such positions his services were rendered so faithfully, efficiently and strikingly that they became outstanding and inspiring. One illustration of his unusual service to the profession was during the war years of 1944 and 1945 while he was serving as President of the Texas Society of Architects. During this time many architects were in the service, many if not the majority not in the service were without work, and despondent. It was the general attitude of the members that the Texas Society could do nothing for them, they couldn't support it, so let it die. Mr. Cocke, upon assuming this office, sensed the general attitude of despair among the membership, determined that the Society must live and must serve, and by his travels over the state to offer encouragement, the magnetism of his personality, and his persuasiveness, was enabled not only to hold the Texas Society together, but also to weld it into a tighter and a more solid unit, which continued as a working organization until this day.

It is believed that the constituent organizations of the Institute in Texas are strong and forceful today because of the devoted services freely given by Mr. Cocke, as particularly demonstrated by his war years Presidency of the Texas Society, and that his services have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession of architecture.

F.A.I.A. BARTLETT COCKE

Bartlett Cocke, a 1922 graduate of the School of Architecture, is the first alumnus to be honored with a Professorship in his name. It is fitting that Cocke receive this recognition. He holds the prestigious Pitts Award from the Texas Society of Architects (TSA), and he founded the widely respected firm of Chumney, Jones & Kell, Inc., now Jones & Kell, Inc. He is also an enthusiastic supporter of architectural education at The University of Texas at Austin and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he completed two years of graduate work in Architecture, completing all requirements for a Masters Degree.

Hal Box, Dean of the School of Architecture, believes that "Bartlett Cocke exemplifies the architect as a professional, a builder of buildings, and a realizer of the client's building needs."

When established, Cooke would like to see the Professorship "encourage instruction in the history of classical architecture and the neoclassical revival styles. I am extremely interested in classical architecture. After all, I was trained as a classicist. I have always admired the works of eminent architects such

as Paul Cret, Bertram Goodhue, McKim, Mead & White, Cass Gilbert, and others."

A native San Antonian, Cocke founded his practice in 1927 in the wake of the Depression. Until 1936, he spent a lot of time traveling through Texas, measuring and documenting antebellum structures for the Historic American Buildings Survey. In this way, he acquired a working knowledge of early Texas architecture.

Cocke's first major commission was Joske's on Alamo Plaza, which resulted in a long career in department store and shopping center design for both Joske's and Sears. Another large commission was Trinity Baptist Church. His major joint venture designs include the many buildings at Trinity University and St. Mary's Hall in San Antonio with Ford, Powell & Carson; also the U.T. Health Science Center in San Antonio and the Perry-Castañeda Library at U.T. Austin with Phelps, Simmons & Garza.

Cocke's earliest involvement with the organization of TSA began while he was lobbying for passage of the Architects Registration Law in 1937. He served as TSA President for two terms (1944-45), and was

appointed to the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners. The policy of reserving some design projects for returning GI-architects was initiated by Cocke, and his firm's early practice of profit sharing led to wide acceptance by other architects.

In 1970, Cocke transferred the firm's leadership to his associates in order to deal with a temporary illness. The firm was incorporated and Cocke, at age 69, served as its chairman.

Today, Cocke is retired from the firm and travels extensively with his wife, Mildred. They have been married 59 years and have two children, Bartlett Cocke, Jr., a general contractor, and Catharine ("Tinka") Tarver, an artist and liturgical dancer.



One learned the virtues and rewards of an exacting and analytical mind, of loyalty, discipline, and personal integrity.

Such is the man whose legacy is scores of successful buildings and architects trained well for the increasing complexities of a demanding profession.

The **University of Texas at Austin** began offering architectural education in 1910. Since that time, over 2,500 undergraduate and graduate professional degrees have been conferred.

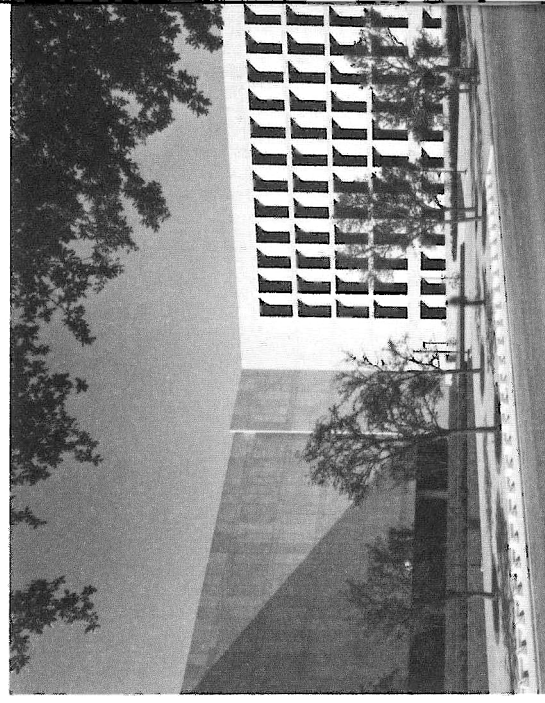

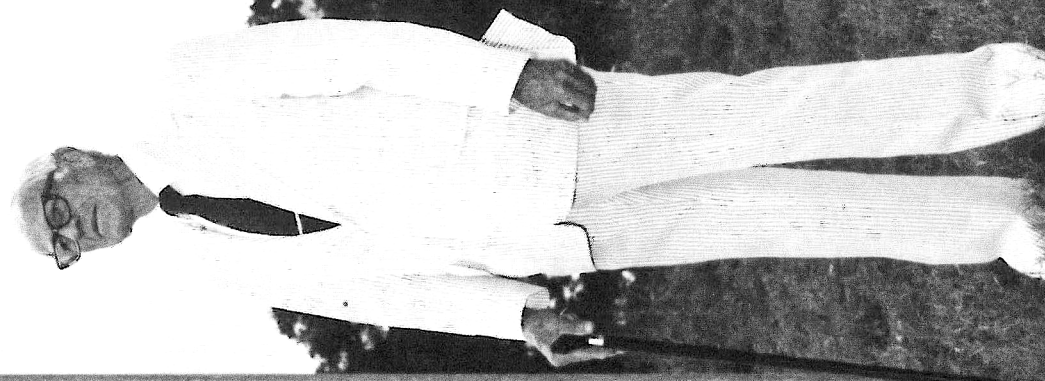

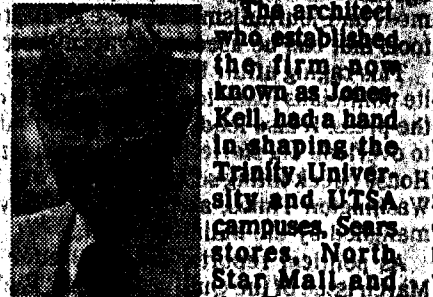
Bartlett Cocke, 90, died March 17, 1992. He was a Member Emeritus and a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects. He was the fourth president of the Texas Society of Architects in 1944, and a former chairman of the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners. In 1982 he received the Llewelyn W. Pitts Award of the Texas Society of Architects. A Professorship in Architecture and a Scholarship Fund were established in his name and honor at the School of Architecture at the University of Texas in Austin. Bartlett Cocke Sr. respected architect

Bartlett Cocke Sr. helped design buildings where San Antonians work, learn and shop.



The architect who established the firm now known as Jones Kell had a hand in shaping the Trinity University and UTSA campuses, Sears stores, North Star Mall and the Frost Bank building. He helped save St. Joseph's Catholic Church downtown by designing the Joske's Department Store on Alamo Plaza to wrap around the church.

Cocke, 90, died Wednesday. He established his architecture firm in 1927 and was among the first professional businessmen in the area to hire talented young architects and keep them motivated by offering them shares in the firm.

"That enabled him to get the best people in town," said John Kell, board chairman of Jones Kell.

"He was so professional. He didn't think there was any excuse for being unorganized or for keeping making stupid mistakes over and over. He felt like the clients were intelligent and should be respected. That's the heritage he left to us."

Services are scheduled at 10 a.m. Friday at Trinity University's Marguerite B. Parker Chapel with interment in Mission Burial Park South.

Survivors include his wife, Mildred Cocke, son, Bartlett Cocke Jr., daughter, Tinka Tarver, six grandchildren, and a great-grandchild.

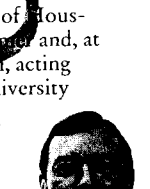
Bartlett Cocke, S., FAIA, of San Antonio, 90 Mar. 17; served as the fourth president of TSA from 1944 to 1945 and was a former chairman of the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners; in 1982, received TSA's Llewelyn W. Pitts Award; was the first alumnus of the University of Texas at Austin to be honored with a regents' professorship in architecture in his name; his firm, Bartlett Cocke and Associates, was the forerunner of JonesKell Architects of San Antonio; he retired at age 70 after selling the firm, but remained a stockholder until his death; he worked with O'Neil Ford at Trinity University and the University of Texas at San Antonio; he designed the Joske's Building, the Witte Museum, and the Frost Bank Building, among many others.



Ronald W. Lehman, AIA, of Dallas, Feb. 27; served as a national task force group chairman for the AIA Documents Committee; was employed by the Sverdrup Corporation.

Roberto R. Lopez-Molne, of Houston, 43, Jan. 30; graduate of the University of Notre Dame and completed graduate studies at the University of Rome; served as director of architectural design and senior vice president of Spencer Heitz Architects for more than 15 years.

Jack Mitchell, FAIA, of Houston, 60, Feb. 28; former dean of the Rice University School of Architecture where he had been a member of the faculty for 16 years; a graduate of Washington University and the University of Pennsylvania; he was an urban planning consultant in a number of cities, including Houston, San Antonio, New Orleans, Dallas, and Indianapolis; he served as president of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture from 1982 to 1983 and as a board member of the National Architectural Accrediting Board from 1987 to 1991.



Donald S. Nelson, FAIA, of Dallas, 84, Jan. 4; one of the chief designers of the 1930 Texas Centennial and the architect for the Mercantile Bank complex on Main Street in Dallas; grew up in Chicago where he helped plan and design the 1933 Century of Progress Exhibition; was a past president of the Dallas Chapter/AIA.

University of Texas School of Architecture; received a certificate in architecture from the San Antonio Vocational and Technical School; was the principal owner of George R. Rodgers, A.I.S. & Company; was past president of the Northeast Texas Chapter/AIA, past director of TSA; in 1989, was appointed by Governor Bill Clements to serve a six-year term on the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners.
