

Mr. Cobb's most notable achievements have been in design and urban design. As one of the three founding principals of I. M. Pei & Partners, he has contributed actively and continuously to the distinguished body of work produced by the firm since its formation in 1955. The AIA recognized this unusually fruitful collaborative practice in 1968, when I. M. Pei & Partners was selected to receive the Institute's Architectural Firm Award.

Executed works for which Cobb has been principally responsible as design partner include: the May -D&F Department Store and Plaza in Denver, recipient of an AIA First Honor Award in 1959; Place Ville Marie, the world-renowned civic and commercial complex which sparked the renascence of downtown Montreal (1962); the new campus of the State University College at Fredonia, New York (1968); the Harbor Towers waterfront redevelopment project in Boston (1971); and the headquarters building of the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company now nearing completion in Boston.

As a natural complement to his architectural practice, which has been characterized by projects large in scale and complex in program, Cobb has played a major role in his firm's extensive work in urban design and city planning. Among projects for which he was largely responsible were the Urban Renewal Plans for Government Center, Boston (1961), and Bunker Hill, Los Angeles (1963). He has also prepared master plans for major urban development projects in New York City, Montreal, Toronto, Edmonton, and Melbourne (Australia).

Throughout his career, Cobb has coupled his professional activity with teaching. He was for several years visiting critic in the thesis class at Yale. He has also served as visiting critic at the University of Pennsylvania, and has lectured at Columbia, Harvard, McGill, Princeton, and Washington Universities. For four years (1967-71) he served as a member of the Advisory Council of the Cooper Union School of Art and Architecture. In the years 1969-71 he was president of the Harvard Graduate School of Design Association, and is presently serving as a member of the Visiting Committee of the School.

Mr. Cobb is currently Chairman of the AIA national Committee on Design, of which he has been a member since 1969. He has played a major role in the Committee's in-depth study of Design Review Boards (to be published in 1972), and this year initiated a companion study of public service as a strategy for the design professions. He is also a member of the AIA's special "Operation Breakthrough" Review Committee, and of the HUD "Operation Breakthrough" Design Advisory Board. He is Chairman-designate of the 1972 AIA Honor Awards Jury.

Professional History:

As one of the three founding principals of I. M. Pei & Partners, Mr. Cobb has contributed actively and continously to the work of the firm since its formation in 1955. The American Institute of Architects recognized this unusually fruitful collaborative practice in 1968, when I. M. Pei & Partners was selected to receive the Institute's Architectural Firm Award.

Executed works for which Cobb has been principally responsible as design partner include: Place Ville Marie, the civic and commercial complex which sparked the renascense of downtown Montreal (1962); the new campus of the State University College at Fredonia, New York (1968); the John Hancock Tower in Boston (1976); the Wilson Commons at the University of Rochester (1976); the World Trade Center in Baltimore (1977); Collins Place, a center-city development in Melbourne, Australia (1978); One Dallas Centre, an office tower (1979); the Augusta (Georgia) Civic Center (1979); and the World Headquarters of Johnson & Johnson now under construction in New Brunswick, New Jersey. His current projects include the Mobil Field Research Laboratory in Farmers Branch, Texas, the ARCO Tower in Dallas, the Pitney Bowes Corporate Headquarters in Stamford, Connecticut, and the Portland (Maine) Museum of Art.

Mr. Cobb has also played a major role in his firm's extensive work in urban design and city planning. Among projects for which he was largely responsible were the Urban Renewal plans for Government Center, Boston (1961), and Bunker Hill, Los Angeles (1963). More recently he has been responsible for downtown revitalization projects for the cities of Augusta, Georgia and New Brunswick, New Jersey. His design for the 16th Street Transitway/Mall in Denver is now under construction.

Throughout his career, Cobb has coupled his professional activity with teaching. He has lectured at a number of universities, and has held the Davenport and Bishop visiting professorships at Yale. He has served as president of the Harvard Graduate School of Design Association, and as a member of the Visiting Committee of the School. He is a trustee of the American Academy in Rome, and of the Brearley School (New York City).

Mr. Cobb is a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects. In 1977 he received the Arnold W. Brunner Memorial Prize from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters. This award is given annually to an architect 'who has made a significant contribution to architecture as an art.' In 1980 Mr. Cobb was elected to membership in the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters.

Personal Data:

Mr. Cobb was born in Boston, Massachusetts on April 8, 1926. He attended Phillips Exeter Academy (Diploma 1943, class of '44) Harvard College (A. B. 1946, class of '47), and the Harvard Graduate School of Design (M. Arch. 1949). He served in the Naval Reserve during and after World War II.

Mr. Cobb and his wife, the former Joan Stewart Spaulding, live in Manhattan. They have three daughters.

Henry N. Cobb, a founding partner in the New York firm of I.M. Pei and Partners, has been appointed chairman of the Architecture Department at Harvard University's Graduate School of Design (GSD), effective July 1, 1980.

Gerald M. McCue, current chairman of the Architecture Department who will become Dean of the GSD on July 1, announced the selection of Cobb from over 50 nominees considered in an international search over the past several months. Cobb emerged the top choice, McCue said this week, "because of his outstanding creative works as an architect whose consistently adventurous exploration has resulted in meaningful and interesting design solutions."

Cobb graduated from Harvard College in 1946 and holds a Master in Architecture degree from the GSD in 1949. He began his professional career with the Boston firm of Hugh Stubbins and in 1955 helped found I.M. Pei and Partners with Tech Ming Pei and Eason Leonard.

As a partner in the prestigious Pei firm, Cobb has played a major role in extensive urban design and city planning projects, including the urban renewal of Boston's Government Center in 1961 and Los Angeles' Bunker Hill in 1963.

Completed projects for which Cobb has been principally responsible include: Place Ville Marie, the civic and commercial complex which sparked the renaissance of downtown Montreal in 1962; Boston's John Hancock Tower, for which he received a National Honor Award from the American Institute of Architects in 1977; and the World Trade Center in Baltimore in 1977.

The recipient of numerous professional honors, Cobb has maintained strong ties with the academic community throughout his professional career.

Cobb's Harvard appointment as Studio Professor in Architecture and Urban Design is a special category for GSD faculty which enables distinguished practicing professionals to assume a part-time University appointment while maintaining a professional practice.
