

- (1) Employed by father - 1938 to 1940 as an apprentice in Architectural Dept., work consisted of filing and producing blue prints, tracing, lettering, assisting Architect and Foreman both in the drafting room and in the field.
- (2) Lovelady & Lay, General Contractors, Douglas, Arizona. Architectural draftsman and Designer. Individual residences, small light commercial buildings, store fronts, mill lists, working drawings, 1940 to 1942.
- (3) 1942 - Entered U. S. Coast Guard, served in Southwest Pacific. Continued Architectural practice during time in service. Designed and drafted plans for various members in Armed Forces as well as private parties in civilian category. Discharged at U. S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Conn. 1946.
- (4) 1946 - Lovelady & Lay, Douglas, Arizona - Re-employed as Architectural Designer and Draftsman in same category as previously mentioned.
- (5) 1950 - Self-employed - Tucson, Arizona - Architectural Designer and Draftsman - office was located at home - designed and drafted Plans for residences in various parts of City and surrounding counties.
- (6) 1950 - Accepted position with A & O Builders, New Orleans, Louisiana, in the Architectural Dept. as Senior Draftsman. From sketches prepared by Chief Draftsman, completed working drawings for the construction of various residences, commercial buildings and other related building construction. Outlined specifications for above, completed quantity surveys on materials connected with construction; left their employment because of slack in department.
- (7) 1950 - Accepted position with Aurora Developing Company in the Architectural Dept. as Chief Draftsman. Assisted Architect Woodward B. Logan now chief Architect, 8th Naval District. In this capacity, was in responsible charge of office personnel, issuing and checking final working drawings from the designs of Mr. Logan, acted in the capacity of Inspector on various phases of construction, was in charge of "Pick-ups", a position similar to "clerk of the works", purpose of which was to supervise final and accepted approval of clients. Acted as Assistant to Superintendent - was in direct charge of all material take-offs and Purchasing Agent for Company. Due to production cut-back, was relieved.

- (8) Successfully passed Examination for U. S. Civil Service Construction Examiner.
- (9) 1951-1952. Accepted position with Standard Fruit and Steamship Company, located in La Ceiba Honduras, Central and South America. Acted in capacity of Draftsman and Designer; responsible directly to Vice President and General Manager of Division.

Re-organized construction program to meet and standardize on American methods; designed and supervised a pre-fabrication Dept. to speed production on farm buildings, houses, box cars for railroad and traffic dept. warehouses, commissary, churches, schools, laboratories, dairy building, airplane hangers for company planes, and concrete block plant. Was directly responsible for all buildings and construction estimates and budgeting and re-appropriating funds necessary to expansion program. Organized a group not connected with the company - a program to improve health, education and combat sanitary conditions among natives of Honduras.

- (10) 1952 - Returned to the United States and accepted a position with Leo F. Dufrechori, Architect, as Chief Draftsman responsible to Architect for Supervision, contract bid forms, general office supervision, personnel, certificates of payments, contract documents and general office procedure. Quit to accept position in Kingston, Jamaica.

EXHIBIT "A"

Upon graduation from High School, May 1938, I immediately went to work for my father, who, at that time, was a General Contractor in Green County, Springfield, Mo.

Contrary to my desires, I was permitted to start my career as official "broom master" and "waste basket" Vice President in complete charge of keeping the drafting department clean of all unsightly waste. During this training period, I was allowed to further my educational standing by removing and keeping (from the waste baskets) any and all scraps of blue prints that were unimportant to the projects. These went to expand my research library. Also, I was permitted to ask as many questions on the subject of Building & Architecture as a 10 hour a day permitted; I was guaranteed no answers. Thus, through the help and training from my father's work-shop, I commenced my career in the field of architecture.

In 1939, my parents moved to Tucson, Arizona because of my mother's ill health and there I became acquainted with various persons in the building trades.

By late 1940, I promptly began to be useful to others by preparing working drawings for various contractors, builders and developers throughout Tucson and Douglas, Arizona. I continued this "private enterprise" until late 1941 at which time I further developed my talents into designing, site planning and studies involving simple engineering, dealing with loads, beam design, simple stress's and other related data.

Then came the outbreak of World War II. I immediately returned to the home of my older sister in Springfield and enlisted in the U. S. Coast Guard.

During my tour of duty with the Coast Guard I took every available minute of my time in studies offered by the "Armed Forces Institute" (a self-study education) to improve my ability in the architectural field.

Following the close of hostilities and an Armistice of World War II, I returned once again to Douglas, Arizona to go into private practice as a Designer Draftsman.





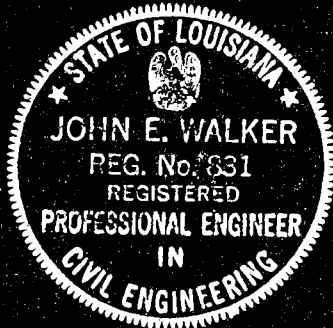

At the close of 1950, I was approached by one of the Officials of a large shipping company to accept a position in their Foreign Division as designer to standarize and bring up to American standards, a building program suited to their budget. Thus, I sailed to South and Central America to assume those duties.

While in this capacity, I re-organized the construction program to meet and standarize on American methods of construction which, prior to my arrival, was lacking in design, planning, and economy. I began by re-budgeting and re-appropriating funds necessary to their new expansion program and by endeavoring to teach native labor the proper use of tools, materials, and equipment.

During this time I was directly responsible for the design and supervision of warehouses, commisaries, churches, schools, laboratories, dairy buildings, a Concrete products plant, a rock-crusher plant, housing, an airplane hanger, and an Administration Building. I designed and put into operation a pre-fabricating plant to speed the production of all farm buildings for the vast plantations.

Also, during this time, I formed a small group of English speaking and American educated Hondurans, who were the most interested in Architecture and Engineering and who seemed to be the most popular in their communities, and we formed a "Society of Technical Teaching", in order to help raise the standards of living in their community.

I feel largely responsible for the changes that followed in what I term "Community Living". Above all, we made some advancement in the education and planning for a people some fifty years behind the American way of life.
