Ladies and Gentlemen:

Perry, Dean, Stahl and Rogers, Inc., a recent joining of two established Boston architectural firms, wishes to conclude a lengthy dialogue regarding the 1976 dues of Perry Dean Partners, Inc. We hereby acknowledge our debt in the amount of \$3,804.17 (computation enclosed) and assure the Institute that it will be paid as soon as possible.

However, we remain dismayed by the unresolved inequities of the present dues system: the amount of the dues itself, the computation of supplemental dues, the payment procedures and the policy which compels entire firms. to belong even if only a few of their architect-owners wish to be active A.I.A. members. We have striven to redress these matters from within the Institute, to no avial. Accordingly, the Board of Directors of Perry, Dean, Stahl and Rogers, Inc. has voted to resign from the American Institute of Architects, effective 31 December 1976.

We take this action with considerable regret and in full awareness of both the role of the Institute in our profession and our long-standing relationship with the A.I. A. As you may be aware, our predecessors, Stahl Associates and the present firm which began in 1923 as Perry Shaw and Hepburn, have a history of sixty-three years continuous membership in the A.I.A. We currently count one Emeritus Member, two Fellows and seven other members among our staff of forty-six and proudly display numerous awards and citations received from the Institute. We trust that this serves to underscore the gravity of our concerns.

Please be advised that several of our present members may seek to maintain their A.I.A. memberships as individuals. We hope that some suitable accommodation of the Institute's policies, our corporate position and their professional goals may be achieved.
