

All design features of Building are of genuinely functional origin and not for "style".

Elevators offset for earthquake stability; sun shades actually exclude the sun from all offices during normal working hours. Earthquake walls visible as part of design.

First use (except for I T & T in Nutley, N.J.) of sheet aluminum spandrel panels in lieu of masonry or cast aluminum for Office Building.

One of earliest uses of "camboge" or open screen, now so popular. Awarded 1st Medal in Festival d'Architecture Paris 1957.

ESSO BUILDING, Baton Rouge 1950.

Lightweight steel structure no columns in exterior wall.

First use in Office Building of "Trollee Duct System" for maximum flexibility in lighting.

LUZ ELECTRICA BUILDING, Caracas.

First flexible, open floor, large rental Office Building in Caracas. Has established current trend in design and standards. First use of central air-conditioning in Caracas (for quiet, cleanliness, and dehumidification rather than cooling, and designed with unique low cost peripheral ducts achieved by upturned spandrel beams, etc.

ESSO BUILDING, Bayway, N.J.

First Office Building designed throughout specifically for use of duPont functional furniture to reduce amount of sq.ft. per employee.

ESSO COLOMBIANA BUILDING, Bogota.

First Office Building in Bogota to introduce substantial use of color to offset the grey, rainy climate and has helped establish a trend.

Use of variegated ceramic tile end walls helped reestablish the tile industry in Colombia. Maximum use of local materials and furnishings for aid to local economy.

CORTEZ PLAZA SHOPPING CENTER (Consulting Architect), Bradenton, Florida.

First use of hyperbolic paraboloids in a shopping center (an inexpensive method of roofing and cooling the Mall). Now being widely copied for this use.

NEW YORK -- Lathrop Douglass, New York architect and urban renewal planner, will be named president of the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects today (Wed., June 5) at the organization's annual luncheon meeting.

For the past year Mr. Douglass has been first vice president and presidentelect, and has served for a number of years on the board of directors of the 1,500-member organization, the largest AIA chapter in the country.

Uncontested for election as officers and members of the executive committee are: David F. M. Todd, FAIA, first vice president and president-elect; William J. Conklin and Herbert B. Oppenheimer, vice presidents; Saul Edelbaum, secretary; and Richard Roth, Sr., FAIA, treasurer.

Internationally known for his design of huge mall shopping complexes, office buildings and other structures in North and South America, Europe and Africa, Mr. Douglass is a former consultant to the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission and is currently a director of the New York Board of Trade and chairman of its architectural Advisory Council. He is a Fellow of the International Institute of Arts and Letters, a former trustee of the National Institute for Architectural Education and a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects.

Mr. Douglass received his B.A. degree in 1929 and his B.F.A. degree three years later, both from Yale University. He also studied at the Ecole d'Architecture in Fountainebleau, France. His architectural career began with the design of the main office building for Creole Petroleum in Caracas, Venezuela, for which he won a First Medal Award from the Festival Internationale d'Architecture in Paris. Currently he is involved in major urban renewal programs in New Haven, Bridgeport and Greenwich, Conn.; Trenton, N. J.; and Buffalo, N. Y. In addition, he is designing architect for Europe's largest shopping complex, located near Paris.

Mr. Douglass is the architect and a member of the board of directors of the Temple of Understanding to be built near Washington, D. C. The structure is dedicated to educating mankind in the similarity of goals and concepts of the world's six major religions.
