Certainly Mr. Doane has had a most enviable career - graduating from M. I. T. in 1912, his early office training was with McKim, Mead & White in New York City. By reason of his skill as a designer by 1915 he was made Assistant Consulting Architect, then in 1917 Consulting Architect, to the Philippine Government where he designed and built between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 of buildings. This was a remarkable achievement for a young man less than six years in practice, much on his own and with untrained helpers. Photographs, herewith, of the Governor's Palace, the Capitol and Post Office, all at Manila, P. I. attest his skill as a designer.

After service in the World War, he established his architectural practice in Boston, taught design at M. I. T., and joined the American Institute of Architects.

His practice has been varied as the extensive list demonstrates, for he is a designer of great versatility.

The Milton Junior High School of which two photographs are shown was his departure in window arrangement from the stereotyped and ugly fenestration so often required by school building committees and even state laws. Mr. Doane demonstrated to the authorities that here was no loss of light but a distinct gain in grace for which we are all his debtors.

His famous Rindge Technical School at Cambridge, Mass., built in 1932, has much influenced modern school design. His orderly and attractive corridor coat-space and his top floor dining-room have now quite a following among school architects.

Mr. Doane was awarded the Harleston Parker Gold Medal in 1927 for the Motor Mart Garage. This was adjudged by his fellow architects as the best building in the Boston district erected at that time. In 1929 he was awarded a Certificate of Merit by Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the Interior and President of the Better Homes in America Association for the Sharon High School. He was also winner of three prizes in the Boston Herald Competition for best architecture in New England in August, 1930.

Since 1930 Mr. Doane has served as Architect for The Northfield Schools. He is also Supervising Architect for the well known St. Paul's School, Concord, New Hampshire, succeeding the late Charles Z. Klauder.



As we feel sure you will want to have the photographs we are returning them to you by express and hope the package reaches you promptly and in good condition.



CONSULTING ARCHITECTS OF THE PHILIPPINES

Burnham, Daniel Hudson, b. Sept. 4, 1846. d. June 1, 1912.

Architect of the Rookery, Chicago; new Wanasskerratores, in Philadelphia and New York; Flat-Iron Building, New York; Chief architect and director of works,

Chicago Exposition 1890-93.

We do not find the title of consulting architect in connection with his name in the books we consulted, however, he definitely did go to the Philippines in some capacity for planning the rebuilding and modernization of Manila and to plan the new summer capital of Baguio. He arrived in Manila December 7, 1904, and left there fanuary 17, 1905. Although we have not found that title associated with him, undoubtedly he was serving in that capacity. While temper would thus be 1904-1905.
