Mr. Clark's practice has been very general and Palo Alto has many examples of his work: residences, stores, garages, office buildings, banks. newspaper plants, public and private schools.

During World War II Mr. Clark was consulting architect on Kaiser's Fontana steel plant and designed various specific buildings such as the administration building; did similar work for the Kaiser magnesium plant, and in Oakland, the Permanente Hospital. In San Francisco, the Stanford Medical School Research Laboratory.



I wish to lend my support to the nomination for Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects for Birge M. Clark of Palo Alto, California. A brief biographical sketch is herewith presented for your information.

Architectural practice of Birge M. Clark started in 1921 following World War I. He was associated first with his father, Professor Arthur B. Clark, then practiced solely under his own name until 1930 when he was joined by his borther, David B. Clark, who died in 1944. Walter Stromquist, who had been with them both for some years, has been his partner since January 1, 1946.

Practice has been very general, including residences, schools, commercial buildings, and various war projects. Most noteworthy during the period he was with his father was the residence of Herbert Hoover. In 1930 the Federal Post Office for Palo Alto was designed and at approximately this same date the residence of Charles and Kathleen Norris was designed. During the last fifteen years a considerable amount of school work has been done, among these the Dormitory Building for the Menlo School for Boys.

During World War II his brother and he were consulting architects for the Kaiser Company's Iron and Steel Plant at Fontana. In addition to the consulting on the entire plant, they designed the Administration Building, Laboratory Building, etc. Also for the Kaiser Co., was designed the Permanente Hospital at Oakland. Particularly unique about this hospital which was built under wartime conditions, is the Surgery with internal and exterior circulation. In San Jose, Birge Clark and Walter Stromquist designed the H. M. Gousha Company building with unusual arrangement of offices around a patio.

His work has all shown great planning skill, in connection with a fine feeling of design. His contributions to Institute and Public Service have been outstanding and these alone I believe merit his consideration for Fellowship.

As Chairman of The Jury of Fellows I have been asked by the Jury to bring to your attention certain lack of information needful to us for proper consideration of your candidate for Fellowship, Mr. Birge Malcolm Clark, A.I.A.

In all cases we have not received sufficient letters containing detailed, factual data about the candidate and his public service, and these we need and would recommend your forwarding to us before the next sitting of the Jury which will probably be held in March of 1952.

All the sponsors should write us and it should be impressed upon them that a letter in general terms does not help the cause of the candidate particularly. If he has done something in public service, that particular contribution should be described, but not with that well-worn phrase "tireless effort."

Also, we find the exhibition is poorly presented and should be rigorously edited. Quality, not quantity, and attractively mounted, signed photographs are what we want. Too often do we have to consider photographs without any title or names on them.

My dear Mr. Pope:

In regard to the application of Mr. Birge M. Clark for advancement to Fellowship, A.I.A., I find that Miss Cervais, the Secretary to the Jury, has already returned to you his exhibits for editing by your Committee, and she has further told you that all nominations for Fellowship are reviewed in three successive meetings before they are dropped from the Jury's agenda. So that you should not be dismayed if you hear nothing for a year or so after the nomination.

The Jury, as you can well imagine, has no easy time in considering the exhibits and supporting data of each applicant and for that reason we have issued a short set of regulations which we feel will help not only ourselves, but will give the applicant a more intelligent consideration. You doubtless have received this outline. We do mean exactly what we say in this folder: very careful editing of the photographs and particularly the request that letters supporting the candidate should contain real information. This last is very important. You should get letters from the proposers and outsiders, if you can, and they should not be, as so often they are, of vague generalities. As I think I have told you, "untiring efforts" cover a multitude of omissions and I find from my notes that Mr. Clark's submission was commissions. supported by no letters whatever. Definitely the resubmission should go through the Northern California Chapter, which I suggest might be reinforced by some information from the Coast Counties (Valleys?) Chapter. Impress on them that any material they send us should be cogent. I know that The Octagon will appreciate receiving the resubmission of Mr. Clark's exhibits before January 1, 1952. It is precarious if you postpone it much later.



My Most Unforgettable Person

To me the most unforgettable person I have met is Birge Clark. He is an architect in Palo Alto. He has designed hundreds of buildings - schools, homes, stores, offices, factories, and hospitals.

He started in 1920, after World War I. He designed the Hoover House on the Stanford campus. That was before Herbert Hoover was president of the United States. At 89 years of age he is still going to work each day.

As a friend and step-grandfather, he likes to know what you are doing, and shares in your activities. At home he grows flowers and vegetables in his backyard. In his basement are rocks and wood pieces he polishes for jewelry making.

Birge Clark is a very humble person, that is probably why you haven't heard of him.

Birge Clark was a Palo Alto Kiwanian for 64 years, lone survivor of the men who founded the local service club in 1925.

As a Kiwanian myself for 52 years, I have had lunch with Birge weekly for many, many years.

His interest in service is significant, for service was an important factor in Birge's life--service to his country, to his profession, and to his community.

He was an extraordinary man with an extraordinary life history.

He won the Silver Star for bravery in action in World War I when he was shot down in an Army Air Corps observation balloon on August 29, 1917.

He designed some 450 buildings in Palo Alto and at Stanford. He worked with his father on the design of the Lou Henry Hoover House, built for Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hoover and later the home of five Stanford presidents.

At the annual Christmas party for emeriti faculty at the Lou Henry Hoover House last December, first use of the house since the recent work to strengthen it against earthquakes, President Donald Kennedy paid tribute to Birge as one of the designers of the house.


Pretty staff members, hostesses at the party, paid Birge a lot of attention.

I commented to Birge that he was getting a lot more attention than I was, and Birge said:

"But Fred, you aren't 95, nearly 96!"

Indeed I wasn't. Nor was I a war hero, a distinguished architect, one of the leading citizens of the community, and one of the university's most beloved alumni.





In the late 1930's I interviewed the occupants of the Ruth Lucie Stern Laboratory, a unit of the old Stanford Medical Center on Clay Street in San Francisco. Birge had been the architect, and the occupants heaped praise on him. This was not an everyday occurrence for architects, so my desire to meet Birge stemmed from that early date.

When we did meet in 1956, after I had started to work at Stanford and my family and I had moved to Edgewood Drive, I realized at once that Birge Clark was an extraordinary individual. I like to put it that he was the Book of Knowledge, Webster's Dictionary and Roget's Thesaurus and more rolled into one. 

Birge Clark's memorial is all around us. He left us a great legacy of beautiful buildings that not only uplift us but have done a very rare thing-they have defined our entire community.




