Leadership in the creation of a division of State Government Affairs at AIA headquarters, with a Clearinghouse establishing a system of communications with and among State components re legislation affecting the professional practice of architecture.

Initiation of successful prosecution by the Nebraska State Attorney General of blatant violations of State licensing laws, effectively eliminating such violations during the past quarter-century.

As a prominent professional, the presentation of slide programs, lectures, and critiques to a broad variety of groups, including elementary and secondary schools, colleges, civic and social clubs, etc., covering architectural design, history, and planning.

CATEGORY #2. PUBLIC SERVICE:

As Y.M.C.A. Board member and President, the searching out of sites and development of two new Y camps, and the building of two new centers in the city.

As Chairman of a Junior Chamber of Commerce Post-war Planning Committee, successfully urged (a) abandonment of downtown vehicular traffic ways into and through the city campus of the University of Nebraska, and (b) creation of residential neighborhood parks throughout the city, particularly in new subdivisions; both goals have been accomplished.

As Chairman of a Task Force, participated in a study and the re-writing of Rules and Regulations for Fire Safety for Schools and Institutions, office of the Nebraska State Fire Marshall.

As President of the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra Association, initiated the annual Pops Concerts to open the Symphony concert season.

Other decision-making involvement as: First Professional Planner, City of Lincoln; Board member and President, Lincoln Y.M.C.A.; Board member and President, Nebraska Wesleyan Arts Council; Board Executive Committee, Y.M.C.A. of the Rockies; Board member, Lincoln Chamber of Commerce; Chairman, Advisory Committee to the Nebraska Vocational Technical College; Member, Nebraska Wesleyan University Commission for the Future; Member, The Lincoln Foundation; President, Lincoln Center Kiwanis Club.

Mr. Clark returned to his hometown of Lincoln, Nebraska after completing graduate work in architecture at Harvard University in 1940. The City of Lincoln and the State of Nebraska had virtually no examples of "modern" architecture, a condition that Mr. Clark set about correcting. He persuaded a Harvard friend, Lawrence A. Enersen, to move to Lincoln and join him in practice. In the years since then, The Clark Enersen Partners has established a full-service architectural practice that has received much recognition for high quality performance.


Dear Ken:

In response to your recent letter, the concern you expressed as to the admitting of architects who are "in contracting" to A.I.A. membership is a serious one for many of us in the profession.

I personally feel very strongly that the professional status of architects is being seriously challenged from many directions, and that the recognition of the profession as such, especially in smaller communities over the country, has been seriously eroded in recent years. As an example, I have found, during testimony before legislative committees involved with legislative bills affecting the practice of the profession, that it is often very difficult to separate the recognition of architects from the construction industry in general; many legislators look upon architects as simply an integral part of the building contracting business. I have also found that most registration laws are very weak in defining any actual reason for such licensing of architects, vaguely referring to "health, safety, and general welfare". I have tried in vain to enlist the support of other professionals toward revision of existing laws which would set forth in some detail an exposition of architects' education, training, and experience which would actually support a claim that architects are necessarily licensed for maintaining the "health, safety, and general welfare" of the public.

I find that the deans and faculties of architectural schools are presently not at all interested in discussing their curricula and graduation requirements as they may apply to the preparation of professional architects who would be able to demonstrate competence in the maintaining of "health, safety, and general welfare" of their future clients and the public. I think that the statement of a dean of one of our state architectural colleges to the effect that administrations and faculties of schools should be left free to do

"research, while the practicing profession should assume the responsibility for the professional education of the young architect" was a shocking and dangerous thing. (This statement was made during our regional meeting in Oklahoma City last October). My point is that the practical-minded architect who is engaged in building construction activities can very well see the vacuum left by the educators; he is thus ready and willing to step in as educator, architect, and building contractor.

I have talked about this concern with the members of our Lincoln Chapter, as well as several past presidents of our Nebraska Society, and these individuals do express a concern for the maintenance of professional integrity through membership in the A.I.A. Some have said that the architect, practicing regularly as a professional, but having an interest or a minor participation in contracting operations of various kinds, should not be hamstrung or denied professional recognition through A.I.A. membership standards. These persons do not believe, however, that any registered professional architect who has redirected his major effort into contracting operations should be allowed membership in the A.I.A.

I have not been able to identify any anti-contracting leader or group in Nebraska, but I know that Charles Wilsam, as current President of our Society, is strongly of this persuasion, and will carry that attitude to the convention.

I am sorry I will not see you at the convention, since I will be preparing to join the Kansas Society Study Tour which is scheduled for departure to Spain on May 27. Thank you for your letter; I have responded at length, and I am pleased to have been able to get this off my chest.

ROWLEY HOMESTEAD MUSEUM AND NATURE CENTER

Fred Rowley took the cabin apart and hauled it on a sled in the winter to his homestead for a barn.

Another neighbor of the Rowley's was a miner who built a cabin south of the Homestead. The remains can still be seen next to what we call the Gold Mine. He said that God told him there was gold in this area. He had a pet porcupine which followed him around.

In the late 1930's, Fred Rowley finally sold his homestead to the Just family. He was unable to make enough to keep it. The Just family let Fred Rowley stay at the homestead and continue living there as before until 1953. After that, no one lived there.

In 1967, the YMCA of the Rockies bought the Just land of which the Rowley Homestead was a part to develop Snow Mountain Ranch. In 1971, some reconstruction work was done on the Rowley Homestead by the YMCA of the Rockies. Thanks to a generous donation by Ken & Martha Clark of Lincoln, Nebraska, a foundation was put in, it was reinked, part of the floor was replaced, and also part of the ceiling.

The spring staff of 1982 and Snow Mountain Ranch began working toward making the Rowley Homestead into a living museum and nature center. Research was done throughout the winter and spring, and in June the actual reconstruction work began. Some of the other staff members volunteered some of their time to help. It turned out to be amore time consuming job than expected, but much progress has been made. The end of July 1982, the Rowley Homestead was opened as a living museum. The staff members working here dress in clothes appropriate for the early 1900's and do some of the same chores and activities that the Rowley's may have done when they were living here.


Unfortunately, I am not a native Nebraskan, and so am not able to provide any documentation of Ken's early professional activities. My first involvement with Ken was in the late 1950's when I became an associate member of the Nebraska Society of Architects. That was a period of time, prior to our division into three separate chapters, when the N.S.A. held several meetings each year, about 1/2 in Omaha and 1/2 in Lincoln. Ken was an active participant in all N.S.A. activities and if I'm not mistaken was one of the officers of the society. I believe that he served as president in 1961.

Ken was (and still is) the type of person who makes his position known on all matters relating to the practice of architecture. I recall that he was particularly vocal about a person from Omaha, who was offering to practice architecture without the benefit of a license. I know that Ken was personally instrumental in bringing an end to this gentleman's unlicensed practice.

During the late 1950's and 1960's Ken was one of a group of very dynamic leaders in the Nebraska Society of Architects. The meetings were important events to young architects, providing them with the opportunity to meet and talk with such recognized professionals as Frank Latenser, Bill Steele, Leo Daly, Noel Wallace, Cecil Martin, Larry Enersen, Ellery Davis, Fritz Vierek, Ken Clark, and others.

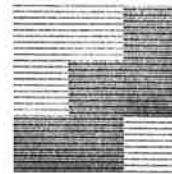

The demonstration it provided of the importance of a commitment to simple ethics, good design and hard work have been significant guideposts for my career in architecture. The significance of this is that versions of this same story are repeated by dozens of architects now in practice who look back on their experience with Clark and Enersen as a unique and treasured professional experience.

Clearly, Kenneth B. Clark is deserving of Fellowship recognition in several categories, including service to the profession, public service and architectural practice. I hope that he receives your favorable consideration.

I know of no other firm in the country where young architects have had such an opportunity. It is obviously because of the unusually high quality of the men who ran the company.

My experience from Clark and Enersen has always allowed me to stay at the forefront of my peer group and profession. I almost think of Clark and Enersen as a graduate school; so many very fine architects were born and trained there. Many of these people, friends of yours and mine, now have very senior positions in firms all across the nation. Many, like myself, took inspiration from K.B. Clark and have started their own firms and businesses. Again, I feel that I owe a great deal of the reasons for my company being successful since I founded it thirteen years ago, at the age of 29, to the tremendously strong and beneficial experience I received in architecture, design, construction, human relations, contracts and all of the other many important aspects of a very complex industry. It is almost as though it instilled a will in me to succeed in my career so as to not let those fine men down for giving me such a powerful, fundamental beginning.

I was very happy to have a chance to see Mr. Clark last week while I was the visiting Hyde Series Lecturer at the University of Nebraska College of Architecture. We had a chance for a short but very pleasant conversation that brought back many fine memories to us both, and a few laughs as well. I know you remember the great fun we all had while at the same time being so very serious about our work.



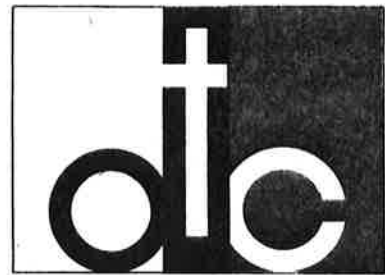


